HARINGEY BOROUGH FC - A BRIEF HISTORY

It was not until 1970 that a team competed under the name of Haringey Borough when WOOD GREEN TOWN who had played at Coles Park since 1930 changed their name to Haringey Borough. A merger with EDMONTON FC resulted in a brief change of name to Edmonton & Haringey FC until 1976 when the present name was re-adopted. The merged Club played in the Athenian League until it ceased to operate at the end of the 1983/84 season and then played for 4 seasons in Division 2 North of the Isthmian League. After a period of instability culminating in a year in the wilderness away from Senior football in 1988/89 they were admitted to the Spartan League in 1989/90 retaining Premier Division membership throughout until the South Midlands League merger in season 1997/98 when they finished 7th in the Premier Division South to secure membership of the new "combined" Premier Division for 1998/99 as well as being runners up in the League's Premier Division Cup. In 2004 after an unsuccessful attempt to move the Club to the nearby New River Sports stadium and a walk out of the existing Committee Aki Achillea who had commenced his association with the Club in 1995 was appointed to lead the Club forward and together with George Kilikita and Secretary John Bacon the club sought to engage more with the local community and tap into the talent locally.



The senior men's team having been relegated to Division One of the Spartan South Midlands League in 2006/7 bounced back with promotion at the very first attempt and a fine season ended with both promotion and the winning of the Division One Cup. Back in the Premier Division for the season 2008/09 the Club again quickly found itself among the relegation strugglers leading to the appointment of the current Manager – the vastly experienced Tom Loizou. Tom and his excellent loyal team of coaching staff have been instrumental in turning around the Club's fortunes in the intervening years. In 2011/12 a highest ever 5th place was achieved and the League Challenge Trophy won. After massive stadium improvements in the close season with the erection of a new Clubhouse and new dressing rooms hopes were high for 2012/13 but the poor weather and the problematic pitch led to a massive fixture backlog which negated any chance of a serious challenge for honours and the Club finished 9th. In 2013/14 the Club's challenge for promotion took place in the Essex Senior League following a sideways switch imposed by the FA. The Club had what was then its most successful season ever finishing runners up by just a solitary point to Great Wakering Rovers and ended the season with 20 wins and one draw from the final 21 League games. The League title was nevertheless secured at the second attempt in 2014/15 with a haul of 103 points from 38 games and with it promotion to Step 4 in which we were allocated to the Ryman League Division One North. The first season at the higher level was a baptism of fire when only 7 points were garnered from the first 17 games but by the close of the season a further 43 points had been amassed from the remaining 29 games and the Club finished in a comfortable 15th place. The first season in the FA Trophy produced two fine victories before a replay loss to Hitchin Town of the Evostik South Premier Division. The summer of 2016 saw yet further investment in the close season in the form of a 3G synthetic main pitch and added improvements to the perimeter, the spectator rails and the floodlights and has created a facility of which the Club can be proud; and has afforded a greater opportunity for the Club to move forward in all aspects. The first team in 2016/17 improved markedly on the previous season and had an excellent all round campaign although rather unfortunate not to finish the season on a high having ended with the "double heartbreak" of missing out on promotion through a 4-5 closely fought semi final play-off defeat at Maldon & Tiptree FC after finishing 5th in the Division and an odd goal 2-3 London Senior Cup semi-final loss at Metropolitan Police. But 2017/18 was to be the Club's best ever and culminated in promotion to Step 3 via the play-off route with a 3-1 win over Canvey Island after automatic promotion had been missed by just two points. And in FA Competitions the 4th and final round of the Qualifying rounds for the FA Cup was reached, although that ended in disappointment with a 2-4 home defeat by Heybridge Swifts who then enjoyed a visit to Exeter City in the First Round Proper. In the FA Trophy we went right through the qualifying campaign and were lucky enough to draw Leyton Orient in the First Round Proper which brought a record attendance of 1,133 to Coles Park and "The O's" left mightily relieved at having come back to win 2-1 after going a goal down in the fifth minute. 2018/19 was another great but ultimately disappointing season with an FA Cup run which took us into the First Round Proper

where it was ended rather cruelly by AFC Wimbledon's last minute goal at Coles Park in front of a record crowd of 2,710. Having led the Premier Division for several weeks in mid-season it was somewhat surprising that we dropped from 2nd to 3rd on the last day of the season after a poor late run but still enjoyed home advantage in the Play-Off Semi-final in which a 45 minute second half onslaught on the Tonbridge Angels goal produced only one goal in response to the two they had scored before the interval. The 2019/20 season's early termination was less of a disappointment for us than for most other Isthmian Premier Division Clubs as we were marooned in mid-table with no realistic prospect of entering either the promotion or relegation zones. The highlight of the season should have been the visit of National League Yeovil Town in the Final Qualifying Round of the Emirates FA Cup but, as is well known, appalling crowd behaviour brought that game to an early end and the second game seemed something of an anti-climax. In fact, without making excuses, that unpleasant episode seems to have adversely affected our players for some time for, whereas we had been well in the promotion places mix, thereafter we just drifted downwards. The early termination of League Fixtures for 2020/21 was more of a blow than was the previous seasons voiding as we were well placed to make a charge towards a play-off place at least. However the Buildbase FA Trophy continued and we enjoyed a run through to the 4th Round Proper when Oxford City of the National League South finally eliminated us 4-2 after we had been two up; en route we had overcome Faversham Town, Bishops Stortford, Eastbourne Borough and Dartford, the last two also being National League South Clubs. The London Senior Cup also carried on and due to withdrawals, we reached the quarter-final without playing a game but lost a penalty shoot out to Hanwell Town after a 2-2 draw. The 2021/22 season was more or less a non-event as regards any real challenge for the League top spots but the semi-finals of The League Cup and the London Senior Cup were reached with both game ending in odd goal defeats in the space of a week. We may well have set a Club record for the highest number of injuries sustained in any season and that even led to an outside chance of relegation towards the end of the season but the failings of others meant we were never in serious danger.

The foundations are in place for an eventual assault on the title to secure a National League place for the men's senior side and an exciting season is in prospect in which a challenge for at least a Play-off position is a realistic prospect as we pursue our ambition to achieve promotion to the National League which should be within the capabilities of our talented squad. The facilities and structures are in place for all the Club's teams to improve and enhance on recent successes.

2016/17 saw the introduction of a much needed "second" team, formed to compete in the Ryman Development League it being basically intended for Under 21 players but with the facility to include up to 4 older players in every squad. The team held their own comfortably in the League finishing a very creditable 6th place and the benefits of the Club's participation were all too evident with the introduction of a number of players into the first team squad throughout the season and the opportunity for first team squad players to keep fresh and those who were returning from injury had a platform to get fit. Thereby proving the benefits of having such a side. The age restriction was amended to Under 23 for 2017/18 and the team has always been near the top of the table, continued to do well in the following seasons and won the North Division Championship in 2021/22 but lost to South Division Champions Hastings United in the "Champion of Champions" play off.

Youth teams were commenced and run successfully for many years at various age levels with some considerable success particularly at the older age groups including progress into the 2nd round proper of the FA Youth Cup in 2006/07. They were Divisional winners of the Southern Counties Floodlit Youth League in 2004/05 (and also winners of the League's Colwyn Cup competition) and 2009/10. After a few seasons absence from Youth football the Under 18s rejoined the Southern Counties competition in 2017/18, winning its Divisional Championship at the first attempt and finishing towards the top of the table in the following seasons. This will again provide a pathway for talented local boys to make their way into the first team squad and ultimately the first team itself.

The Women's Team was formed in 1999 and competed in the Eastern Region Womens League winning promotion in its first season and then to its Premier Division for 2002/03; and there they have remained save for two seasons, the first being in 2011/12 following relegation to Division 1 from which they made an immediate Premier Division return as runners-up. Steady improvement began and we were extremely fortunate to have been approached midway through the 2014/15 season by renowned coach and former

professional footballer Steve Browne who at the time was involved in the highly successful S & T Academy Girls football. Steve was duly appointed Manager and preserved the Women's Premier Division status. In 2015/16 a mid table position was easily secured from an uneven campaign which included convincing away wins at the top 2 Clubs and some surprisingly disappointing performances against lower placed teams. In 2017/18, by Christmas the team were runaway League leaders only to be thrown off course by the tragic early death of Steve on New Years Day but after a shaky period the Women re-asserted themselves to win the League Championship on the last day of the season and with it, promotion to the Women's Premier League and followed that up by adding the League Cup with a 5-1 win over Cambridge City to complete the double which was a fitting, lasting legacy for their Manager. The loss of many of the successful squad, several to American University Scholarships, proved too much of a handicap at the higher level and relegation back to the Eastern Regional League was an unsurprising outcome. Now under the stewardship of Bobby Cato significant steps forward seem certain and promotion is again a realistic prospect. An exceptionally young and talented squad was unlucky to find itself in danger of relegation towards the end of the 2021/22 season due to a high number of odd goal defeats but pulled clear with 4 vital points from the last two games. They look capable of going places if they stick together when experience is added to their armoury.

HISTORY OF LEWES FC



The Early Years

Lewes Football Club was formed following a meeting at The Royal Oak pub on 23 September 1885. For the first eight years, the players wore light green shirts which were designed to reflect the scenery of the surrounding South Downs, but black and red finally became the club colours in 1893.

The club has played at the Dripping Pan ever since, apart from a couple of seasons prior to the First World War when the club was banished to the adjoining Convent Field. The early years of the club produced only mediocre results and successes were few and far between. In 1920, Lewes became founder members of the Sussex County League.

1960s

Progress was slow and despite four runners-up places, by the 1960s Lewes had only one Sussex RUR Cup win to their name. In 1965, the club's fortunes changed dramatically, winning the County League title for the first time with a massive nine-point lead over runners-up Lancing, as well as both the RUR and Sussex Senior Cups.

Lewes became members of the Athenian League and after winning the Division 2 title in 1968, promotion to the Premier Division was gained just two years later when the Division 1 title was snatched from Boreham Wood, with a further Sussex Senior Cup triumph added in 1971. Six years later, the club entered the newly expanded Isthmian League.

1980s

Promotion to Division 1 soon followed although two sixth-place finishes in 1982 and 1989 were the highest positions attained in Division 1. During that time, Lewes reached the final of the Sussex Senior Cup on three occasions, and won the trophy in 1984/85.

1990s

Disaster struck in 1990/91 when Lewes were relegated for the first time in their history. An immediate return as runners-up to Purfleet followed, but that success was short-lived and relegation in successive years meant that by the 1994/95 season the club was down in Division Three.

The slide continued and the first season in the basement division would have been the last in the league if it hadn't been for Cove who conveniently propped-up the league and saved Lewes from automatic demotion. The club survived rather than thrived until the 1998/99 season when Jimmy Quinn joined as manager, and at the first attempt missed out on promotion by just one place. Midway through the 1999/2000 season Martin Elliott and a new board of Directors stepped in and immediately the fortunes of the club began to improve, with the capture of the Sussex Senior Cup in 2001 following victory over Bognor Regis.

Naughties (2000s)

There was mixed news on the pitch. The pinnacle of the Men's team's achievement, and what a pinnacle, was to gain promotion to the top of the non-League pyramid in 2007/8. However, the Rooks only lasted one season in the top flight as the Global Credit Crisis hit and funds dried up. The Rooks' new economic reality saw them drop down the divisions.

However, a brand new Women's team was started by Jacquie Agnew and underwent a dramatic rise from park football to the Women's Combination.

A New Dawn (2010s)

Behind the scenes, a group of six supporters calling themselves Rooks125 were working hard to take the club into community ownership having witnessed the serious financial problems that had befallen the club, despite the owners' best efforts.

Finally on July 8th 2010, Lewes FC was officially transferred out of private ownership into a mass-ownership Community Benefit Society called Lewes Community Football Club, consisting of benefactors and members of the former Management Committee.

The six members of Rooks125 formed the inaugural Executive Board, working as volunteers to install improved working practices and procedures during the season before planning to open up the wider ownership of LCFC to all the club's supporters in 2011/12. The first chairman of the Community Club was appointed in 2013 with club legend Terry Parris taking up the position. Terry was succeeded by Stuart Fuller in 2015. All Board positions now are elected by the whole Ownership base.

In the summer of 2017 the club hit the headlines globally when it announced that it would pay our Men's and Women's squads the same – a first for any semi/professional club in the world. Under the Equality FC

banner, the club attracted a number of partners who shared the same beliefs and vision for gender equality in sport.

On the pitch, restricted resources saw the team drop two Leagues, down to Step 4 but under Darren Freeman they gained promotion as runners-up in the Isthmian League South in 2017/18, then came within a whisker of a play-off spot in the Isthmian Premier the following season.


The Lewes Women's side were given a place in the inaugural Women's Championship, the second tier of English football playing alongside sides such as Manchester United, Leicester City and Tottenham Hotspur. In December 2018 they attracted a record attendance when nearly 2,000 fans saw them host Manchester United at the Pan.

So where are we now?

Freeman stepped down in October 2019 after four years in charge to concentrate on his footballing career away from management and after a period when his former assistants Ross Standen and Tony Coade led the side, Hugo Langton took over the hotseat in February 2020, leading the team to 16th spot before the COVID-19 pandemic curtailed the season.

In April 2021, the Club appointed Tony Russell as manager and former Lewes player Joe Vines as his assistant. Their appointment and unique playing style brought new impetus to the Rooks who finished just four points outside the play off places in 2021/22 and have much to look forward to in 2022/23.

The club is building a solid foundation on which to build for the future. It has around 2,000 Owners and has gained a great reputation for all its community work and stand-out marketing especially with the continued stance on pay equality and committed stance against the harms of gambling advertisement in football.

Whatever the outcome this afternoon we hope everyone will depart having enjoyed witnessing or participating in an exciting evening's sport and have a safe journey home.

This will be the 7th meeting of the Clubs since we regained Isthmian status in 2015 and outcomes have been:-

Prior to that it was in the sixties and seventies that matches between the Clubs last took place when there were seven seasons in which both Clubs were in the same Division of the Athenian League. Firstly for three seasons starting in 1965/66 with the Edmonton half of our subsequently merged Club when such games were played at the Barrass Stadium; and then four more starting in 1973/74 by which time the merged Club was playing under the name of Edmonton & Haringey and playing at Coles Park with the final season 1976/77 being the first following the adoption of the name Haringey Borough

Last Saturdays nail biting 1-0 win at Bognor Regis Town bore an uncanny resemblance to our only other League win at Carshalton Athletic. Same result, same first half scorer (Anthony Mendy), same frantic finale in which it just beggared belief that the ball did not enter our net twice in the last few minutes and indebtedness to a post for the clean sheet. A match report by a neutral later in the programme. The win lifted us to 12th in the table and reduced the deficit to the final play off spot to 7 points. By no means an impossible task but the putting together of a successful run cannot be much longer delayed so lets hope that today we will build on last weeks endeavours and be the next instalment of a lengthy run. Lewes arrive one place below us in 13th but with a game in hand. So tight is the middle of the table that a win today could lift us to 8th place and defeat drop us to 16th.obviously dependant on the results of the other games which are:-

For our second "local Derby" in the space of four days we fielded a team with 3 changes to the starting line up following the disappointing loss to Potters Bar Town. A match of fluctuating fortunes opened quite cagily with both teams probing for weaknesses and it was the visitors who took the lead after 13 minutes when Marcus Wyllie was allowed too much space down his left wing and he raced inside to finish confidently. Borough did not immediately raise their game in response but by mid-half had stepped up several gears as they tore into their opponents with increasing determination and by the interval they were deservedly level at half time thanks to Anthony Mendy being in the right place to finish off from close range a flowing move down the left. We did not ease off after the interval with Chaynie Burgin being a constant thorn in the side of the visitors defence and absorbing much of their attention. It took 22 minutes for us to take the lead as Kaylen Hinds fired us ahead. But only 5 minutes later Enfield were back on level terms when a free kick on the stand side just a few yards from the corner of the penalty box was flashed home via the head of Lewis Knight. It immediately became clear that neither side wanted the lottery of a penalty shoot out with caution largely abandoned and play opened out with non stop end to end endeavour but no breakthrough could be achieved, although we were grateful to a post for thwarting the nearest either side came to a winner. Frantic efforts intensified throughout the four minutes of added time but penalties could not be avoided. Things started badly for Borough as after Enfield had blasted home the first we missed our chance to level. Enfield then sent their second over the bar but our elation was short lived as Johnny Ashman's was saved but a reprieve was quickly to hand as the referee ruled that the 'keeper had moved forward off his line before the kick was taken and Johnny despatched his retry into the same corner with enough power to defeat the keeper even though he dived the right way. From that point on Borough were in the ascendancy as the third Enfield kick also sailed over the bar enabling Chaynie to crash the ball home with un stoppable force even though the 'keeper again went the right way. Enfield did equalise with their 4th kick but Callum Ismail coolly fired us back into the lead. Enfield netted their 5th making ours the opportunity to win and up stepped William Dupray to unfussily settle the tie with a low drive just inside the 'keepers right hand post – where Johnny had placed his efforts – but this time the 'keeper went the wrong way. And thus we moved into the last 8 and earned the A10 bragging rights, at least until the New Year when Town will be visiting us again for the first match in 2023 seeking vital League points to bolster their National League ambitions. Obviously we too have our own sights on such an achievement and it is to be hoped that by then we will have narrowed the 8 point gap between Enfield who held 5th place at the time of the Cup game and Borough, then 14th although at the end of the evening the League win of Bognor Regis Town had pushed us down to 15th. What a ding-dong that promises to be so don't miss it - January 2nd is the date for your diary and we anticipate that this will be our biggest gate of the season get there early to avoid the risk of missing the opening skirmishes.

**Haringey Borough headed to the coast- and left with three points,
as Bognor were the architects of their own downfall**

The last time we walked into Nyewood Lane to report on a match, the pandemic wasn't even on the horizon. Returning today, for Bognor Regis Town's match with Haringey Borough in Pitching In Isthmian Premier, the old ground looks rather different.

Whilst the pandemic stopped two seasons, the Rocks used their spare time wisely- with an enormous amount of help from the community. The club launched an appeal for cash in June 2020, hoping to raise thirty thousand pounds which would help finance ground improvements and ensure that they could continue to support their senior football setup and their twenty seven junior teams. A few months later and the total donated has passed the fifty thousand pounds mark, and a quick look around today demonstrates the difference that cash has made.

Where there used to be two old, mismatched and rickety stands down one side of the pitch, one of them with particularly poor sightlines, there is now one gleaming green structure in its place, comfortable and with

great views unless you sit behind someone who is six feet four. The uncovered terrace at one end of the ground adjacent to the clubhouse- 'Seasons Bar'- has been revamped with a roof, improving the atmosphere and the wellbeing of those who used to stand there and get rather wet when the rain rolled in over the sea. There is a 'Wall of Thanks' to those who donated, a lovely touch and a permanent reminder of the generosity of a town which is far from being one of the wealthiest places in the county- and, perhaps a reminder that whilst Bognor and Worthing both launched appeals at around the same time, and both were incredibly successful, the Rocks made more money. Not that the two clubs are at all competitive!

On the pitch, things have remained rather constant over the past three and a half seasons. When the pandemic hit, the Rocks were eighth, nine points away from a play off spot. The 20-21 season had hardly started when it stopped, but the Rocks were fourteenth, and last season saw a ninth place finish. We came into today's match with them sitting in eleventh place, seven points away from the top five.

And yet, there was no shortage of optimism around Nyewood Lane. This is a rather cheerful place- always welcoming, with a large number of committed and friendly folks who don't get too excited by a good run nor too downhearted when things don't go so well- however four consecutive wins had made them start to look upwards. Corinthian-Casuals, Haywards Heath Town, Lewes and Bowers & Pitsea had been vanquished- albeit in three different competitions- over the last few weeks, and the side looked to be finally putting together a consistent run of form. More than that, with only one home defeat Nyewood Lane was beginning to look like the fortress the home faithful would expect it to be.

The only downside, if trends and superstitions are perhaps your thing, was that today's visitors were a bit of a bogey team for the Rocks. Haringey Borough were not the best of opponents to roll into town when you're trying to build a winning run, as the Sussex side had won only one of their previous seven meetings with the club from White Hart Lane. That solitary victory was

here, back in September 2019, when Tommy Leigh and Jimmy Muitt got the goals in a two-nil win, Scott Durojaiye dismissed late on for the visitors. Borough arrived this afternoon four places and only one point behind their hosts, and their vociferous fans were determined to make far more noise than their numbers would suggest whilst supporting their team- something they are very good at whilst at home, too.

The teams ran out under an overcast sky. The wind was whipping across the pitch, and the weather was reminding us that, despite the World Cup being on, it is actually the end of November. But at least it wasn't raining- yet. Both sides wore their home kit, green and white for the hosts, yellow and blue for the visitors.

Borough got us underway and immediately launched the ball forward, which was the cue for the visiting fans to launch into song. They also hung up two flags, one, initially upside down, proclaiming that its owners were 'Haringey Borough- Sussex Branch'- so at least someone had a short journey. Within two minutes the visitors were whipping in a free kick, the follow up shot needing to be cleared off the line- and within seven minutes they were ahead, a poor pass from a Rocks defender intercepted by Anthony Mendy, who charged forward and looked to have given himself too narrow an angle, but somehow found the net nonetheless. The home fans awoke and began to bang a drum, but their side was behind nonetheless, and the Borough hordes responded with The Lion Sleeps Tonight, because they "always sing away." They always sing at home, too.

At the other end, Nathan Odokonyero looked very lively, as you might expect from a striker who already had sixteen goals this season. He had the first chance for his side on twelve minutes, and perhaps should have done better, firing too close to Luke Mewitt and allowing the Borough keeper to palm the ball away.

Another Borough break on seventeen minutes could have seen them double their lead, but from just outside

the box Alphonso Kennedy shot straight at Toby Steward. But it was a worrying time for the home fans, because most of the Borough possession was coming from their side's defensive errors.

It was Bognor who were next to press, and they looked good going forward, Odokonyero and Luke Robinson particularly impressive. The difficulty the hosts had was the speed of the Borough break every time they regained possession; particularly with Mendy seemingly having a speed advantage down the left every time the ball came his way, which was often.

On twenty four minutes the visitors were forced into a change, Kennedy limping off to be replaced by Johnny Ashman, who was quickly in the thick of the action. The game had slowed, Borough happy to contain their hosts and look to break, rather like England v USA last night only with more entertainment. When Bognor did get forward crosses tended to be overhit- and at this point we could make another England v USA analogy but we suspect you've already got the point. Tom Bragg forced a save from Mewitt- another Bognor shot straight at the keeper- and it began to drizzle.

Four minutes before the break a neat passing move for the hosts ended with Isaac Olaniyan receiving the ball at the edge of the box. He looked up, took aim, and fired well over the bar. It was the story of their first half; lots of pretty passing with no quality end product. The referee somehow found four minutes to add as if he thought he should keep time Qatari-style, and it gave us more entertainment than the previous forty five, chances at both ends and almost an own goal, Josh McCormick cannoning an attempted clearance off the inside of his own post.

The second half started and the pattern of the first continued, Bognor having most of the possession but not looking like they really knew what to do with it. The crowd was announced as six hundred and thirty three, and most of them watched on in a depressed silence. They were almost even more depressed on fifty minutes, Mendy forcing a fine save from Steward- another chance which came from a Rocks error. They stormed up the other end, however, and Mewitt was forced into a save, too- although his was a great deal easier. The Rocks made a change, new signing Hani Berchiche replacing Sam De St Croix, and immediately they look more of an attacking threat, putting the visiting goal under pressure. A cross from Olaniyan only needed to be forced home, but somehow wasn't, and a corner quickly followed- but it was a terrible corner, a grass cutter which was easily cleared, to the groans and moans of the home support. Another corner on the hour was similarly wasted, and despite all the home possession they remained behind. On sixty three minutes a third corner failed to beat the man at the front post, and Olaniyan fired a shot over the bar from the edge of the box whilst the crowd wondered if anyone ever practiced taking set pieces.

Olaniyan came off, Tom Chalaye came on, and the home faithful turned to prayer, whilst the visitors kept up a rhythmic "come on Borough-" and kept warm at the same time. "Sing if you're Haringey, sing if you're happy that way," came next, with apologies to Tom Robinson and his band. They were given something else to sing about on seventy three minutes, as Chaynie Fage-Burgin fired home, but he was clearly offside even without the benefit of seven people operating VAR. Bognor decided that as their long corners had been rubbish they'd try short corners, which were only

marginally better. Mewitt caught a cross from a second of those and went down in pain, to the chagrin of the home fans who felt he was time wasting. After treatment he recovered, and launched the ball downfield, causing many in the main stand to proclaim a miracle cure.

A good run from McCormick down the right and an intelligent pull back saw the ball fired into a crowded box, and groans, as it somehow evaded everyone. Ten minutes to go, Borough still hanging on- but they could have got a second when a break and a cross from the left just needed a finish, but didn't get one. "This makes England look exciting," moaned a home fan from the back of the stand, as the visitors tried to add more excitement, another cross only lacking a finish.

With two minutes to go we thought we had an equaliser. Tom Chalaye charged into the box, put the ball across the box and it needed only a touch at the back post. Celebrations were about to start, but somehow it didn't go in, Berchiche unable to get a toe on it. A break, and up the other end Fage-Burgin hit the bar, whilst Borough manager Tom Loizou asked whether anyone in the crowd had a spare pacemaker. Five added minutes were announced. Another Bognor attack, another cross, and it looked like the hosts couldn't miss- but unwilling to change the plot at this late stage, they did. "Just put the ball between the two white sticks," shouted a home fan who felt basic instructions were required.

The game finally came to an end, and the visiting fans celebrated, whilst the Rocks faithful complained audibly across the ground. They'd perhaps had seventy percent of possession, and yet they got from the game exactly what they deserved. Bognor's Borough hoodoo continues, and the North Londoners headed back to White Hart Lane with three points having executed their game plan perfectly. It wasn't pretty to watch, but the visitors won't care.

So it is hoped there will be a good turnout of those supporters who do not feel inclined to undertake the trip to South London.

The proceeds of the 50/50 draws are passed on to the Womens team to help with its running costs, which are quite considerable for a League which embraces Clubs as far apart as the North Norfolk coast and the Thames Estuary, and is much appreciated. Those supporters who attended both the Saturday defeat by Potters Bar Town and this well merited victory will have noted that the money has certainly gone to a deserving cause.

ESSENTIAL READING FOR FOLLOWERS OF THE NATIONAL GAME

LAST week, NLP editor Matt Badcock spoke in his column about the alarming trend of fan misbehaviour which is sadly creeping into our game.

Believe me, it's not something we take any enjoyment from, but it came to a head one Saturday night as we were preparing to put the paper to bed.

The original plan was to celebrate a National League record crowd at Notts County when a massive 16,511 supporters clicked through the turnstiles to see the Magpies take on Yeovil Town.

On the same day, there were over 10,000 watching Wrexham play Aldershot Town and another 7,000+ crowd at Chesterfield for the crunch clash with Solihull Moors.

So, you can imagine our angst when instead of 16,511 fans making the front page headlines it the actions of just one idiot who stole the limelight.

About an hour before we went to press, a video was brought to our attention of a so-called Guiseley 'fan' jumping over the barrier of Warrington Town's Cantilever Park ground and switching the water bottle of Wire keeper Tony Thompson which was nestled into the net.

It then emerged that the bottle in question had apparently been contaminated with urine. Thompson drank it and then approached the alleged perpetrator, prompting him to be sent off.

The front page headline 'Disgusting' said it all.

While, thankfully, this is a one-off incident it has once again raised concerns of bad fans' behaviour, which is dragging the pure reputation Non-League football through the mud.

With the Premier League and Championship on hold for the World Cup, Non-League clubs up and down the country have worked extremely hard putting on special deals, trying to pack their bars and clubhouses for people to watch the action in Qatar and to generally propel this level of the game into the wider spotlight. A celebration of Non-League football if you like.

As Matt rightly pointed out, the frustration is these incidents don't appear to be isolated. On a number of occasions this season we've had to report unsavoury instances of poor behaviour inside football grounds.

At the start of the season, the Football Association and leagues issued a document to clubs in an attempt to help eradicate some of the issues.

The problem is, what can clubs do to prevent it? Guiseley handled this particular incident expertly well. They immediately banned the young man involved and vowed to clamp down on any accomplices. They deserve credit for their own swift action on what would have been a difficult weekend for them.

Unfortunately, preventative methods are having consequences on the terraces – and it's a real sad state of affairs. Clubs such as Walsall Wood and Prescot Cables are refusing entry for under 16s without a supervised adult and at Coalville Town the ground staff are even wearing body cams in a bid to identify persistent offenders.

As necessary as measures like that are, they represents everything that Non-League football shouldn't. We should be encouraging the support of the younger generation and we certainly shouldn't have to follow them round the ground on camera. Sadly, it's needs must.

It seems that the pure nature of a Non-League ground makes it an easy target. While elite stadiums are regimented so fans are confined to one seat and one entry/exit gate, a Non-League ground gives fans the freedom to wander around and sit or stand where they want. That is being taken advantage of.

Don't get me wrong, 99 per cent of football fans, and Non-League fans in general, are decent folk. They just there to watch a game, support the club and enjoy the day. It's vital we don't tar everyone with the same brush.

Record numbers are turning to Non-League football for its integrity and its purity. Let's not let the proud reputation of our game be ruined by the few.

GEORGIOS ARESTI – Cypriot International midfielder who numbers AEK Athens among his previous Clubs; 2017/18 deadline day signing and near automatic selection last season.

JOHNNY ASHMAN – close season signing from East Thurrock United. A wide midfielder who scored ten goals in 46 appearances for “the Rocks” last season (including one against us). Has also appeared for Aveley, Barking, Witham Town, Clapton and Cheshunt.

DANIEL BOATENG – much travelled former Arsenal defender just signed by us. Last Club was National League South Welling United. Clubs in Romania, Sweden, Scotland and Bosnia & Herzegovina among his previous berths.

CHAYNIE BURGIN – tall rangy striker signed in the close season after a year with three Essex Clubs - Woodford Town, Maldon & Tiptree and National league Braintree Town.

LEWIS BYRNE-HEWITT – a well travelled forward signed in the close season; made debut in friendly with Chelmsford City and scored within 5 minutes. With Coggeshall Town at the end of last season and before that with Brightlingsea Regent, Witham Town, Bishop’s Stortford, Ware, VCD Athletic, Whyteleafe, Billericay Town, Norwich City Under 18s and Arsenal Under 18s.

SAMUEL COOK – tall strong central defender making a challenge for a first team starting berth having just returned from a spell with German Clubs. Has made several starts after a number of substitute appearances.

KWAME DANSO – tall, commanding central defender signed in the close season. As a youth player had spells with West Ham United and Crystal Palace and is still under 20. Was with Hackney Wick last season.

CHRISTOS DJAMAS – Cypriot Under 21 International signed in October 2020. Midfielder who was most recently on contract at Othello Athienoy and previously with Apoel Nicosia and Agia Napa.

JORGE DJASSI-SAMBU – midfield powerhouse now in 7th season with Club; opponents know when they have been tackled by this non-stop box to box player. Dangerous in opponents box at set piece situations.

MICHEAL AWAAH DOME-BEMWIN – defensive midfielder with experience in Spanish, Cypriot and Swedish football. Lewes, Whitehawk, Enfield Town and Braintree Town are among the English Clubs he has played for – all but Lewes after his last spell abroad.

WILLIAM DUPRAY – tall, strong defensive midfielder in his second spell at Borough. Signed in the close season having been with Ware last season. A much travelled player who has had spells at Northwood, Corinthian Casuals, Bracknell Town, Harlow Town, Wingate & Finchley, Welwyn Garden City, Chalfont St. Peter, Cambridge City and Scunthorpe United.

SCOTT DUROJAIYE – a familiar name who re-joined us this season. “Olu” is a very experienced and widely travelled midfielder with experience at several National League sides including Hungerford Town, Welling United, Braintree Town, Maidstone United, Woking, Dartford and most recently Peterborough Sports for which Club he played two games earlier this season and is now dual registered.

ANDRONICOS GEORGIU – mid season signing; a forward who graduated from Stevenage Academy and played in their EFL team. Last season was with Wycombe Wanderers. Has also been loaned to Kings Langley, St. Albans City and Middlesbrough Under 23s.

STEFANOS GEORGIU – younger brother of Andronicos signed from St. Margaretsbury a few days before the Registration deadline; a right sided midfielder who immediately looked at home at this higher level of the game.

KAYLEN HINDS – dangerous striker who moved on from Arsenal Under 23s and a loan to Stevenage to play in Germany for VFL Wolfsburg and Greuther Furth. Returned to England in August 2019 firstly with Watford and then Aldershot Town, Welling United and finally in January this year with Hayes & Yeading United.

CALLUM ISMAIL – skilful young full back previously with Bowers and Pitsea who joined us in September 2018 and after establishing himself in the Under 23s and on the bench made his first start in December 2019.

ALPHANSO KENNEDY – Goalscoring winger signed in close season. Was with Wingate & Finchley last season and also played for FC Romania; played against us when we lost 1-0 at Wingate & Finchley on August Bank Holiday Monday 2019.

NATHAN KPEMOU – tall powerful central defender or wide midfielder who has come through our Under 18 and 23 ranks and patiently awaited his opportunity; when injuries gave him his chance he seized it and he will not easily relinquish his starting place status.

MEKHI LEACOCK-McLEOD – wide attacking midfielder who has just re-joined us from Farnborough; also numbers Halifax Town, Accrington Stanley, Eastleigh and Romford among his previous berths and Fulham, Wolverhampton Wanderers and Glasgow Rangers at Under 23 level.

ANTHONY MENDY – close season signing whom netted 25 goals for Uxbridge last season and three in our first two pre-season friendlies. A much travelled player who has been with Wingate & Finchley, Bedford Town, Beaconsfield Town, Leatherhead, Enfield Town, Chalfont St. Peter, AFC Hayes, Slough Town and Maidenhead United and has also played in Italy.

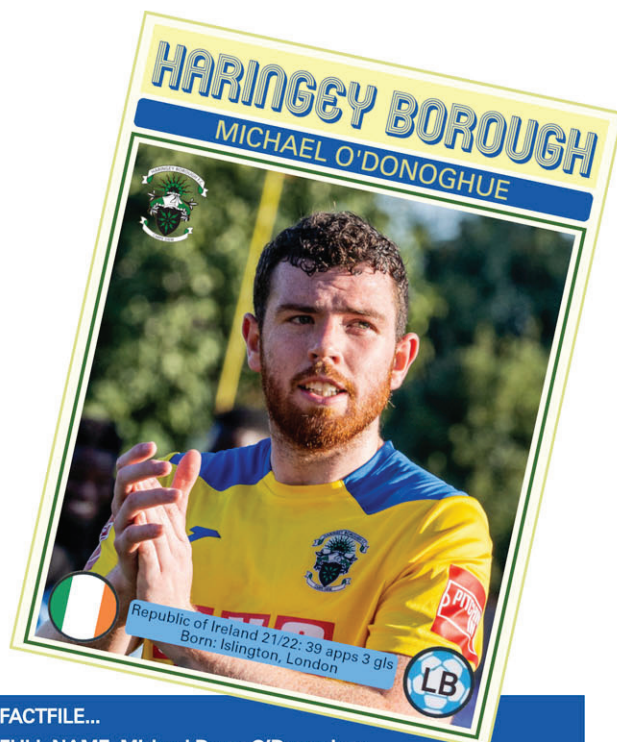

LEWES FC PLAYER PROFILES 2021-22



GOALKEEPER

LEWIS CAREY - An ever-present between the sticks in 2021/22, Carey previously played for us in the 2018/19 season winning Supporters Player of the Season. Lewis came through the youth ranks at Bristol City, and is an experienced non-league keeper having appeared for Bromley, Tonbridge Angels, Eastbourne Borough and Cray Wanderers.

DEFENDERS

MARCEL ELVA-FOUNTAIN - A technical and strong right back, Marcel progressed through the youth ranks at Reading, joining Burnley's U23 side in 2020. He signed with Hayes & Yeading in November 2021 and joined Aldershot Town in August 2022 before heading to the Rooks on loan.

MITCHELL NELSON - An experienced and gifted centre back, Mitchell started his career at Bournemouth and subsequently played for Eastleigh, Sutton United, Margate, Dulwich Hamlet, Welling United, Tonbridge Angels and Cray Wanderers. Mitchell has previously played for the club joining on loan from Bournemouth in the 2010/11 season. Appeared 34 times for the Rooks in 21/22.

WILL SALMON - Salmon began his career with Aldershot Town before moving to AFC Wimbledon and then Ebbsfleet United in the Conference in 2009. He won the Conference North title with AFC Telford then moved to Bath City in 2013. He will be a familiar name to Isthmian League fans after long spells at Met Police and Leatherhead. He was an ever present in the last aborted campaign for the Tanners. Joined on loan in October 2021 and the move became permanent in November 2021. Salmon made 30 appearances in the red and black during the 2021/22 season, scoring the winning goal in the away fixture at Folkestone in March.

ALFIE YOUNG - The ball playing centre back played over 100 games for Worthing before departing for Potters Bar Town in October 2021. Alfie joined Kingstonian in late January 2022, making 15 league appearances for The K's joining the Rooks in August 2022.

KENNY YAO - Predominately a right-back but comfortable across the defence, the former Charlton player joined us in the summer from Dartford. An injury in November limited Kenny's league appearances to 17 although he returned as regular starter towards the end of the season.

TOM CHAMPION - A commanding centre back, Tom started his professional career at Barnet, subsequently joining Bishop's Stortford before moving on to Dartford and was an ever-present in their promotion to the National League in 2012/13. In 2013, he moved to Cambridge United, once again achieving promotion, this time to League Two. In 2015, Tom rejoined Barnet for a second spell for two seasons followed by four seasons in the National League with Boreham Wood and a season at Woking from whom he joins us. Tom is the Rooks captain for 2022/23.

JAMIE MASCOLL - An attacking full back who has previously played for Charlton, Wycombe Wanderers and Bolton in the Football League. Played for Wealdstone in the National League in the 2021/22 season and joined The Rooks in October 2022.

JOHNVILLE RENEE - A versatile player who can play right back, right midfield or in the middle of the park, Johnville started his career with Stoke City, AFC Wimbledon, Coclchester and Leyton Orient's youth teams. Had several spells with Maldon & Tiptree and Bishop's Stortford as well as a single season with Braintree Town in the National South. Joined Lewes after a short spell with Maldon & Tiptree at the start of the 2022/23 season.

MIDFIELDERS

AYO OLUKOGA - Joined in the summer of 2021 following a string of impressive pre-season performances. The midfielder made 19 appearances for the Rooks before departing for Whitam Town in January 2022. Rejoined the Rooks in late March for the season run in.

RAZZAQ COLEMAN DE-GRAFT - A technical and powerful player, Razzaq can play in a front three and as left back, the former Hampton & Richmond Borough player joined the Rooks following a series of impressive performances in pre-season and was a standout performer for the Rooks as the 2021/22 season progressed.

DESHANE DALLING - A rapid and tricky winger, Dalling joined us in December 2021 and was one of the the Rooks top performers in the final quarter of the season, producing several talismanic performances.

Deshane started his senior career at Queen's Park Rangers and spent time on loan with Cork City and Wealdstone whilst with The Hoops. After leaving QPR, Dalling had a short spell at Hemel Hempstead and then Dartford before heading to The Dripping Pan.
