HARINGEY BOROUGH FC - A BRIEF HISTORY

It was not until 1970 that a team competed under the name of Haringey Borough when WOOD GREEN TOWN who had played at Coles Park since 1930 changed their name to Haringey Borough. A merger with EDMONTON FC resulted in a brief change of name to Edmonton & Haringey FC until 1976 when the present name was re-adopted The merged Club played in the Athenian League until it ceased to operate at the end of the 1983/84 season and then played for 4 seasons in Division 2 North of the Isthmian League. After a period of instability culminating ia year in the wilderness away from Senior football in 1988/89 they were admitted to the Spartan



League in 1989/90 retaining Premier Division membership throughout until the South Midlands League merger in season 1997/98 when they finished 7th.in the Premier Division South to secure membership of the new "combined" Premier Division for 1998/99 as well as being runners up in the League's Premier Division Cup. In 2004 after an unsuccessful attempt to move the Club to the nearby New River Sports stadium and a walk out of the existing Committee Aki Achillea who had commenced his association with the Club in 1995 was appointed to lead the Club forward and together with George Kilikita and Secretary John Bacon the club sought to engage more with the local community and tap into the talent locally.

The senior men's team having been relegated to Division One of the Spartan South Midlands League in 2006/7 bounced back with promotion at the very first attempt and a fine season ended with both promotion and the winning of the Division One Cup. Back in the Premier Division for the season 2008/09 the Club again quickly found itself among the relegation strugglers leading to the appointment of the current Manager - the vastly experienced Tom Loizou. Tom and his excellent loyal team of coaching staff have been instrumental in turning around the Club's fortunes in the intervening years. In 2011/12 a highest ever 5th place was achieved and the League Challenge Trophy won. After massive stadium improvements in the close season with the erection of a new Clubhouse and new dressing rooms hopes were high for 2012/13 but the poor weather and the problematic pitch led to a massive fixture backlog which negated any chance of a serious challenge for honours and the Club finished 9th. In 2013/14 the Club's challenge for promotion took place in the Essex Senior League following a sideways switch imposed by the FA. The Club had what was then its most successful season ever finishing runners up by just a solitary point to Great Wakering Rovers and ended the season with 20 wins and one draw from the final 21 League games. The League title was nevertheless secured at the second attempt in 2014/15 with a haul of 103 points from 38 games and with it promotion to Step 4 in which we were allocated to the Ryman League Division One North. The first season at the higher level was a baptism of fire when only 7 points were garnered from the first 17 games but by the close of the season a further 43 points had been amassed from the remaining 29 games and the Club finished in a comfortable 15th place. The first season in the FA Trophy produced two fine victories before a replay loss to Hitchin Town of the Evostik South Premier Division. The summer of 2016 saw yet further investment in the close season in the form of a 3G synthetic main pitch and added improvements to the perimeter, the spectator rails and the floodlights and has created a facility of which the Club can be proud; and has afforded a greater opportunity for the Club to move forward in all aspects. The first team in 2016/17 improved markedly on the previous season and had an excellent all round campaign although rather unfortunate not to finish the season on a high having ended with the "double heartbreak" of missing out on promotion through a 4-5 closely fought semi final play-off defeat at Maldon & Tiptree FC after finishing 5th in the Division and an odd goal 2-3 London Senior Cup semi-final loss at Metropolitan Police. But 2017/18 was to be the Club's best ever and culminated in promotion to Step 3 via the play-off route with a 3-1 win over Canvey Island after automatic promotion had been missed by just two points. And in FA Competitions the 4th and final round of the Qualifying rounds for the FA Cup was reached, although that ended in disappointment with a 2-4 home defeat by Heybridge Swifts who then enjoyed a visit to Exeter City in the First Round Proper. In the FA Trophy we went right through the qualifying campaign and were lucky enough to draw Leyton Orient in the First Round Proper which brought a record attendance of 1,133 to Coles Park and "The O's" left mightily relieved at having come back to win 2-1 after going a goal down in the fifth minute. 2018/19 was another great but ultimately disappointing season season with an FA Cup run which took us into the First Round Proper

where it was ended rather cruelly by AFC Wimbledon's last minute goal at Coles Park in front of a record crowd of 2,710. Having led the Premier Division for several weeks in mid-season it was somewhat surprising that we dropped from 2nd to 3rd on the last day of the season after a poor late run but still enjoyed home advantage in the Play-Off Semi-final in which a 45 minute second half onslaught on the Tonbridge Angels goal produced only one goal in response to the two they had scored before the interval. The 2019/20 season's early termination was less of a disappointment for us than for most other Isthmian Premier Division Clubs as we were marooned in mid-table with no realistic prospect of entering either the promotion or relegation zones. The highlight of the season should have been the visit of National League Yeovil Town in the Final Qualifying Round of the Emirates FA Cup but, as is well known, appalling crowd behaviour brought that game to an early end and the second game seemed something of an anti-climax. In fact, without making excuses, that unpleasant episode seems to have adversely affected our players for some time for, whereas we had been well in the promotion places mix, thereafter we just drifted downwards The early termination of League Fixtures for 2020/21 was more of a blow than was the previous seasons voiding as we were well placed to make a charge towards a play-off place at least. However the Buildbase FA Trophy continued and we enjoyed a run through to the 4th Round Proper when Oxford City of the National League South finally eliminated us 4-2 after we had been two up; en route we had overcome Faversham Town, Bishops Stortford, Eastbourne Borough and Dartford, the last two also being National League South Clubs. The London Senior Cup also carried on and due to withdrawals, we reached the guarter-final without playing a game but lost a penalty shoot out to Hanwell Town after a 2-2 draw. The 2021/22 season was more or less a non-event as regards any real challenge for the League top spots but the semi-finals of The League Cup and the London Senior Cup were reached with both game ending in odd goal defeats in the space of a week. We may well have set a Club record for the highest number of injuries sustained in any season and that even led to an outside chance of relegation towards the end of the season but the failings of others meant we were never in serious danger.

The foundations are in place for an eventual assault on the title to secure a National League place for the men's senior side and an exciting season is in prospect in which a challenge for at least a Play-off position is a realistic prospect as we pursue our ambition to achieve promotion to the National League which should be within the capabilities of our talented squad. The facilities and structures are in place for all the Club's teams to improve and enhance on recent successes.

2016/17 saw the introduction of a much needed "second" team, formed to compete in the Ryman Development League it being basically intended for Under 21 players but with the facility to include up to 4 older players in every squad. The team held their own comfortably in the League finishing a very creditable 6th place and the benefits of the Club's participation were all too evident with the introduction of a number of players into the first team squad throughout the season and the opportunity for first team squad players to keep fresh and those who were returning from injury had a platform to get fit. Thereby proving the benefits of having such a side. The age restriction was amended to Under 23 for 2017/18 and the team has always been near the top of the table, continued to do well in the following seasons and won the North Division Championship in 2021/22 but lost to South Division Champions Hastings United in the "Champion of Champions" play off.

Youth teams were commenced and run successfully for many years at various age levels with some considerable success particularly at the older age groups including progress into the 2nd round proper of the FA Youth Cup in 2006/07. They were Divisional winners of the Southern Counties Floodlit Youth League in 2004/05 (and also winners of the League's Colwyn Cup competition) and 2009/10. After a few seasons absence from Youth football the Under 18s rejoined the Southern Counties competition in 2017/18, winning its Divisional Championship at the first attempt and finishing towards the top of the table in the following seasons. This will again provide a pathway for talented local boys to make their way into the first team squad and ultimately the first team itself.

The Women's Team was formed in 1999 and competed in the Eastern Region Womens League winning promotion in its first season and then to its Premier Division for 2002/03; and there they have remained save for two seasons, the first being in 2011/12 following relegation to Division 1 from which they made an immediate Premier Division return as runners-up. Steady improvement began and we were extremely fortunate to have been approached midway through the 2014/15 season by renowned coach and former

professional footballer Steve Browne who at the time was involved in the highly successful S & T Academy Girls football .Steve was duly appointed Manager and preserved the Women's Premier Division status. In 2015/16 a mid table position was easily secured from an uneven campaign which included convincing away wins at the top 2 Clubs and some surprisingly disappointing performances against lower placed teams. In 2017/18, by Christmas the team were runaway League leaders only to be thrown off course by the tragic early death of Steve on New Years Day but after a shaky period the Women re-asserted themselves to win the League Championship on the last day of the season and with it, promotion to the Women's Premier League and followed that up by adding the League Cup with a 5-1 win over Cambridge City to complete the double which was a a fitting, lasting legacy for their Manager. The loss of many of the successful squad, several to American University Scholarships, proved too much of a handicap at the higher level and relegation back to the Eastern Regional League was an unsurprising outcome. Now under the stewardship of Bobby Cato significant steps forward seem certain and promotion is again a realistic prospect. An exceptionally young and talented squad was unlucky to find itself in danger of relegation towards the end of the 2021/22 season due to a high number of odd goal defeats but pulled clear with 4 vital points from the last two games. They look capable of going places if they stick together when experience is added to their armoury.

HISTORY OF CRAY WANDERERS FC

Cray Wanderers have been in exile from the Cray's since 1973 when they lost the Grassmeade ground in Chelsfield Road, due to housing development. They moved to Oxford Road, on the borders of Footscray and Sidcup, but when that ground was ruled to be unsuitable for Step 5 football (the Wands were then playing in the Kent League) it became necessary from 1998/99 to play first team matches at Hayes Lane, as tenants of Bromley FC.



However, an off the field victory was obtained in March 2018 as approval by Bromley Council was granted for a new Football Stadium/Community Hub at Flamingo Park in Sidcup which on Monday 26th November received a further boost when approval was given by the GLA (Mayor of London) giving the green light to a bright future for the club and community. The 2018-19 season saw Cray Wanderers now playing in the newly formed Isthmian South-East and were crowned the first champions of the division and despite a season of struggle in 2021-22 Cray retained their place in the Isthmian Premier for the fourth straight season. The first origins of Cray Wanderers are linked to the construction of the London, Chatham & Dover railway line during 1858 to 1860. During their leisure time, migrant workers kicked a ball around, and that is how the club originated in the St Mary Cray village. The pitch at Star Lane is now a cemetery, and is located beneath the nine-arch railway viaduct that spans the Cray Valley. The industrial belt of the River Cray, especially the paper mills, provided much of the club's support up till the 1950s.

Cray Wanderers were a strong force in senior county football at the turn of the century. After being Kent Junior Cup semi-finalists and finalists in 1890/91 and 1891/92 they entered the first ever FA Amateur Cup competition in 1893/94. They had a spell as a professional club between 1895 and 1907. They were a nursery club for Woolwich Arsenal during part of this period. They were one of the founder members of the Kent League in 1894/95, and they won the championship in 1901/02. Other honours included Southern Suburban League champions in 1898/99, West Kent League champions in 1903/04, and Kent Senior Cup runners-up in 1899/1900.

After World War One, Cray switched to the London League where they remained till 1934. In 1930/31 they won the Kent Amateur Cup. Cray rejoined the Kent League in 1934/35, but their four year stay came to grief when 1936 saw the loss of the Fordcroft ground in Cray Avenue, their home since 1898. Cray were forced to drop into a lower level of football, drifting from one temporary pitch to another while the club committee dwindled to a perilously small number. The team struggled badly in the South London Alliance and the Kent Amateur League.

1951/52 heralded a new era, and an upturn in the club's fortunes, when local businessman Mick Slater took over at the helm. The club was elected to the London League and regained its senior status. Cray moved to a new ground at Grassmeade in 1955. Their stay there was a very successful period in the club's history. Drawing extra support from the commuter town of Orpington, they played in the London League and then the Aetolian League. They were three times crowned champions, won the League Cup twice, and also won the Kent Amateur Cup three times.

Cray switched to the semi-professional Metropolitan League for five seasons commencing in 1966/67. In 1971/72 a merger of the Metropolitan League and the Greater London League created the Met London League.

Cray moved to Oxford Road in 1973/74. Johnny Biddle and Jimmy Wakeling proved to be successful managers. In 1974/75 Cray won the Met London League and League Cup, scoring 170 goals in all matches that season. In 1976/77 and 1977/78 Cray won the London Spartan League championship.

Cray decided to return to the Kent League in 1978/79. Success came quickly because Cray won the championship in 1980/81, having been runners-up the year before. Their powerful new team under manager Harry Richardson reached the FA Vase quarter final and 5th round in those two seasons. After that, the 1980s decade brought only one more piece of silverware, the Kent League Cup in 1983/84. After finishing Kent League runners up in 1990/91, Cray had a lean period during most of the 1990s, with the exception of 1992/93 when they won the Kent Senior Trophy.

A new club chairman Gary Hillman arrived in 1994/95 and Ian Jenkins, a Cray player since 1993, was

appointed manager in 1999. By now, Cray were tenants of Bromley FC. As champions of the Kent League in 2002/03 and 2003/04, also reaching the FA Vase quarter final, they achieved promotion into the Ryman League Division One. Five years later at the end of season 2008/09 came further promotion into the Ryman Premier League, the highest level of football that the club has played at since the war.

After parting company with long-serving manager lan Jenkins, relegation into the Ryman Division One North came at the end of 2013/14. The 2014/15 season started with much optimism but this was soon dispelled with a run of difficult results and three changes in management. Looking very much like having to suffer back to back relegations at Christmas and with 10 games to go after suffering a home defeat to the eventual League Champions the Wands went on a 10 game winning run, with a team assembled by the then manager Tommy Warrilow to secure survival and became the Ryman North League Team of the Year.

For 2015/16 The Wands were managed by former player Tony Russell. The Wands finished third in the Ryman North Division losing in the play-off semi final. Two years later and now in the Bostik League South they were beaten by Walton Casuals at the same stage after an excellent season saw Cray finish third and as top scorers with 112 goals.

The 2018-19 season saw Cray Wanderers now playing in the newly formed Isthmian South-East and after a 15 game unbeaten start to the season the team were on their way and were crowned the first champions of the division on Saturday 13th April and Cray took their place in the Isthmian Premier after a five year absence. Cray were lying 2nd in the division on 7th March, 2020 but the continuing escalation of Coronavirus led to the season being considered null and void. The 2020-21 season began and the 4th Qualifying Round of the FA Cup was reached for the second time but with the Wands lying 5th in the Isthmian Premier the season was curtailed with the introduction of tier systems and two more national lockdowns.

The 2021-22 season saw the start of a new era for Cray Wanderers as Tony Russell and his coaching team departed the club in March 2021 and in April, former Welling United, AFC Wimbledon and Gillingham forward Danny Kedwell was appointed as new manager. However, Danny departed the club at the end of December and ex-Wands player Grant Basey took over in an interim capacity but ex-Bromley boss Neil Smith was appointed on 22nd March to guide Cray through the remaining league games and managed to stave off relegation and became Cray Wanderers first ever full time manager in May 2022 and the club are looking to prosper on and off the field. Cray Wanderers in 2022-23 have amassed a record points total for an Isthmian Premier League season and on the verge of a highest ever league position and since the autumn have been contenders to reach the playoffs for the first time.

The move to the new ground is taking shape and grass pitches were laid for Cray Wanderers youth sides to play on while the main stadium is being built and the club are finally playing football at what will be their new home and with 30+ youth teams including for the first time, girls football and the launch of a new academy side the future is looking rosy and bright.

This afternoon we take the opportunity to welcome the players Officials and supporters of CRAY WANDERERS FC to the CVS Van Hire Stadium; For us little is at stake for the best we can hope for is to hold on to our current 13th place and if we do not win three of the Clubs breathing down our neck could overtake us; but in any event it would be very surprising if our players didn't strain every sinew to make it difficult to omit them when Tom selects the team for our remaining game on Tuesday 2nd May (at the ground of Hendon FC) when we take on Hendon or Charlton Athletic Under 23s in the Final of the London Senior Cup (Sponsored by Veo). Our opponents will be decided this coming Tuesday when they play their long delayed semi-final. For our visitors today the match is of tremendous importance as they arrive holding that precious fifth place in the table which puts the holder in the play-offs for a chance of gaining National League status next season. Anything less than a win would leave them vulnerable to losing it to Lewes.

It is astonishing that 5 of our final 7 League games have been matches in which the outcome was crucial to the visiting side. First up it was the then title favourites Hornchurch who left with only one point and came within a whisker of it being none. Bishop's Stortford you owe us big time! Next up was Aveley when we produced a performance which might be kindly described as abject and they duly left with all 3 points. Our Bank Holiday "derby" with Enfield Town followed and effectively we put an end to their hopes with the 2-2 draw – and how we fought to achieve it! No one can accuse us of going easy on a local team. Last Saturday it was off to Lewes from whence we returned beaten 4-0 which suggests a one sided encounter but that could scarcely be further from the truth. They were deserving winners after their opening 15 minute onslaught left them three ahead but.had we been able to overcome our finishing deficiencies they could well have lived to regret taking their foot off the gas.

Last season Cray escaped relegation on goal difference so the point they took from us when they visited Coles Park on 9th November was obviously crucial. Nobody knew that at the time and I don't suppose we were best pleased as we still harboured promotion ambitions of our own at that stage but in the final scheme of things two more points would have been of no material benefit to us; so we are glad Cray left with their point as they are a team we always enjoy playing home or away. Ironic that a season later we have the opportunity to terminate their promotion hopes and thus preserve two enjoyable fixtures for next season! Whatever, we are sure that both teams will give their all and may the better team win. We are hoping that our "free entry" offer to all will attract many first time visitors so will want to put on a display which will encourage them to return next season.

We welcome too, of course, our Match Officials who are Joshua Crofts with the whistle assisted by Robert Davies and Steven Walsh with the flags.

This will be the 9th meeting of the Clubs since we regained Isthmian status in 2015/16 and the previous results have been

Before that, In the FA Vase of 1977/78 Borough won 2-1 away from home. The London Senior Cup has paired us together at least twice the most memorable occasion being our astonishing 5-0 win away (at Bromley) in 1999/2000. But in 2010/11 we returned from a 3rd Round game played at Beckenham Town's ground having lost by 3-0.

Our visit to Cray earlier this season followed a strange pattern for at half time it was 1-1 and even Cray supporters could not believe they were not already beaten out of sight as we had dominated throughout creating but wasting (as is known to be our wont) chance after chance with nothing to show for it except Mikey's late equaliser when he smashed a loose ball into the roof of the net. By full time we were 5-1 losers and our propensity to collapse after conceding a goal has never been better demonstrated!

Friday 7th April 2023 HARINGEY BOROUGH v MARGATE (Pitching In Isthmian League Premier Division)

This was one of the comparatively few matches in this very tight Premier Division when neither Club had any interest in chasing a play-off entry or drop avoiding result. That certainly showed in the first half of end to end play but no goals. Borough took the opportunity to give debuts to our three very late signings so as to make them eligible for London Senior Cup Final selection - right back Rio Davidson-Phipps, striker Sonny Fish and returning goalkeeper Alex Zamani. The game livened up considerably in the second half and the introduction of Sonny Fish (on Youth Loan from Leyton Orient) in the 62nd minute immediately added threat to our attack as he very quickly let the visiting defence know he was there and came very close to opening the score. But worryingly his debut lasted only 21 minutes as an accidental clash of heads with an opponent necessitated both retiring from the game. That was in the 83rd minute and led to the introduction of Sam Owusu, not normally regarded as a striker, but it was he who scored the only goal of the match in the 2nd minute of stoppage time; and it was not an easy net either as he raced in towards a low cross from the left and got right across the goalmouth and in front of the Margate defenders to flick it home at the near post. An eventful 13 minutes for him as he had managed to get himself booked too before scoring. Straight from the restart Margate had the ball in the net but fortunately we were saved by a flag although there were some among the spectators, including Borough people, who questioned whether it should have been raised at all. Probably proof that taken over a long enough period the law of averages will result in equality of favourable and un favourable decisions.

Monday 10th April 2023 ENFIELD TOWN v HARINGEY BOROUGH (Pitching In Isthmian League Premier Division)

A feisty game between two sides of vastly different styles of play. Enfield Town are well endowed with 6 foot and over players and, while we are not midgets, adopting their style of bombarding the opponents defence with a multitude of high crosses and long up and unders was never a sensible option for us. So slick passing movements were our weapon and in the end both methods produced two goals. Many corners and crosses had rained in on our defence with immaculate handling by Max snuffing out the danger before in the 19th minute Jorge was adjudged to have fouled Enfields striker Adam Cunnington and after a considerable delay while he was treated Jake Cass took the penalty bringing a fine diving to his left save by Max but unfortunately he could not hold it and he had no chance as Cass followed up to blast it home from a few yards out. Little had been seen of Borough as an attacking force until the home 'keeper Nathan McDonald was finally called into action to turn close range effort round for a corner. But it mattered little for (who else but) Scott Mitchell – although far from the tallest player in a crowded penalty area – got in a superb angled header as the kick was fired over from the right and sent it accurately across goal out of the keeper's reach. The second half continued in much the same vein and when Cass netted his second in the 64th minute that put the home side firmly in the driving seat but Borough shrugged off the reverse and probed away determinedly. A few minutes from time Cass wasted a glorious chance to make the game safe as having done all the hard work to create a clear opening in a central position just outside the six yard box he sent his finishing effort over the bar. What a costly miss that was to prove as Borough refused to lie down and pressed forward at every opportunity and were rewarded with a penalty in the last minute of the game for handball as Enfield dealt with a corner. A lengthy melee ensued during which Cass diligently scuffed away at the penalty spot for which he was duly booked while Sam O and Enfield's Andre Coker were both yellow carded for adopting an aggressive attitude towards each other. Ben Allen who had been substituted after picking up a yellow for persistently ignoring the rules of the game, and he had indeed been a constant annoyance to the home 'keeper, joined in the melee thus earning a second yellow and with it a suspension which prevents his selection in todays final League game. Several minutes passed before Erald was able to take the penalty and the scuffing of the spot may well have been effective for the 'keeper dived to his left to repel it and it was Stefanos who raced forward to be first to the loose ball and smashed it home. So two penalties into the same goal, both saved with leftward dives and two rebounds emphatically fired home.

The win simply lifted us to 13th place in the table and that is the highest we can finish as we are 8 points behind 12th placed Billericay Town. But for Enfield the loss of two points has done grievous harm to their play off hopes as the loss of the 2 points meant they dropped to 6th place, one outside the play off zone. It did not put them right out of it but left them with a mountain to climb as they visited leaders Bishops Stortford last Saturday and finish today with a home game with fellow play off contenders Aveley. Even if they garnered six points their final position might still be outside the top 5 unless other results favour them. (update - they lost at Stortford and will not secure a play off spot).

Saturday 15th April 2023 LEWES v HARINGEY BOROUGH (Pitching In Isthmian League Premier Division)

A game of two halves is a cliché often used but it would not be appropriate to this game which was on the lines of one sixth/five sixths. After 15 minutes Lewes were three up and so total had been their domination that thoughts of the most embarrassing of scorelines ever were a worry. To keep their hope of a play off place alive they had to win and having taken a three goal lead presumably thought that was adequate. Unwise, for given the opportunity to seize the initiative we did so for the remainder of the game. In the event their lead was sufficient but only because we put on one of our master classes in making but wasting chances and it could easily have been level pegging by half time. Although having nothing much at stake we continued to look like the more committed team throughout the second half and the home 'keeper was certainly the busier of the two custodians despite our propensity to miss the target even when it looked easier to score. Had Jorge put away the opportunity created by Ben's fine low cross from the right midway through the half that could have been the prelude to a grandstand finish and would certainly have frayed Lewes nerves but unfortunately from just a couple of yards out he directed it the wrong side of a post. Lewes tore into us from the off and it was no surprise when Razz Coleman De-Graft fired them ahead as he cut in from the right and drove home low hard and straight from the edge of the penalty box just inside Max's left hand post. Five minutes later prolific scorer Joe Taylor (he who is on £xxx per week – you fill in the figures for your speculation is as good as anyone else's) trundled home what looked like a scuffed shot and four minutes later it was 3-0 as left back Jaydn Mundle-Smith raced virtually the full length of the field without an effective Borough challenge and coolly slotted home. Then we took over but were undone by our lack of finishing prowess and three minutes from time substitute Archie Tamplin, who had only joined the fray a few minutes earlier, scored the final goal almost identical to the first except that he made his progress down the middle rather than via a wing.

A four goal stuffing mathematically but not a true reflection of the flow of the game. It is a little ironic that Lewes having got the points they need for a possible play off spot from us must now depend on our ending the hopes of Cray Wanderers today – and must, of course win their own final game at 3rd placed Canvey Island, which may not be as demanding as it sounds for the Islanders are already sure of a play-off spot.

NEWS OF OUR OTHER TEAMS

The Under 23s. Their season in the 6 team Development Division North ended last Wednesday with a visit to Brightlingsea Regent from where they returned 5-2 losers. They will not finish top, bottom or 5th so it matters little if they end up 2nd, 3rd or 4th with 3rd looking the most likely. Currently they are 2nd with a record of Won 8 Lost 7 For 31 Against 35 Points 24. Heybridge Swifts and Bury Town who are in 3rd and 4th place could both overtake them but as they have to play each other only one may do so. There will be no Isthmian Under 23 Division next season.

The Under 18s. Mid-table also for this team following an inconsistent season which has seen some surprising results, both good and bad. Postponement has followed postponement this season and they still have two games to play, both away from home.

Our Womens Team. Firstly about the immediate future. This coming Sunday the scheduled League game with Colney Heath has been cancelled as they have to give precedence to a Cup game of theirs. But at Coles

Park we have instead an interesting match against a touring American team – Nordic Soccer Club. It is likely to be a real test for our talented young side and we do hope there will be a good turn out of our supporters to witness it. Sadly the wheels have come off our promotion charge in the last three weeks but we can look forward to an even better campaign next season based on the experiences gained this time round. On April 2nd we finally encountered a team capable of stopping us scoring for the first time this season - AFC Sudbury, the most likely Champions from among the 4 Clubs then still in contention who scored 2 themselves. That gives massive importance to their visit to us on Sunday April 30th which at one time we thought might be the Championship decider - and still might be although victory would not make us the beneficiary. The following Sunday we scraped together a team of just 11 players who put up a tremendous performance against one of the other Champion ship chasers Luton Town who had a full complement of 16 players. We fell behind, equalised before half time, took an early second half lead with a free kick virtually from the half way line only to lose through 2 stoppage time goals when we were understandably struggling to compete physically having had no substitution opportunities. That the winner was a debatable hand ball penalty in the 19th of 23 minutes of stoppage time demonstrated, if such be needed, just how cruel a game football can be. That's not a typo you read nineteenth correctly and another 4 followed – the equaliser had arrived in the 101st minute; I can rarely recall having left the ground feeling so dejected in 68 years of attending Coles Park games. But no such feelings last Sunday when we played our final away game of the season at Colney Heath. A sluggish start saw us fall behind after only a few minutes play but once we got our act together there never seemed to be much doubt that we would turn things round. So many chances, some gilt edged, had been made and wasted by half time that it seemed like it might have been a continuation of yesterday's first team game. But parity had been restored by half time and three more successful efforts in the second half gave us a comfortable 4-1 win. Not that our defence and 'keeper were just spectators for the Colney attacks, although fewer, often looked threatening and some last ditch clearances and saves by Maisie were needed to preserve the three goal lead. With nothing at stake for either team it was played in a fine spirit, excellently and unfussily refereed by Rhys Stewart. And as for Colney's post match hospitality..... unsurpassed. I have been to every 21 of our Isthmian Premier Division games and can recall none as having bettered it and few have even equalled it – us and Cray Wanderers being two of the few. We certainly look forward to meeting them again when Sundays cancelled return game has been re-arranged, which is likely to be on a midweek day in May.

SO, ULTIMATELY, Football Association chiefs finally made the only sensible call they could have made in granting an extension to the season for clubs at Steps 5 and 6.

But even though that affords the likes of Sandhurst Town, Brook House, Horndean and Bacup Borough a bit of breathing space from their ridiculous end-of-season fixture avalanche – Sandhurst having to play 11 games in 10 days at one point – there is a bigger picture to consider here.

Tackling congested fixture pile-ups come March and April is no new dilemma for clubs these days, and therein lies the problem.

On average, you can expect to lose at least two or three league fixtures over the course of the season, but on the odd year of extraordinary weather patterns such as this, contingency plans have to be put in place.

It's not necessarily the regulation league season which is causing the problem – there are enough Saturdays and Tuesdays in the calendar to comfortably take in a 46-game season – but the numerous cup competitions which clubs are often obliged, or felt pressured to, compete in.

Take my old friends down at Fleet Town, for example. These days, the Blues ply their trade in the Wessex League Premier but that just scratches the surface of a gruelling first-team campaign which also takes in FA Cup, FA Vase, Wessex League Cup, Hampshire Senior Cup, Southern Combination Cup, Russell Cotes Cup and Aldershot Senior Cup.

Eagle-eyed readers of The NLP's extensive fixtures page may have noticed that there are some regional or district cup competitions still trying to get through delayed second or third round matches. Indeed, for some, the backlog of fixtures is often so great that the competitions have. in the past, been carried over into the pre-season of the following campaign.

Sadly, though, one of Non-League football's great institutions is also implicated here – the County Cup. This week, we saw two instances of National League clubs having to all but relinquish their challenge for honours at the semi-final stage due to fixture clashes.

Firstly, in Hampshire, we heard that Aldershot Town had been informed by the Hampshire Senior Cup subgroup that their semi-final tie against Basingstoke Town HAD to be played on Tuesday April 18.

But the Shots – proud six-time County Cup winners - had already rearranged their crucial National League game with Wealdstone for that date, meaning that despite their best efforts to arrange an alternative date, they had no choice but to fulfil their fixture but field their Under 21 academy side.

"The club wanted to move the fixture to give our supporters an opportunity to attend both our League fixture with Wealdstone and Cup fixture with Basingstoke but regret that unfortunately a choice between the two will have to be made," a club statement confirmed.

"We're incredibly proud of their achievements so far in this year's Hampshire Senior Cup and will be supporting the youngsters from Wealdstone."

And, it was the same story along the south coast at Worthing.

Following the postponement of their National League South game with Cheshunt to a waterlogged pitch last week, the match was put back to the only available date left available, Tuesday April 25.

This, however, had been listed just 24 hours before the Rebels' already scheduled Sussex Senior Cup semifinal against Hastings United.

Despite constant dialogue with the National League and Sussex County FA to see if the congestion could be eased, a solution could not be found owing to "multiple factors", again meaning Worthing will have to field an under-strength side for the Hastings game with play-offs still very much in the offing.

Club chairman Barry Hunter commented: "Naturally this creates a huge conflict as it schedules us to play four games in eight days, which is not possible without compromise.

"We would also plan to speak with the Sussex FA at the end of the season in the hope we could work with

them and other clubs to find ways to avoid the congestion experienced this season."

Barry is right, discussions do need to be had. Most supporters have some very fond memories from their club's respective County Cup competitions and take great pride in claiming regional bragging rights should their club be lucky enough to lift the trophy.

But the fact remains that County FAs such as Hampshire and Sussex can't expect the likes of Aldershot and Worthing to put their whole season on the line at this crucial stage when there is still so much to play for in the league. If anything, they should be supporting their member clubs in their quest to achieve a highest possible league position. I mean, it's in their best interests, right?

The plight of Aldershot and Worthing – and no doubt other clubs up and down the country – will once again place the future of the County Cup into doubt.

Personally, I like to think they still have a part to play in the fabric of a Non-League season, but unless there is more understanding and flexibility in the fulfilling of priority fixtures, then the more difficulty I have in making an argument for it to remain on the modern-day fixture list.

Something, somewhere along the line surely has to give.

I did extra training on my own time to be able to cover lost ground, never missed a training session during my injury to mentally support the team and through team trainings, I managed to recover my previous fitness level. I still don't feel that I am back to 100% however during games I always try to do my best no matter what.


WHAT DO YOU THINK TOM'S PRIORITIES WILL BE OVER SUMMER?

BEN ALLEN – attacker signed from Aveley on the last Saturday morning of January 2023 who made a scoring debut that afternoon. He was a young player at Phoenix Sports when snapped up by Gillingham, where he turned out for their Under 18 side and a few times for the first team. Loan time at Greenwich Borough followed, and then he moved to National League Bromley, before having some loan time at Lewes. Also has National League experience with Welling United, Concord Rangers and Hungerford Town.



GEORGIOS ARESTI – Cypriot International midfielder who numbers AEK Athens among his previous Clubs; 2017/18 deadline day signing and now virtually an automatic selection for every match

BOBSON BAWLING – attacking midfielder in second spell with us who left for Hendon at the end of last season but came back at Christmas. Originally joined us from Enfield Town at the start of the 2020/21 season having previously been with Crawley Town, Woking and St. Albans City.

RIO DAVIDSON – PHIPPS – Deadline day signing. A right back who was with Bishop's Stortford last season but has been out of action this season through injury.

ERALD DESA – attacker recently signed who has considerable past Isthmian experience with Merstham, Cray Wanderers, Cheshunt and, most recently, Corinthian Casuals and has also been with Welwyn Garden City and Brimsdown. Has represented Albania at Youth International level.

YAHAYA BAMBA – Midfield/Striker – Cray Wanderers are delighted to announce the signing of Yahaya Bamba to the club. Yahaya can play either at right back or as a forward player and comes to the Wands from Sevenoaks Town. Previously with Phoenix Sports, Yahaya made a huge impact when signing for Sevenoaks Town in March last season and scored 10 goals in 9 games to help Sevenoaks steer clear of relegation from the Isthmian South-East. Marcus has come through the Bromley FC academy and has played for the first team making his breakthrough in the 2021-22 season. Marcus has gained valuable experience with loan spells at Welling United last season and this season has played for Hampton & Richmond Borough and more recently at Bowers & Pitsea. Marcus made his debut for the Wands off the bench at Brightlingsea Regent on 18th March and started against Horsham the following Saturday and is a player with huge potential.

SAM SKEFFINGTON – Midfielder – Cray Wanderers welcome Sam Skeffington to the club who re-joins the Wands from Bromley after spending a loan spell with the club last season. Sam is an attacking midfielder who came through the Millwall Youth and Development system and played for the U18s and U23s in three years at the Lions. After a spell on loan at Barnet he signed for Bromley in the summer of 2021 and joined Cray in November making his debut against Folkestone Invicta making 5 appearances in league and cup before returning to Bromley. Wands manager Neil Smith noticed Sam's potential and signed for the Wands for the 2022-23 season and is a great passer of the ball. Sam scored his first goal for Cray Wanderers at Bognor Regis Town in December.

HARRISON SODJE – Full Back – Full back/defender Harrison Sodje has returned to Cray Wanderers until the end of the season for a second loan spell from Leyton Orient. Harrison made his debut for Cray Wanderers against Brightlingsea Regent on 19th October and had a fine game playing the full 90 minutes. Harrison made his return in the 2-1 win at Bowers & Pitsea on 4th March and notched his first goal against Horsham on 25th March and also scored a crucial goal at Enfield Town the following Saturday. Harrison played for Cray as a young youth player twelve years ago and went on to Chelsea and Charlton Athletic before joining Leyton Orient as a 16 year old two years ago and signed his first professional contract this season. Harrison has played for Aveley on loan last season and a spell at Heybridge Swifts this season. Harrison returned to Leyton Orient in early January and was part of their first team squad as an unused substitute before coming back to Cray in March.

JEPHTE TANGA – Full back – Jephte has been signed on loan from Leyton Orient as cover for the suspended Kellen Fisher and made a full 90 minutes debut at Carshalton Athletic on Saturday. Jephte played superbly and made a big impression with the Cray Wanderers supporters. Lambeth born Jephte came through the Leyton Orient youth system and made his first team debut in the EFL Cup last season as substitute against Southampton and also played at MK Dons later in the competition. He made eight appearances on loan at Sutton Common Rovers from January 2022 before returning to Leyton Orient and made his league debut against Colchester United as a substitute in March 2022. Jephte along with Harrison Sodje signed professional forms with Leyton Orient in the summer and has recently returned to Sutton Common Rovers on loan making a further eight appearances and scoring a couple of goals.

MATTHEW WEAIRE – Defender – Matthew is a recent arrival at Cray Wanderers having joined in late December from Sevenoaks Town and made his debut against Billericay Town on 17th December. Matthew started out in the Brighton & Hove Albion youth system coming through their U18s in 2018 spending a short loan spell at Gosport

Borough. He then went on to the Colchester United U21s set up going on loan to Leiston before going on to Lewes for the 2021-22 season joining Sevenoaks Town in March 2022.

SAM WOOD – Defender/Midfield – Cray Wanderers club legend Sam Wood re-joined the club almost seventeen years after his last appearances in January 2022 from Dover Athletic. Sam made an instant positive impact to the side making 13 appearances and scoring 3 goals and signed again for the 2022-23 season and played at left back as well as midfield and scored his fifth goal of the campaign at Herne Bay on Easter Monday. Sidcup born Sam started out with the Long Lane youth system but came through the ranks at Cray Wanderers emerging from the very successful reserve side and made his Wands first team debut in 2003. Sam was a key part of the side which won the Kent League titles in 2003-04 and also won the Kent Senior Trophy and helped Cray to the last 8 of the FA Vase. The Wands reached the playoffs in their first season in the Isthmian League Division One in 2004-05 and scored the goal of the season in the 2-0 win against AFC Wimbledon at Hayes Lane in December 2004. At the end of the season Sam moved on to Cray Wanderers landlords Bromley after 94 appearances and 8 goals and helped them to promotion from the Isthmian Premier in 2006-07. Sam's performances attracted the interest of Brentford in the Football League and in 2008 joined the Bees and helped them to promotion from League 2 in 2008-09 making 126 appearances. In 2011-12 he spent a year on loan at Rotherham United and then in 2012 joined Wycombe Wanderers spending 5 seasons including a spell with Wands manager Grant Basey with the Buckinghamshire club making 213 appearances. Sam was released in 2017 and returned to non-league football with Eastleigh in 2017-18 and then back to Bromley up to 2020 and then on to Dover Athletic in the National League. Sam's career turned full circle when he re-signed for Cray Wanderers on 1st February and made his first appearance since 2005 at Potters Bar Town.

MANAGEMENT

NEIL SMITH – Manager – Cray Wanderers announced on 22nd March the appointment of Neil Smith as manager. Neil came in for the remaining six games of the season and helped to stave off relegation and continued on as manager into the 2022-23 season and has turned the clubs fortunes around completely and have been playoff contenders since the autumn. Neil had a distinguished Football League and Non-League career as a player and coach and later as a manager. He started out in the Tottenham Hotspur youth system and was signed as an apprentice in 1990 but never got a chance to play so initially went on loan to Gillingham in 1991 and remained there for six years making over 200 appearances for the Medway club. He moved on to Fulham in 1997 for two seasons and scored against Tottenham in the FA Cup. In 1999 he moved to Reading and all three Football League clubs he gained promotion as a player. He had a short spell at Stevenage Borough and then on to Woking in 2002 for five seasons and became interim manager for a spell. He continued in player management at Welling United and after short spells as a player at Bromley and Maidstone United he called time on his playing career.

He went into coaching at Grays Athletic, Croydon Athletic and Lewes and then to Bromley in 2011 and was Assistant Manager when Bromley won the National South title in 2014-15. He became first team manager in 2016 and established Bromley as a credible National League force and took them to the FA Trophy final at Wembley in 2017-18. He remained at Bromley until March 2021 until his departure from the club but took on on a new challenge at Cray Wanderers where he runs the clubs new Academy with the prospect of the new stadium at Flamingo Park.

TIM O'SHEA – Assistant - Manager – Tim joins Neil Smith as Assistant Manager of Cray Wanderers after arriving in March 2022. Tim is an experienced manager and coach who took the reins at Grays Athletic, Croydon Athletic and Lewes. Tim represented Republic of Ireland at Youth level and came through the Tottenham Hotspur youth system and went on to make 3 appearances for the first team between 1983-88 which included a loan spell at Newport County and went on to Leyton Orient for the 1988-89 season. He went on to star at Gillingham as a defender making 112 appearances between 1989-1992. After later playing in Hong Kong he went into non-league football with Farnborough Town and Welling United and from here went into management at Grays, Croydon and Lewes where Neil Smith was a coach.
