HARINGEY BOROUGH FC - A BRIEF HISTORY

It was not until 1970 that a team competed under the name of Haringey Borough when WOOD GREEN TOWN who had played at Coles Park since 1930 changed their name to Haringey Borough. A merger with EDMONTON FC resulted in a brief change of name to Edmonton & Haringey FC until 1976 when the present name was re-adopted. The merged Club played in the Athenian League until it ceased to operate at the end of the 1983/84 season and then played for 4 seasons in Division 2 North of the Isthmian League. After a period of instability culminating ia year in the wilderness away from Senior football in 1988/89 they were admitted to the Spartan



League in 1989/90 retaining Premier Division membership throughout until the South Midlands League merger in season 1997/98 when they finished 7th.in the Premier Division South to secure membership of the new "combined" Premier Division for 1998/99 as well as being runners up in the League's Premier Division Cup. In 2004 after an unsuccessful attempt to move the Club to the nearby New River Sports stadium and a walk out of the existing Committee Aki Achillea who had commenced his association with the Club in 1995 was appointed to lead the Club forward and together with George Kilikita and Secretary John Bacon the club sought to engage more with the local community and tap into the talent locally.

The senior men's team having been relegated to Division One of the Spartan South Midlands League in 2006/7 bounced back with promotion at the very first attempt and a fine season ended with both promotion and the winning of the Division One Cup. Back in the Premier Division for the season 2008/09 the Club again quickly found itself among the relegation strugglers leading to the appointment of the current Manager – the vastly experienced Tom Loizou. Tom and his excellent loyal team of coaching staff have been instrumental in turning around the Club's fortunes in the intervening years. In 2011/12 a highest ever 5th place was achieved and the League Challenge Trophy won. After massive stadium improvements in the close season with the erection of a new Clubhouse and new dressing rooms hopes were high for 2012/13 but the poor weather and the problematic pitch led to a massive fixture backlog which negated any chance of a serious challenge for honours and the Club finished 9th. In 2013/14 the Club's challenge for promotion took place in the Essex Senior League following a sideways switch imposed by the FA. The Club had what was then its most successful season ever finishing runners up by just a solitary point to Great Wakering Rovers and ended the season with 20 wins and one draw from the final 21 League games. The League title was nevertheless secured at the second attempt in 2014/15 with a haul of 103 points from 38 games and with it promotion to Step 4 in which we were allocated to the Ryman League Division One North. The first season at the higher level was a baptism of fire when only 7 points were garnered from the first 17 games but by the close of the season a further 43 points had been amassed from the remaining 29 games and the Club finished in a comfortable 15th place. The first season in the FA Trophy produced two fine victories before a replay loss to Hitchin Town of the Evostik South Premier Division. The summer of 2016 saw yet further investment in the close season in the form of a 3G synthetic main pitch and added improvements to the perimeter, the spectator rails and the floodlights and has created a facility of which the Club can be proud; and has afforded a greater opportunity for the Club to move forward in all aspects. The first team in 2016/17 improved markedly on the previous season and had an excellent all round campaign although rather unfortunate not to finish the season on a high having ended with the "double heartbreak" of missing out on promotion through a 4-5 closely fought semi final play-off defeat at Maldon & Tiptree FC after finishing 5th in the Division and an odd goal 2-3 London Senior Cup semi-final loss at Metropolitan Police. But 2017/18 was to be the Club's best ever and culminated in promotion to Step 3 via the play-off route with a 3-1 win over Canvey Island after automatic promotion had been missed by just two points. And in FA Competitions the 4th and final round of the Qualifying rounds for the FA Cup was reached, although that ended in disappointment with a 2-4 home defeat by Heybridge Swifts who then enjoyed a visit to Exeter City in the First Round Proper. In the FA Trophy we went right through the qualifying campaign and were lucky enough to draw Leyton Orient in the First Round Proper which brought a record attendance of 1,133 to Coles Park and "The O's" left mightily relieved at having come back to win 2-1 after going a goal down in the fifth minute. 2018/19 was another great but ultimately disappointing season season with an FA Cup run which took us into the First Round Proper

where it was ended rather cruelly by AFC Wimbledon's last minute goal at Coles Park in front of a record crowd of 2,710. Having led the Premier Division for several weeks in mid-season it was somewhat surprising that we dropped from 2nd to 3rd on the last day of the season after a poor late run but still enjoyed home advantage in the Play-Off Semi-final in which a 45 minute second half onslaught on the Tonbridge Angels goal produced only one goal in response to the two they had scored before the interval. The 2019/20 season's early termination was less of a disappointment for us than for most other Isthmian Premier Division Clubs as we were marooned in mid-table with no realistic prospect of entering either the promotion or relegation zones. The highlight of the season should have been the visit of National League Yeovil Town in the Final Qualifying Round of the Emirates FA Cup but, as is well known, appalling crowd behaviour brought that game to an early end and the second game seemed something of an anti-climax. In fact, without making excuses, that unpleasant episode seems to have adversely affected our players for some time for, whereas we had been well in the promotion places mix, thereafter we just drifted downwards The early termination of League Fixtures for 2020/21 was more of a blow than was the previous seasons voiding as we were well placed to make a charge towards a play-off place at least. However the Buildbase FA Trophy continued and we enjoyed a run through to the 4th Round Proper when Oxford City of the National League South finally eliminated us 4-2 after we had been two up; en route we had overcome Faversham Town, Bishops Stortford, Eastbourne Borough and Dartford, the last two also being National League South Clubs. The London Senior Cup also carried on and due to withdrawals, we reached the quarter-final without playing a game but lost a penalty shoot out to Hanwell Town after a 2-2 draw. The 2021/22 season was more or less a non-event as regards any real challenge for the League top spots but the semi-finals of The League Cup and the London Senior Cup were reached with both game ending in odd goal defeats in the space of a week. We may well have set a Club record for the highest number of injuries sustained in any season and that even led to an outside chance of relegation towards the end of the season but the failings of others meant we were never in serious danger.

The foundations are in place for an eventual assault on the title to secure a National League place for the men's senior side and an exciting season is in prospect in which a challenge for at least a Play-off position is a realistic prospect as we pursue our ambition to achieve promotion to the National League which should be within the capabilities of our talented squad. The facilities and structures are in place for all the Club's teams to improve and enhance on recent successes.

2016/17 saw the introduction of a much needed "second" team, formed to compete in the Ryman Development League it being basically intended for Under 21 players but with the facility to include up to 4 older players in every squad. The team held their own comfortably in the League finishing a very creditable 6th place and the benefits of the Club's participation were all too evident with the introduction of a number of players into the first team squad throughout the season and the opportunity for first team squad players to keep fresh and those who were returning from injury had a platform to get fit. Thereby proving the benefits of having such a side. The age restriction was amended to Under 23 for 2017/18 and the team has always been near the top of the table, continued to do well in the following seasons and won the North Division Championship in 2021/22 but lost to South Division Champions Hastings United in the "Champion of Champions" play off.

Youth teams were commenced and run successfully for many years at various age levels with some considerable success particularly at the older age groups including progress into the 2nd round proper of the FA Youth Cup in 2006/07. They were Divisional winners of the Southern Counties Floodlit Youth League in 2004/05 (and also winners of the League's Colwyn Cup competition) and 2009/10. After a few seasons absence from Youth football the Under 18s rejoined the Southern Counties competition in 2017/18, winning its Divisional Championship at the first attempt and finishing towards the top of the table in the following seasons. This will again provide a pathway for talented local boys to make their way into the first team squad and ultimately the first team itself.

The Women's Team was formed in 1999 and competed in the Eastern Region Womens League winning promotion in its first season and then to its Premier Division for 2002/03; and there they have remained save for two seasons, the first being in 2011/12 following relegation to Division 1 from which they made an immediate Premier Division return as runners-up. Steady improvement began and we were extremely fortunate to have been approached midway through the 2014/15 season by renowned coach and former

professional footballer Steve Browne who at the time was involved in the highly successful S & T Academy Girls football .Steve was duly appointed Manager and preserved the Women's Premier Division status. In 2015/16 a mid table position was easily secured from an uneven campaign which included convincing away wins at the top 2 Clubs and some surprisingly disappointing performances against lower placed teams. In 2017/18, by Christmas the team were runaway League leaders only to be thrown off course by the tragic early death of Steve on New Years Day but after a shaky period the Women re-asserted themselves to win the League Championship on the last day of the season and with it, promotion to the Women's Premier League and followed that up by adding the League Cup with a 5-1 win over Cambridge City to complete the double which was a a fitting, lasting legacy for their Manager. The loss of many of the successful squad, several to American University Scholarships, proved too much of a handicap at the higher level and relegation back to the Eastern Regional League was an unsurprising outcome. Now under the stewardship of Bobby Cato significant steps forward seem certain and promotion is again a realistic prospect. An exceptionally young and talented squad was unlucky to find itself in danger of relegation towards the end of the 2021/22 season due to a high number of odd goal defeats but pulled clear with 4 vital points from the last two games. They look capable of going places if they stick together when experience is added to their armoury.

HISTORY OF HORSHAM FC

Horsham Football Club can trace its roots back to February 18th 1871, when it played its inaugural match against Reigate Priory. Records of those formative years are sparse but we do know that the club's existence largely depended upon enough players being available to form a side and it wasn't until the club reformed in 1881 that fixtures were played on a more regular basis. For this reason, and by no means diminishing the efforts of those early trailblazers, the club acknowledges 1881 as the year of its official formation.

In September 1882, the club helped found the Sussex County Football Association before becoming became founder members of the West Sussex Senior League in 1896, winning the championship in 1899/00, 1900/01 and 1901/02, and claiming the Royal Irish Rifles Cup in 1900. Having initially played at both Horsham Park and Springfield Meadow, the club secured Queen Street as its permanent home in 1904 but some lean form over the ensuing years saw Horsham overlooked when the Sussex County League was created in 1920 and it wasn't until their fourth West Sussex Senior League triumph in 1925/26 that they were invited to make the step up.

The 1930s was a golden era for the club and the County League was won six times during the decade, Horsham regularly scoring over one hundred goals a season. Cup competitions provided more silverware with the Sussex RUR Cup (seven times) and the Sussex Senior Cup (twice) both finding their way back to Queen Street before the outbreak of war. When peace returned to the world, Horsham won the first postwar title in 1947, the RUR Cup in 1946, 1949 and 1951, and the Sussex Senior Cup in 1950.

In 1947/48 the club reached the First Round Proper of the FA Cup for the first time, taking a first minute lead against Notts County before losing 9-1. Having had successive applications to join the Athenian League rejected, the club changed tack and successfully applied to become members of the Metropolitan & District League that included the 'A' sides of top Football League clubs, the reserve sides of 'professional' non-league clubs and a few amateur teams, with Horsham confounding common opinion by winning the championship at the first attempt. However, over the years the league became stronger and stronger and eventually the amateur clubs struggled to make any impact at all and Horsham finished the 1956/57 season at the foot of the table, having already decided to quit the league in favour of the Corinthian League where they began a period of consistent progress, finishing thirteenth, ninth, eighth and fifth before their best ever season in 1961/62 when third place was achieved.

Following a mass exodus of players, Horsham were forced to rebuild with a young, local team that would peak at fourth place in 1964/65 only to become the first Horsham side ever to be relegated the following season. Under coach Pat Tobin, the team was rebuilt once more and this reaped dividends in 1966/67 when the club once again reached the First Round Proper of the FA Cup, with the visit of Swindon Town drawing a record 7,134 crowd to Queen Street. Despite this achievement this was a frustrating period of near misses for the club who finished third, third and fifth and suffered three consecutive defeats in the final of the Sussex Senior Cup. By now nicknamed the Hornets, following a supporters' competition, the club appointed Roy Osborne as their new manager and the change brought immediate success with the championship of Division Two achieved in 1969/70, the Division One title in 1972/73, and the Sussex Senior Cup in 1972.

Instead of taking their place in the Athenian League Premier Division, Horsham became members of the Isthmian League when that competition expanded to two divisions in 1973/74, finishing eighth in its first season and rounding the season off in style by winning the Sussex Senior Cup. Now under the guidance of Tony Elkins-Green, 1976/77 saw the Hornets finish in a best ever sixth place but financial problems threatened the club's very survival and only the dedicated work of chairman Frank King saw the club saved from bankruptcy and dissolution although it couldn't prevent a young amateur team from finishing bottom of Division One in 1979/80 and the club was relegated to the new Division Two. Horsham endured some dark times under numerous managers in the 1980s, finishing bottom of the league in 1983/84 and 1989/90, when only a successful two-legged relegation play-off against Letchworth Garden City maintained the club's Isthmian status.

Progress was made under the management of Peter Evans from 1990, during which time the club reached the final qualifying round of the FA Cup, though under his replacement, John Yems, Horsham once again propped up the entire league in 1993/4 leading to the appointment of former captain Mark Dunk as manager.

He led his side to the Division Three championship in 1995/96, narrowly missing out on a second successive promotion before departing in 1997.

Three years of lower mid-table obscurity followed before former Crawley Town boss John Maggs took over as manager in January 2000, taking a struggling side out of the relegation zone to Division Two runners-up in three seasons and a promotion play-off final appearance in 2004/05. Promotion to the Premier Division was achieved the following season with another runners-up finish and the club went on to establish itself as a consistent performer, even challenging for a place in Conference South in 2007/8 before ending up eleventh. The Hornets made history in 2007/08 by reaching the second round proper of the FA Cup and taking eventual League One champions Swansea City to a replay, with both matches shown live on Sky TV. Having sold their ground for redevelopment at the end of the season, Horsham played at Worthing during 2008/09 and again reached the fourth Qualifying Round of the FA Cup where they took Conference side Stevenage Borough to a replay before ending an injury-ravaged year in thirteenth place. Season 2009/10 saw a return to Horsham, entering into a groundshare agreement with their old neighbours Horsham YMCA as their quest for a new ground continued, but fortunes were on the wane and an acute overhaul of the club's finances in 2011 resulted in the departure of Maggs and virtually the entire playing squad.

A turbulent 2011/12 found the club under three different managers, with Simon Colbran ultimately unable to prevent the side from returning to Division One South. A season of stability followed, with the Hornets ending the campaign in fifteenth and claiming the Brighton Charity Cup for a second successive season. The club entered a new chapter in November 2013 when, following Colbran's departure to Crowborough Athletic, long-serving player Gary Charman was appointed as first team manager. Charman, who played more than six hundred times for the Hornets, steered the club to sixteenth place but a poor run of results the following season led to him being replaced by two more former players, Anthony Storey and Cliff Cant, in January 2015. That same month, the club's misery was compounded when an application to build a new home on the outskirts of the town was unanimously rejected by Horsham District Council. Despite some impressive initial results, Storey and Cant were unable to save the club from relegation so former East Preston manager Dominic di Paola was appointed towards the end of the campaign with a view to rebuilding a side capable of competing in the Sussex County League for the first time since 1951.

After a season-long battle with Eastbourne Town, Horsham took the title by eleven points to secure a record-equalling eighth County League title, thus securing an immediate return to the Isthmian League. During that 2015/16 campaign, the club recorded a club record ninety-seven points whilst conceding the fewest goals in their history (twenty-two). After a slow start to the 2016/17 campaign, in which just three of the first thirteen matches were won, the Hornets recovered to finish in a not unsatisfactory sixteenth place in Division One South. Off the pitch the club finally got the news it longed for when, on March 21st 2017, a revised ground application was submitted and overwhelmingly approved by HDC, meaning work could finally begin on constructing a new community stadium off the Worthing Road.

With the arrangement at YMCA having come to an end, Horsham moved into the Sussex FA Headquarters at Lancing's Culver Road in the summer of 2017 but a crippling injury list put paid to any pre-season expectations of improving the club's position, with the lowpoint of the season coming in an 8-0 reverse at Cray Wanderers in what is the club's heaviest ever FA Trophy defeat. Yet that result proved the catalyst for the side to kick on and only six of the next nineteen matches ended in defeat, a run that lifted Horsham to eleventh in the table, only to fall away again in the closing months of the season before ending in fifteenth spot, one better than the previous year.

Hopes that the club might start the 2018/19 campaign in the new ground went unfulfilled but the disappointment didn't seem to affect the players who turned Culver Road into something of a fortress, losing just four matches in all competitions – two of them to higher-league opponents Bath City and Eastbourne Borough. Overdue runs to the latter stages of the qualifying rounds in both the FA Cup and FA Trophy bred confidence that was transferred into their league form and, from early December, the Hornets never dropped below fourth place, finally finishing as runners-up to Cray Wanderers. With automatic promotion the right of only the champions, Horsham faced a play-off semi-final clash with Haywards Heath Town – the only side to have recorded a league double over them during the campaign – and duly won 3-0 to set up a home final with Ashford United. After a tense tie, played in front of over eight hundred spectators, Horsham won through 2-1 after extra-time to return to the Premier Division after an absence of seven years.

The sad passing of President Frank King in May 2019 meant that he tragically missed seeing his beloved Hornets finally take ownership of its new ground, just a few weeks after his death. His name, however, will live on through the popular decision to dedicate the club's new boardroom in his memory.

Boosted by their fabulous new facilities, named after ground sponsor Camping World in a minimum three-year deal, the club confounded expectations by occupying one of the play-off spots for much of 2019/2020, topping the division on more than one occasion, whilst also reaching the last four of the Isthmian League Cup for the first time, only for the campaign to be declared null and void in March 2020 due to the Coronavirus pandemic. Although it ultimately counted for nothing, their standing of 6th place at the premature conclusion to the season represented the highest finish in the club's history.

With the pandemic also bringing an early end to the 2020/21 campaign, the club was finally able to complete its first full programme of fixtures at its new home in 2021/22. And what a memorable season it turned out to be. Despite an injury-hit start, the club reached the first round of the FA Cup where they went down to a narrow defeat at League Two Carlisle United, a near 700 mile round-trip! But the cup run and a crippling injury list left the Hornets rock bottom of the table by early November, only to rise up to eleventh with a run of seven wins from the next eight league games, a position they maintained at the season's end after winning their last five matches of the season. The Hornets also reached the semi-finals of the Sussex Senior Cup but went one better when lifting the Velocity Trophy (Isthmian League Cup) for the first time in their history with a 4-0 defeat of Margate. The season also produced the ground's first 'full house', when 1,927 watched the FA Cup tie versus Woking, with the highest league 'gate' of 1,846 in place for the visit of league champions Worthing.

THE SECRETARY'S MUSINGS

This afternoon it is our pleasure to welcome the players, officials and supporters of Horsham FC to the CVS Van Hire stadium – although in truth we wish were not doing so as it means that we exited the FA Cup at the first hurdle two Saturdays ago. No doubt Horsham share those sentiments for they too went down away from home by 2-1 at Herne Bay while we were suffering the same fate at Maldon and Tiptree. So as the overworked cliché goes both Clubs can now "concentrate on the League"

We welcome too our Match Officials who are Vladyslav Bakulin assisted by Thomas Healy and Andrew Tregoning.

This will be "The Hornets" fourth visit in recent seasons, as they were promoted to the Isthmian Premier Division, in the season following our promotion for in season 2019/20 they were here on consecutive Autumn Saturdays; firstly in the FA Trophy and left having lost on that occasion by 3-0 returning the following Saturday to win the League game 2-1. They also won their home League game against us, by 2-0, a month before that seasons premature abandonment. We did not meet in 2020/21 thanks to Covid and last season saw both Clubs win their home games - us by 3-1 in our first home game of the season and Horsham by 3-0 in early April. But our win was rather a non-event for the visitors were reduced to 10 men after just nine minutes (for denying a clear goal scoring opportunity) and to 9 men in the 63rd minute (two yellows). In fact Horsham made a real fight of it and pulled one back at the start of stoppage time but as they obviously had nothing to lose by adopting a gung ho approach in search of an equaliser they were finally undone by our breakaway third goal.

Before the recent Isthmian meetings the only League fixtures were in the Athenian League against the Edmonton half of our merged Club in which both Clubs competed in its same Division from 1966/67 to 1972/73 at the end of which season Horsham were League Champions and were admitted to the Isthmian League. Their visits then would have been to the Barrass Stadium.

*** meaning those of 60+, Students of 16+, NHS Staff, Unemployed, Armed Forces personnel, Disabled. For Cup matches we are unable to offer free entry and the charge will also normally be as for League games. No charge is made for entry to our Under 18, Under 23 and Womens Team Home game

KNOCK OUT COMPETITIONS FOR THE FIRST TEAM

Our early exit from the FA Cup leaves us depending upon the FA Trophy for some real knock out Competition excitement. But it is not until 26th September that we will know our first opponents for Step 3 Clubs are exempted until the 3rd Qualifying Round. The Velocity (ie League) Cup draw has not yet been made but in the London Senior Cup we have a bye in the First Round and will play the winner of the First Round tie between Glebe FC and Fisher FC, both those Clubs being members of the South East Counties League Premier Division.

NEWS OF OUR OTHER TEAMS

The Under 23s kicked off their League campaign in defence of their Northern Division Championship at Coles Park on Monday 5th September against Brentwood Town and turned a 0-1 half time deficit into a 3-2 win thanks to last years Development Division Golden Boot winner, Andre Odeku, netting a second half hat-trick. Because of the withdrawal from the Development Division of both Potters Bar Town and Bowers & Pitsea they will not be in action again until Monday 3rd October when they make the long trek to Felixstowe & Walton United, unless a friendly match is arranged in the meantime. A very unsatisfacory situation in that there are now only 6 teams in the Development North Division, which we won last season, so even though the teams will meet each other 3 times its still only 15 games which is not really adequate for a League of this level

The Under 18s started with a visit to Heybridge Swifts in the Preliminary Round of the FA Youth Cup on Friday 2nd September and also exited at the first hurdle by 3-2. They opened their League campaign on Wednesday 7th at Langley with a 2-2 draw and last Tuesday entertained Enfield Borough but went down 3-4 so are still searching for their first win. They will not be in action again until the week commencing 26th September when they will visit Harrow Borough

Our WOMENS TEAM's flying start hit the buffers at the third attempt as they were unlucky 3-2 losers at Luton Town two Sundays ago and were without a game last Sunday but they do have a friendly game with Camden Town at Coles Park tomorrow – at 2pm. On 25th they have a Home League game with Kings Lynn Town before the long trek to the seaside to face Hastings United or Margate, who play tomorrow, to start their Women's FA Cup campaign

Monday August 30th HARINGEY BOROUGH v WINGATE & FINCHLEY (Pitching In Isthmian League Premier Division)

Oh what a disappointment for after the magnificent Saturday display at Carshalton expectations were really high. The pleasing attendance of 537 were entertained well enough but never experienced the excitement and tension generated by events at Carshalton. Neither 'keeper was given much of a chance to excel but the visiting 'keeper was by far the busier and but for our enthusiasm to accumulate near misses galore would have been in action much more often. WinFin's attacks were less frequent and the most scary moments came when Michael O'Donoghue and Rakim Richards both executed vital blocks as shots were unleashed from close range which were otherwise "odds on" goals and Rakim's was particularly nail-biting as the deflected ball squirmed inches the right (from our point of view) side of the post with Luke stranded. By half time we had already squandered more than enough chances to have made the game safe but in fact only Wingate had found the net at the end of a promising sortie down the left flank of our defence, but fortunately the striker who swept the cross home was off-side. The second half continued in much the same vein but it was heart in mouth time when the visitors were awarded a free kick in a central position about 25 yards from goal deep into injury time. It produced a really prolonged goalmouth scramble with us unable to get any distance to clearances and the ball being instantly fired back into the danger area but somehow we kept it out and eventually the final whistle brought blessed relief. Seemed like 15 minutes but was probably no more than 15 seconds. Had it gone in great would have been the injustice and gnashing of teeth. Female referees are still rare enough to be worthy of mention per se; the one who handled this match, Emily Heaslip from Bury St. Edmunds, was superb and I hope no ignoramus ever directs any "get back to the kitchen" or suchlike comments in her direction. We will be very pleased if we see her name shown against future games of ours. I'm sure Tom would have been too much of a gentleman to direct some of his customary wrath from the dugout in her direction but in truth he would have had no justification for doing so or blaming the referee for our failure to win. We will pass over mention of his activity two days earlier at Carshalton!! In fact Tom seemed unusually deflated at the end probably because, like us all, so much more had been expected of the team.

Saturday 3rd September MALDON & TIPTREE v HARINGEY BOROUGH (Emirates FA Cup 1st Qualifying Round)

There must be something about Maldon & Tiptree's Park Drive Stadium, ever a graveyard for our hopes, which brings out the worst in us. Some present were heard to proclaim this performance as our worst ever, anywhere! That can only be a matter of opinion but those holding such a view are not without some justification for doing so. We were simply outplayed by a team from a Division below propping up the table and pointless. As the saying goes "they wanted it more" and it showed right from the off, "The Jammers" well deserved their victory which was the second occasion in three years in which we exited the FA Cup on their ground. On that 2020 visit we could perhaps "hide" behind two controversial penalty decisions which both went against us but there can be no denying that on this occasion we have no one but ourselves to blame. Our tormentor in chief was their speedy No. 10 – Kamani McFarlane – who gave our defence a torrid time throughout and curled home a swerving cross shot after 13 minutes when given too much time to steady himself and pick his spot. In injury time he delivered the killer blow as he raced away from the half way line when our defence was too square and too far upfield as we sought a winner from a corner and by the time he reached our penalty area he again had all the freedom he needed to compose himself and slot the ball unfussily beyond the advancing Luke. We had drawn level in the 23rd minute thanks to a deflected shot from Georgios Aresti but apart from that had produced nothing to trouble the exceptionally tall home custodian for whom the collection of corners and high crosses was like water off a ducks back. We had lived dangerously and survived until stoppage time and had been given ample warning about the threat posed by McFarlane for an earlier threat of a tearaway by him was only thwarted by Sam Owusu's desperate grab at his disappearing shirt for which he might be thought lucky to have escaped with just a yellow. If those journalists who mark every player out of 10 had been present only Rakim and Scott (Mitchell) could have expected to receive more than a 5. Luckily the Chairman was on holiday - would not have been good for his health and probably not that of others either – although I think I may have discerned a faint bellow of rage carried on the wind from the direction of Crete when that injury time winner was flagged up. Fortunately the season is still in its infancy but many more performances like this one could well see us visiting Park Drive again next season as Maldon will surely fight their way up the table; an occasional sparkling display like that at Carshalton among otherwise indifferent performances might not be sufficient to save us.

Tuesday 13th September CANVEY ISLAND v HARINGEY BOROUGH (Pitching In Isthmian League Premier Division

Just what the Doctor ordered after the dross we served up to our supporters at Maldon. 90 minutes of all out action by both teams which rather astonishingly produced only two goals. A 1-1 draw suggests that both defences may have adopted a safety first approach but nothing could have been further from the truth. Neither side seemed interested in settling for a draw right up to the final whistle. Maybe not the most enjoyable match for those who like only what some call "good football" and do not regard even a win as "good" if it has been achieved in a style other than that which they favour. But anyone who did not appreciate the commitment and determination shown throughout by all 22 players must be very hard to please. The two goals came in the first 20 minutes and few among the spectators expected that to be the final score. But both goals seemed to bear a charmed life after that as near miss followed near miss at both ends over and over again; and both 'keepers had reason to be grateful for the frameworks assistance on more than one occasion. We scored first when awarded a free kick way out on the right and with everyone expecting Mikey O'Donoghue to lift it into the crowded area he chose instead to drive it square along the ground for Georgios Aresti to latch on to and unleash a fierce 25 yarder which flew low and accurately into the net to the right of the keeper having eluded the massed ranks in the penalty area. Canvey hit back strongly and although it was an unfortunate diversion into his own net by Rakim eight minutes later the equaliser was no surprise for Canvey had already gone close and hit the bar during the intervening period. Obviously a Borough win would have been welcome but any result other than a draw would have been hard on the losing team. However, to keep ourselves out of trouble we must start putting away more of the many chances we create (when the mood takes us) for our present record of just a point a game (six from six) would leave us with 42 points at the end of the season and right on the cusp of possible disaster. Interestingly our bete noir Maldon & Tiptree were also in action that evening and exited the FA Trophy by 0-3 at home to a fellow step 4 Club – Ware of the Southern League; so we can breathe a sigh of relief that they won't be waiting for us when we the draw is made for the Third Qualifying Round of the Trophy on 26th September for the matches on 8th October.

"He's made a good start, to be fair, and I reckon they should stick with him. I can't believe all this has happened to me, it's been a bit overwhelming."

Another feel-good story came from Pershore Town and their cheeky calendar with a very positive message. Players from the Hellenic League Division One side – known as the Plums – bared all in support of #CHECKYOURPLUMS after team-mate Will Green was diagnosed with testicular cancer aged 23.

Pershore hope to raise £5,000 through the calendar to support Will through his journey back to full health. So the players stripped off to pose for photos with a big launch at the club next month set to be attended by the OddBalls Foundation to provide an education talk for youth team and first team players, plus a pop-up testing centre.

In our job, we get to see so many great initiatives going on at clubs every week.

Perhaps in the heat of battle we underestimate, or even forget, the power of good football can bring. For young and old.

But taking the positives from the weekend, we didn't lose and had back to back clean sheets.

TOM BROUGHT IN A HOST OF NEW FACES OVER THE SUMMER. WHAT'S THE ATMOSPHERE LIKE IN THE SQUAD?

The new lads have been a breath of fresh air around the club. 

However, my dad would say the reason for me scoring so many goals last year was my massive head! Although, I would much rather make a last ditch, crunching tackle then score a goal!

HARINGEY PLAYER PROFILES 2021-22

GEORGIOS ARESTI – Cypriot International midfielder who numbers AEK Athens among his previous Clubs; 2017/18 deadline day signing and near automatic selection last season.

JOHNNY ASHMAN – close season signing from East Thurrock United. A wide midfielder who scored ten goals in 46 appearances for "the Rocks" last season (including one against us). Has also appeared fpr Aveley, Barking, Witham Town, Clapton and Cheshunt.



CHAYNIE BURGIN – tall rangy striker signed in the close season after a year with three Essex Clubs - Woodford Town, Maldon & Tiptree and National league Braintree Town.

LEWIS BYRNE-HEWITT – a well travelled forward signed in the close season; made debut in friendly with Chelmsford City and scored within 5 minutes. With Coggeshall Town at the end of last season and before that with Brightlingsea Regent, Witham Town, Bishop's Stortford, Ware, VCD Athletic, Whyteleafe, Billericay Town, Norwich City Under 18s and Arsenal Under 18s.

SAMUEL COOK – tall strong central defender making a challenge for a first team starting berth having just returned from a spell with German Clubs. Has made several starts after a number of substitute appearances.

KWAME DANSO – tall, commanding central defender signed in the close season. As a youth player had spells with West Ham United and Crystal Palace and is still ujnder 20. Was with Hackney Wick last season.

CHRISTOS DJAMAS – Cypriot Under 21 International signed in October 2020. Midfielder who was most recently on contract at Othello Athienoy and previously with Apoel Nicosia and Agia Napa.

JORGE DJASSI-SAMBU – midfield powerhouse now in 7th season with Club; opponents know when they have been tackled by this non-stop box to box player. Dangerous in opponents box at set piece situations.

MICHEAL AWAAH DOME-BEMWIN – defensive midfielder with experience in Spanish, Cypriot and Swedish football. Lewes, Whitehawk, Enfield Town and Braintree Town are among the English Clubs he has played for – all but Lewes after his last spell abroad.

WILLIAM DUPRAY – tall, strong defensive midfielder in his second spell at Borough. Signed in the close season having been with Ware last season. A much travelled player who has had spells at Northwood, Corinthian Casuals, Bracknell Town, Harlow Town, Wingate & Finchley, Welwyn Garden City, Chalfont St. Peter, Cambridge City and Scunthorpe United.

SCOTT DUROJAIYE – a familiar name who re-joined us last week. "Olu" is a very experienced and widely travelled midfielder with experience at several National League sides including Hungerford Town, Welling United, Braintree Town, Maidstone United, Woking, Dartford and most recently Peterborough Sports for which Club he played two games earlier this season and is now dual registered.

ANDRONICOS GEORGIOU – mid season signing; a forward who graduated from Stevenage Academy and played in their EFL team. Last season was with Wycombe Wanderers. Has also been loaned to Kings Langley, St. Albans City and Middlesbrough Under 23s.

STEFANOS GEORGIOU – younger brother of Andronicos signed from St. Margaretsbury a few days before the Registration deadline; a right sided midfielder who immediately looked at home at this higher level of the game.

KAYLEN HINDS – dangerous striker who moved on from Arsenal Under 23s and a loan to Stevenage to play in Germany for VFL Wolfsburg and Greuther Furth. Returned to England in August 2019 firstly with Watford and then Aldershot Town, Welling United and finally in January this year with Hayes & Yeading United.

CALLUM ISMAIL – skilful young full back previously with Bowers and Pitsea who joined us in September 2018 and after establishing himself in the Under 23s and on the bench made his first start in December 2019.

ALPHANSO KENNEDY – Goalscoring winger signed in close season. Was with Wingate & Finchley last season and also played for FC Romania; played against us when we lost 1-0 at Wingate & Finchley on August Bank Holiday Monday 2019.

NATHAN KPEMOU – tall powerful central defender or wide midfielder who has come through our Under 18 and 23 ranks and patiently awaited his opportunity; when injuries gave him his chance he seized it and he will not easily relinquish his starting place status.

MEKHI LEACOCK-McLEOD – Recent signing lastly with Romford. Wide attacker who numbers Halifax Town, Accrington Stanley and Eastleigh among his previous berths and Fulham, Wolverhampton Wanderers and Glasgow Rangers at Under 23 level.

ANTHONY McDONALD – fast tricky wide player entering his 9th season with us; excellent finisher with 13 League goals in an injury hit 2016/17; for a long while a first team regular but appearances have been interrupted by injuries.

ANTHONY MENDY – close season signing whom netted 25 goals for Uxbridge last season and three in our first two pre-season friendlies. A much travelled player who has been with Wingate & Finchley, Bedford Town, Beaconsfield Town, Leatherhead, Enfield Town, Chalfont St. Peter, AFC Hayes, Slough Town and Maidenhead United and has also played in Italy.

LUKE MEWITT – a young goalkeeper recruited in the close season with several years experience at Huddersfield Town and a season on loan at Hyde United of the Northern Premier League. Has also appeared for Hertford Town

SCOTT MITCHELL – a summer 2017 signing; 22 year old central defender who was previously with Dagenham & Redbridge. Almost an ever present in 2017/18 season and now an established member of the squad.

ANDRE ODEKU – speedy striker who has stepped up from our Under 23s and after several appearances from the bench is now a serious contender for a starting place and will doubtless continue his free-scoring habit when he gains more Senior level experience.

MICHAEL O'DONOGHUE – powerful full back rejoining us after spending some time at National League side Concord Rangers. Formerly a professional with Colchester United.

DESTINY OLADIPO – strong, tall – 6ft plus - striker signed early September who was with National League Hampton & Richmond Borough last season having previously played for Lowestoft Town and Romford.

MAX OVENDEN – a goalkeeper signed in the close season with previous Isthmian experience at Cray Valley (PM) and the now defunct Thamesmead Town as well as extensive Southern Counties East experience with Punjab United.

SAMUEL OWUSU – midfielder signed from East Thurrock United on Christmas Eve 2021 who immediately took a place on the Boxing Day bench and made a 20 minute debut appearance. After several further such appearances made his first start in the London Senior Cup game against Tooting & Mitcham United and has firmly established himself as a serious starting line up contender.

RAKIM RICHARDS – versatile player with us since 2010 and most usually to be found in a defensive role but quite at home in midfield and a menace in the opponents penalty area when corner kicks arrive.

TOM LOIZOU (MANAGER) A man with wealth of experience and knowledge of the game who is always running around for the club; his passion is there for everyone to see and he keeps everyone at the Club on their toes - not just the players!

DAVID CUMBERBATCH (FIRST TEAM ASSISTANT MANAGER) Long serving back up to the Manager and the first to judge the merits of the many applicants seeking trials with the Club.

JOHNNY FITSIOU (HEAD OF FOOTBALL OPERATIONS) Has a wealth of experience in professional and non-league football. He supports Tom and the Chairman, Aki, in everything football related.

THOMAS O'DONOGHUE (FIRST TEAM HEAD COACH) Known as 'Tucker' is an experienced coach who joined the coaching staff at the Borough in 2016, having started with the first team. Father of player Michael.

MUSTAFA BASHKAL (FIRST TEAM COACH) "Bash" has joined the first team coaching staff, having previously managed Leatherhead football club 1st team.

ALEXIE NICOLAIDES (ASSISTANT COACH) Has joined the club to gain experience in senior football is always willing and able to assist when required.

PHIL STONE (GOALKEEPING COACH) Started out with Clapton FC then moved to Leatherhead.

JESSICA DEHAAN (FIRST TEAM PHYSIO) Qualified therapist with previous experience in Rugby and NFL.

HORSHAM PLAYER PROFILES 2021-22

MITCHELL BEENEY – Mitch, son of former Brighton and Leeds 'keeper Mark, won England U19 caps while at the Chelsea Academy and played League Two football at Newport County and Crawley Town while on loan from the Blues. After his release by Chelsea in 2018, he went on to play for Sligo Rovers, Hartlepool and Cheshunt before joining Bowers & Pitsea, from whom he signed for Horsham this summer.



LUCA COCORACCHIO – Signed on dual terms from Worthing FC, Luca came through

the Rebels' academy before being snapped up by Brighton & Hove Albion, for whom he played from U18 through to U21 levels. Released by the Seagulls in 2020, he rejoined Worthing and helped them clinch the Isthmian League Premier Division title and reach the final of the Sussex Senior Cup last season.

TOM DAY – Tom is a former Crystal Palace and Barnet scholar who made his Football League debut for the Bees against Crawley Town on the final day of the 2015/16 season. Following loan spells at Staines Town and Hemel Hempstead, he joined the latter on a permanent basis at the end of 2017/18, later going on to play for Eastbourne Borough and Lewes, from whom he joined Horsham in the summer of 2020.

DANNY DUDLEY – Having spent his early career at Chipstead and Whyteleafe, Danny made his name at Corinthian-Casuals whom he helped reach the play-off final in 2017. A move to Carshalton Athletic proved even more successful as he captained the Robins to promotion to the Premier Division in 2018, spending three years at the club before joining Horsham in November 2020.

ALEX MALINS – A former Crawley Town youngster, Alex made his name at Lewes for whom, after initial loan spells, he signed on a permanent basis in 2015 and went on to amass a century of appearances for the Rooks, despite missing the 2018/19 season through injury. He joined Horsham in July 2021 but spent the second half of the campaign on loan at Whitehawk, where he scored twice in seventeen matches for the Brighton-based club. Alex has also played for Bognor Regis Town, Peacehaven & Telscombe and Horsham YMCA.

HARRY OSBORNE – Capable of playing anywhere across the back four, Harry started out at Charlton Athletic only to break his leg shortly after signing as a pro. Following a loan spell at Welling United, he joined the club on a permanent basis (via a stop at Sutton United) and made 14 National League appearances for the Wings before going on to appear for Hemel Hempstead Town, Bishop's Stortford and Merstham, playing a role in the latter reaching the Premier Division play-off final in 2019. Spent an injury-hit last season at Kingstonian, and a brief spell at Braintree Town, before making the switch to Horsham in the summer.

BOBBY PRICE – Bobby racked up almost 300 appearances during a near ten year stay at Carshalton Athletic that began as a 15 year old. After making his debut in 2013, his surging runs from deep and knack of scoring important goals made his name one of the first on the teamsheet. Although suffering relegation in his first season at the club, he went on to win a Division One South champions medal with the Robins in 2018 and reach the playoff semi-final a year later. Joined Horsham this summer.

CHRIS SESSEGNON – The brother of Spurs' Ryan and Fulham's Steven, Chris started out at Sutton United and had loan spells at Tooting and Kingstonian before joining Dover Athletic in 2012. Moves to Ebbsfleet, Eastbourne Borough and Whitehawk followed before going on to make more than 70 appearances for Margate in an injury-hit five year stay. He began last season at Carshalton Athletic but joined Horsham soon after, ending the season with a Velocity Trophy winners' medal.

HARVEY SPARKS – One of the best left-backs in the division, Harvey has been one of the club's most consistent performers since arriving from Bognor Regis Town in September 2018. A member of the successful Worthing side that won promotion to the Isthmian Premier Division in 2016, he repeated the feat with Horsham in 2019 and has since gone on to add a League Cup winners medal to his collection, as well as appear in the FA Cup first round.

JACK BRIVIO – After coming up through the ranks at Tonbridge Angels, Brivs' career at Longmead was cut short by an injury that sidelined him for over a year. Joining Isthmian Premier Division rivals Burgess Hill Town in 2016, he became a regular in the side for two seasons before switching to Horsham in September 2018 and captaining the Hornets to promotion to the Premier Division at the end of his first season, leading them to the FA Cup first round in 2021, and lifting the Velocity Trophy back in April.

ARCHIE BURNETT – Archie's career began in the youth ranks of Crystal Palace before joining the Bromley Academy, for whom he played at U15 and U16 level. He made his senior debut at the age of 17 for Margate, the first of fifteen appearances for the Gate, where he caught the eye of Tonbridge Angels. But his hopes of playing for the National League South side were dashed by the pandemic and, instead, he rejoined Bromley at the start of last season. With first team appearances limited, he was sent on loan to Cray Wanderers and then Leatherhead, with whom he ended the last campaign. Joined the Hornets after his release by Bromley this summer.

LEE HARDING – Lee has developed into one of the club's most important players since joining from Burgess Hill Town in 2018. An undoubted matchwinner on his day, he was deservedly named as the supporters' Player of the Season for 2021/22 having impressed not only down the right flank but also in an unaccustomed defensive role during the early part of the campaign. Lee had previously risen through the Hillians' ranks to win both Isthmian Youth and Isthmian League Division One South winners' medals in 2015.

CHARLIE HESTER-COOK – Charlie is a cultured midfielder who came through the Woking FC Academy before joining Leatherhead in search of regular playing time in May 2019. He was a near ever-present throughout the 2019/20 campaign, during which he was signed by Dorking Wanderers who promptly loaned him back to the Tanners for the remainder of the season. He joined Horsham on loan in August 2021, making the deal permanent at the end of the year. He has also had loan spells at Walton & Hersham and Westfield.

TOM KAVANAGH – Tom rose through the Sutton United youth ranks and played Conference South football for the Us, making 47 appearances for his local side before joining Canvey Island in 2012, via a couple of brief stints at Whitehawk and Met Police. He joined Kingstonian for the first of three spells at the start of the 2013/14 campaign and went on to spend four seasons at Merstham, during which he captained the club to the Isthmian Premier Division play-off final in 2019. He rejoined the Ks ahead of the 2019/20 campaign but made the switch to Horsham in the summer of 2021, scoring a number of important goals, including a spectacular winner against Woking that sent the Hornets through to the first round of the FA Cup.

TOM RICHARDS – Arguably the best crosser of the ball at the club, Tom started out as a full-back during a three year spell in the Fulham Youth setup, during which he made his professional debut on loan to AFC Wimbledon in 2014. He went on to have spells at Aldershot Town, Austria's FC Kitzbühel, Walton Casuals, Welling United and Leatherhead before joining Dorking Wanderers where he picked up an Isthmian Premier Division championship winners' medal in 2019 and helped them reach the National League South play-offs. Joined Kingstonian for the truncated 2020/21 campaign before making the switch to Horsham in the summer of 2021.

LUCAS RODRIGUES – Named as both the supporters' and Isthmian League Step 4 Player of the Season for 2019/20, Brazilian-born Lucas came up through the youth ranks at Whitehawk, making his debut as a 16 year old before going on to make over 150 appearances for the Brighton-based club. Joined Horsham in the summer of 2021, with his dazzling runs down the right flank quickly making him a crowd favourite. Finished his debut season with the Hornets with a Velocity Trophy winners' medal and a tally of six goals in 43 games.

DOUG TUCK – After a two year scholarship at Brighton & Hove Albion, Doug established himself at Bognor Regis Town where he made more than 300 appearances during a nine year stay. A composed midfielder whose contribution often goes under the radar, he reached the FA Trophy semi-finals with the Rocks in 2016 and was a member of the side that won promotion to the National League South in 2017/18. Scored the goal that won Bognor the Sussex Senior Cup in 2019 but is yet to find the mark for the Hornets since his arrival in the summer of 2020.

DANIEL AJAKAIYE – Dan was at West Ham United as a youngster but signed his first senior contract with Bromley, aged just 18, having scored 24 goals for the Ravens' academy. After brief loan spells at Grays Athletic and Whyteleafe, he moved on to Kingstonian before being enticed down to Hastings United, for whom he netted 34 times in 2018/19. His goalscoring exploits came to the attention of Havant & Waterlooville, who signed him ahead of the 2020/21 campaign, but he returned to Kingstonian at the start of last season, scoring 21 goals in 53 appearances prior to his summer switch to Horsham.

SHAMIR FENELON – Last season's top scorer, Shamir is a vastly experienced striker who started out at Brighton & Hove Albion and made two senior appearances for the club before being released in 2015. Whilst with the Seagulls, he was capped twice by the Republic of Ireland at U21 level and played in the Football League during loan spells at Torquay United, Rochdale, Tranmere Rovers and Dagenham & Redbridge. He joined Crawley Town in

2015 before going on to make close on 100 appearances for Aldershot Town, prior to stints at Maidenhead United and Billericay Town from whom he joined Horsham at the start of last season.

MO JUWARA – Mo started out in the Chelsea Academy before dropping in to non-league, first with Haywards Heath Town and then Lancing where he spent two Covid-interrupted seasons, culminating in the Lancers' promotion to the Isthmian League via the PPG ruling. Capable of playing anywhere down the left, he appeared briefly for Three Bridges and Farnborough at the start of the last campaign before returning to Culver Road for the remainder of the season. Joined Horsham this summer.

JACK MAZZONE – Jack is a proven goalscorer who has spearheaded the Met Police attack for the past four seasons, having started out in the Woking FC Academy. Got his first taste of senior football during loan spells with Chertsey and Hendon in 2011/12 before joining Godalming Town for a two year stay. Stints at Knaphill and Tooting & Mitcham followed but it was an impressive return of 32 goals for South Park in 2017/18 that prompted The Met to tempt him to Imber Court where he top scored in every season since his arrival. Made the switch to Horsham this summer.

EDDIE DSANE – On the books of Crystal Palace, Preston North End and Fleetwood Town as a youngster, Eddie moved to Ireland in search of regular first team football, first with Longford Town and then League of Ireland side Finn Harps, for whom he scored 4 times in 23 appearances. On returning to the UK, he had spells at Chipstead, Whyteleafe, Maldon & Tiptree and Leatherhead prior to joining Kingstonian, from whom he joined Horsham in September 2021.
