#### HARINGEY BOROUGH FC - A BRIEF HISTORY

It was not until 1970 that a team competed under the name of Haringey Borough when WOOD GREEN TOWN who had played at Coles Park since 1930 changed their name to Haringey Borough. A merger with EDMONTON FC resulted in a brief change of name to Edmonton & Haringey FC until 1976 when the present name was re-adopted. The merged Club played in the Athenian League until it ceased to operate at the end of the 1983/84 season and then played for 4 seasons in Division 2 North of the Isthmian League. After a period of instability culminating in a year in the wilderness away from Senior football in 1988/89 they were admitted to the Spartan



League in 1989/90 retaining Premier Division membership throughout until the South Midlands League merger in season 1997/98 when they finished 7th.in the Premier Division South to secure membership of the new "combined" Premier Division for 1998/99 as well as being runners up in the League's Premier Division Cup. In 2004 after an unsuccessful attempt to move the Club to the nearby New River Sports stadium and a walk out of the existing Committee Aki Achillea who had commenced his association with the Club in 1995 was appointed to lead the Club forward and together with George Kilikita and Secretary John Bacon the club sought to engage more with the local community and tap into the talent locally.

The senior men's team having been relegated to Division One of the Spartan South Midlands League in 2006/7 bounced back with promotion at the very first attempt and a fine season ended with both promotion and the winning of the Division One Cup. Back in the Premier Division for the season 2008/09 the Club again quickly found itself among the relegation strugglers leading to the appointment of the current Manager – the vastly experienced Tom Loizou. Tom and his excellent loyal team of coaching staff have been instrumental in turning around the Club's fortunes in the intervening years. In 2011/12 a highest ever 5th place was achieved and the League Challenge Trophy won. After massive stadium improvements in the close season with the erection of a new Clubhouse and new dressing rooms hopes were high for 2012/13 but the poor weather and the problematic pitch led to a massive fixture backlog which negated any chance of a serious challenge for honours and the Club finished 9th. In 2013/14 the Club's challenge for promotion took place in the Essex Senior League following a sideways switch imposed by the FA. The Club had what was then its most successful season ever finishing runners up by just a solitary point to Great Wakering Rovers and ended the season with 20 wins and one draw from the final 21 League games. The League title was nevertheless secured at the second attempt in 2014/15 with a haul of 103 points from 38 games and with it promotion to Step 4 in which we were allocated to the Ryman League Division One North. The first season at the higher level was a baptism of fire when only 7 points were garnered from the first 17 games but by the close of the season a further 43 points had been amassed from the remaining 29 games and the Club finished in a comfortable 15th place. The first season in the FA Trophy produced two fine victories before a replay loss to Hitchin Town of the Evostik South Premier Division. The summer of 2016 saw yet further investment in the close season in the form of a 3G synthetic main pitch and added improvements to the perimeter, the spectator rails and the floodlights and has created a facility of which the Club can be proud; and has afforded a greater opportunity for the Club to move forward in all aspects. The first team in 2016/17 improved markedly on the previous season and had an excellent all round campaign although rather unfortunate not to finish the season on a high having ended with the "double heartbreak" of missing out on promotion through a 4-5 closely fought semi final play-off defeat at Maldon & Tiptree FC after finishing 5th in the Division and an odd goal 2-3 London Senior Cup semi-final loss at Metropolitan Police. But 2017/18 was to be the Club's best ever and culminated in promotion to Step 3 via the play-off route with a 3-1 win over Canvey Island after automatic promotion had been missed by just two points. And in FA Competitions the 4th and final round of the Qualifying rounds for the FA Cup was reached, although that ended in disappointment with a 2-4 home defeat by Heybridge Swifts who then enjoyed a visit to Exeter City in the First Round Proper. In the FA Trophy we went right through the qualifying campaign and were lucky enough to draw Leyton Orient in the First Round Proper which brought a record attendance of 1,133 to Coles Park and "The O's" left mightily relieved at having come back to win 2-1 after going a goal down in the fifth minute. 2018/19 was another great but ultimately disappointing season with an FA Cup run which took us into the First Round Proper where it was

ended rather cruelly by AFC Wimbledon's last minute goal at Coles Park in front of a record crowd of 2,710. Having led the Premier Division for several weeks in mid-season it was somewhat surprising that we dropped from 2nd to 3rd on the last day of the season after a poor late run but still enjoyed home advantage in the Play-Off Semi-final in which a 45 minute second half onslaught on the Tonbridge Angels goal produced only one goal in response to the two they had scored before the interval. The 2019/20 season's early termination was less of a disappointment for us than for most other Isthmian Premier Division Clubs as we were marooned in mid-table with no realistic prospect of entering either the promotion or relegation zones. The highlight of the season should have been the visit of National League Yeovil Town in the Final Qualifying Round of the Emirates FA Cup but, as is well known, appalling crowd behaviour brought that game to an early end and the second game seemed something of an anti-climax. In fact, without making excuses, that unpleasant episode seems to have adversely affected our players for some time for, whereas we had been well in the promotion places mix, thereafter we just drifted downwards The early termination of League Fixtures for 2020/21 was more of a blow than was the previous seasons voiding as we were well placed to make a charge towards a play-off place at least. However the Buildbase FA Trophy continued and we enjoyed a run through to the 4th Round Proper when Oxford City of the National League South finally eliminated us 4-2 after we had been two up; en route we had overcome Faversham Town, Bishops Stortford, Eastbourne Borough and Dartford, the last two also being National League South Clubs. The London Senior Cup also carried on and due to withdrawals, we reached the quarter-final without playing a game but lost a penalty shoot out to Hanwell Town after a 2-2 draw. The 2021/22 season was more or less a non-event as regards any real challenge for the League top spots but the semi-finals of The League Cup and the London Senior Cup were reached with both game ending in odd goal defeats in the space of a week. We may well have set a Club record for the highest number of injuries sustained in any season and that even led to an outside chance of relegation towards the end of the season but the failings of others meant we were never in serious danger. 2022/23 was a disappointment in League terms as we lost our way quite early after a start which gave rise to play-off hopes and 15th place was the final outcome. But we did reach the London Senior Cup final where we faced Charlton Athletic Under 23s at Hendon's Silver Jubilee Park. Three down after half an hour we looked dead and buried but fought back ferociously to level with three goals all from set pieces (2 direct free kicks and a penalty) finally going down to a 3-5 defeat after extra time.

2016/17 saw the introduction of a much needed "second" team, formed to compete in the Ryman Development League it being basically intended for Under 21 players but with the facility to include up to 4 older players in every squad. The team held their own comfortably in the League finishing a very creditable 6th place and the benefits of the Club's participation were all too evident with the introduction of a number of players into the first team squad throughout the season and the opportunity for first team squad players to keep fresh and those who were returning from injury had a platform to get fit. Thereby proving the benefits of having such a side. The age restriction was amended to Under 23 for 2017/18 and the team has always been near the top of the table, continued to do well in the following seasons and won the North Division Championship in 2021/22 but lost to South Division Champions Hastings United in the "Champion of Champions" play off. 2022/23 saw the North Division reduced to just 6 teams playing each other 3 times following withdrawals and the League will not be continuing with an Under 23 (Development) Section at all. Youth teams were commenced and run successfully for many years at various age levels with some considerable success particularly at the older age groups including progress into the 2nd round proper of the FA Youth Cup in 2006/07. They were Divisional winners of the Southern Counties Floodlit Youth League in 2004/05 (and also winners of the League's Colwyn Cup competition) and 2009/10. After a few seasons absence from Youth football the Under 18s rejoined the Southern Counties competition in 2017/18, winning its Divisional Championship at the first attempt and finishing towards the top of the table in the following seasons until falling away somewhat and finishing mid-table in 2022/23. This will again provide a pathway for talented local boys to make their way into the first team squad and ultimately the first team itself.

The Women's Team was formed in 1999 and competed in the Eastern Region Womens League winning promotion in its first season and then to its Premier Division for 2002/03; and there they have remained save for two seasons, the first being in 2011/12 following relegation to Division 1 from which they made an immediate Premier Division return as runners-up. Steady improvement began and we were extremely fortunate to have been approached midway through the 2014/15 season by renowned coach and former

professional footballer Steve Browne who at the time was involved in the highly successful S & T Academy Girls football. Steve was duly appointed Manager and preserved the Women's Premier Division status. In 2015/16 a mid table position was easily secured from an uneven campaign which included convincing away wins at the top 2 Clubs and some surprisingly disappointing performances against lower placed teams. In 2017/18, by Christmas the team were runaway League leaders only to be thrown off course by the tragic early death of Steve on New Years Day but after a shaky period the Women re-asserted themselves to win the League Championship on the last day of the season and with it, promotion to the Women's Premier League and followed that up by adding the League Cup with a 5-1 win over Cambridge City to complete the double which was a a fitting, lasting legacy for their Manager. The loss of many of the successful squad, several to American University Scholarships, proved too much of a handicap at the higher level and relegation back to the Eastern Regional League was an unsurprising outcome. Now under the stewardship of Bobby Cato significant steps forward seem certain and promotion is again a realistic prospect. An exceptionally young and talented squad was unlucky to find itself in danger of relegation towards the end of the 2021/22 season due to a high number of odd goal defeats but pulled clear with 4 vital points from the last two games. They look capable of going places if they stick together when experience is added to their armoury. The tie up with the Haringey Girl's Academy run by Adem Ali has proved massively successful and for the first time we are in a situation where talented young teenagers are ready and eager to compete for a place in the Women's squad as soon as they turn 16, although being a team substantially composed of schoolgirls in an Adult League is not without its problems.

The foundations are in place for an eventual assault on the title to secure a National League place for the men's senior side and an exciting season is in prospect in which a challenge for at least a Play-off position is a realistic prospect as we pursue our ambition to achieve promotion to the National League should be within the capabilities of our talented squad. The facilities and structures are in place for all the Club's teams to improve and enhance on recent successes.

The Directors and Committee of *HARINGEY BOROUGH FOOTBALL CLUB* take pleasure in extending a warm welcome to all visitors to Coles Park and hope that they will make use of the bar and refreshment facilities available to increase their enjoyment of the occasion.

#### HISTORY OF DULWICH HAMLET FC

The Hamlet are back in the Isthmian League for the 2023-24 season for the first time since 2018 following five years in the National League South.

Those five seasons playing at Step 2 represented the highest level achieved during our 130-year history, but would end in heartbreak on the final day of last season. Only needing a point to avoid the drop against Chippenham Town, the side would lose 1-0 in front of a sell-out 3,334 at Champion Hill, with other results elsewhere condemning them to a return to the Isthmian League, which we have spent 111 years of our existence playing in.

The club with the famous pink and navy blue shirts can boast an illustrious past. Indeed, between the two World Wars, they were among the giants of amateur football.

The Dulwich Hamlet story began back in 1893, during the closing years of Queen Victoria's reign. Towards the end of the summer that year, Lorraine Wilson was handed the princely sum of one shilling and eight pence (less than 10 pence in today's coinage) by a couple of keen young footballers and asked to start a Dulwich Hamlet Football Club. 'Pa', as he was affectionately known, tackled the task with great relish and over the next thirty years, he helped to build Dulwich into a powerful force.

Life in the early days was fairly tough. The club's original ground in Woodwarde Road had no changing facilities. On match days the players used to walk half a mile through the streets of Dulwich Village to get from their dressing room to the pitch. Usually they had to carry the goalposts, crossbars, and corner flags with them. One consolation was that the players' route took them through the gardens of the local inn where no doubt they paused on their return journey for a post-match drink or two!

Dulwich made their debut in competitive soccer when they joined the local Camberwell League in 1894-95. The following season the championship of that league's 'B' Division became the first entry on what has proved to be a long list of honours. Achieving senior status in 1900, the club proceeded from strength to strength and in 1904-05, they won the Surrey Senior Cup for the first time. They have now won the Surrey Cup a record 16 times, most recently in 1975. In 1907, Dulwich gained election to the Isthmian League, where they have remained ever since.

During the First World War, the legendary Edgar Kail joined Dulwich. In his brilliant fourteen-year career with the Hamlet, Kail scored 427 goals (including a club record of 53 goals in the 1925-26 season). He also played three times for the full England International side, scoring twice on his debut against France. Kail helped Dulwich to the Isthmian League championship in 1920, 1926 and 1933, two FA Amateur Cup triumphs in 1920 and 1932, and the London Senior Cup in 1925. Another Hamlet legend of that era was goalkeeper Bert Coleman who gained a full England cap in 1921, keeping a clean sheet against Wales. Dulwich's other major successes during their heyday between the wars were two more FA Amateur Cup wins in 1934 and 1937, and another London Senior Cup victory in 1939; they were also runners-up in the Isthmian League five times. Incidentally, their 7-1 win over Marine in 1931/32 equalled the record score for an FA Amateur Cup Final. Dulwich were quickly into their stride after the Second World War and in 1949 they were Isthmian League

champions for a fourth time. In 1950 they lifted the London Senior Cup again, and it was in the same season that fullback Reg Merritt embarked upon a long career with the Hamlet during which he made a club record 576 appearances. One of the most popular players of the immediate post-war period was flying left-winger Tommy Jover whose career goals tally for Dulwich has only been bettered by Edgar Kail. Tommy completed more than seventy years magnificent service to the club, as player, official and latterly club President from 1985 until his death at the grand age of 91 in 2008. The club's main stand is now named in his honour.

Dulwich then went through a very lean spell during the 1960s and 70s, which, apart from three good seasons in the mid-1970s, culminated in relegation from the top division. However, they bounced straight back under manager Alan Smith, winning the Division One championship at the first attempt in 1978. Midfield dynamo Chris Lewington was an ever-present that season and he repeated the feat in each of the next four seasons to complete a remarkable 290 consecutive appearances, another club record.

Since the phasing out of amateur football and the end of the FA Amateur Cup in 1974, Dulwich have been a semi-professional club and compete in the FA Trophy. Their best run so far in the competition was in 1979-80

when they reached the quarter-finals, losing to Boston United in a replay. This was repeated in 2016-17 when they would be knocked out by National League Macclesfield Town, again after a replay.

However, as the 1980s progressed, the club fell on hard times again and despite a London Senior Cup success in 1984 they struggled in the Isthmian League, being relegated to Division One at the end of 1990. This time it took them two years to get back to the top flight - an exciting finale to the 1991-92 campaign saw the Hamlet win their last seven league games to pip Boreham Wood for a promotion place on the final day of the season.

It was most appropriate that Dulwich were able to celebrate their centenary by moving into a new Champion Hill Stadium. Their famous old ground, situated on the same site, opened in 1931 and for a long time was the mecca of amateur football. Numerous Amateur Internationals and other important matches were staged there, including the FA Amateur Cup Final between Kingstonian and Stockton in 1933 that attracted a record crowd of 20,744. Sadly, the old ground fell into disrepair over the years and in order to satisfy safety regulations several alterations had to be made which reduced the capacity considerably. Eventually, in 1991, the stadium was totally demolished as part of Sainsbury's redevelopment of the area.

The 1990s would bring ups and downs, with Frank Murphy transforming us into championship contenders again, before the decade would end with a run to the FA Cup First Round under Dave Garland in the autumn of 1998, losing to an own goal in a 1-0 loss at home to Southport, before the club lifted the London Challenge Cup at the end of that season, beating Uxbridge 2-1 at the Valley.

Relegation occurred again in 2001 with just four league wins all season, which brought a long spell back in Division One. A Premier Division spot was almost regained under chairman/manager Martin Eede in 2004, however a 4-5 penalty loss to Wealdstone in a promotion play-off ended those dreams. Three days later, a brace from Omari Coleman handed us our fifth and most recent London Senior Cup title, as we beat old rivals Tooting & Mitcham United at Hendon.

Eede was succeeded first by Wayne Burnett and then Craig Edwards, before the arrival of former players Gavin Rose and Junior Kadi in the summer of 2009 as manager and assistant gave the club a huge upturn in fortunes.

After a mid-table finish in their first year, the duo took the side to the Division One South play-off final in 2011, beating Bognor Regis Town in the semi-final after finishing 31 points behind them, before leading Leatherhead 3-1 with minutes to go in the final, only to lose 4-3 after extra time. Dulwich also reached the final of the League Cup for the first time, but lost 0-2 to Wingate & Finchley at Imber Court.

Rose would reach the final again 12 months later, where Bognor Regis exacted their revenge for the previous year, winning 1-0 at Nyewood Lane, but undeterred, 2012-13 would bring incredible joy to the club. Blending a mixture of experience in the likes of Peter Adeniyi, Kevin James and Phil Wilson with exciting youngsters such as Nyren Clunis, Ellis Green and Xavier Vidal, the Hamlet were involved in a scintillating title race with Maidstone United. The arrival early in the season of magician Erhun Öztümer and then striker Danny Carr added incredible skill and firepower, with the season going right to the final weekend. Against Burgess Hill Town at home, a second half strike from Vidal earned the point we needed to secure the title, one point clear of the Stones.

Back in the Premier Division, it was a series of disappointments for the side in the next few years, missing out on the playoffs in 2014 by a point, before losing in the semi-finals a year later at Margate. Two successive final losses followed, with a 3-1 defeat at East Thurrock United in 2016 followed by a 2-1 loss at Bognor Regis Town 12 months later.

However, 2017-18 brought more success, as a side containing the likes of Clunis, Preston Edwards, Ashley Carew, Kenny Beaney, Nathan Green, Reise Allassani and Sanchez Ming went toe-to-toe with high-spending Billericay Town, finishing with a club-record 95 points in second place. This was made even more impressive by the fact that we had been evicted from Champion Hill in March 2018, with home games at Tooting & Mitcham United, and the club relying on fan donations and fundraising throughout the season to keep playing. In the play-offs, a Carew free-kick beat Leiston in the semis, before Hendon awaited at Imperial Fields in the final. On a baking May Bank Holiday, an equaliser from Gavin Tomlin sent the game to extra-time and then penalties, with goalkeeper Amadou Tangara saving two Hendon efforts before Dipo Akinyemi struck the winner to send us to the National League South.

Life at Step 2 was a rollercoaster for the Hamlet, with a brief flirtation with the drop easily avoided in the

end during 2018-19 as we finished 14th in our debut season at the level. The following year brought an appearance in the FA Cup First Round, televised live on BBC1 against Carlisle United, as well as the Covid-19 pandemic, which may have ultimately saved us from relegation, with the following season ended prematurely too. 2021-22 brought a stunning first half of the season in which we looked like strong contenders for the playoffs, before faltering after Christmas to end 10th, the highest position in the club's history.

Last season, the club parted company with Rose after 13 years in charge, with Paul Barnes replacing him at the helm. However, a run of one point from ten games in the spring saw another managerial change, as Hakan Hayrettin came in, but despite keeping us in the running for survival, that defeat to Chippenham on the final day condemned us to the drop.

The Hamlet have also had a Women's side since 2019. During that summer, the club merged with AFC Phoenix, who had been in existence since 2010 and who had gradually risen up through the regional London leagues to reach Step 5 and the London & South-East Regional Women's League.

Manager Farouk Menia sadly passed away just months after the mergence following a long illness, with Ryan Dempsey taking the reins, and the Hamlet would enjoy two excellent seasons, only for the pandemic to intervene, and deny them promotion to Step 4. 2021-22 was a more inconsistent campaign, with a fifth-placed finish lower than the previous two seasons, but the side reached their first cup final under the Hamlet banner, losing 2-0 to Ashford Town in the final of the Capital Senior Cup at Dorking Wanderer's Meadowbank.

2022-23 would bring more history, with the side reaching the proper stages of the Women's FA Cup for the first team, eventually bowing out in Round 2 to Gillingham in front of a record 631 at Champion Hill, with the side improving on the previous season to finish fourth in the league.

IF THERE'S one thing that Non-League clubs do particularly well it's putting on a good old community or charity fundraiser.

Regrettably, as much as we'd like to at the Non-League Paper, we just can't give each one we hear about the publicity they absolutely deserve.

But there were two events which featured in this week's NLP – both taking place this weekend – which touched the hearts of us all.

The first paid homage to 'one of our won' – a Non-League legend having a tough time of things right now. A treble with Yeading, a famous FA Cup third round clash against Newcastle United and play-off success at Maidenhead United, Darty Brown loved every minute of his Non-League career.

Tomorrow, team-mates from his past will come together for the former midfielder to raise money in his fight against a rare form of cancer, Cardiac Sarcoma.

Maidenhead's York Road home will host an All Star team from that promotion-winning side versus Darty's All Stars, made up of players he played alongside for Yeading and Staines as well as friends.

"It will be lovely to see them all running about, sweating, thinking they can still play," Brown laughed. "We'll see. Lots of them still think they're young so they may have a shock."

Such is its rarity, there is limited research into the terminal and aggressive cancer. Money raised will go towards support for medical bills in specialised treatment centres and on-going care for the 46-year-old, who was diagnosed on March 7 last year.

"A lot of the symptoms other people who have had with it, my body is kind of defying it at the moment," Brown says, referring to the benefits of having played Non-League football for so many years."

Brown admits he misses the changing room banter, but the bonds he made will be on show tomorrow afternoon as the Non-League community pull together for one of their own.

Campbell, Francis Duku, Duane Lee, Adrian Toppin and Carl Wilson Dennis will feature for Darty's All Stars, while the likes of Bobby Behzadi, Dale Binns, Richard Pacquette, Mark Nesbit and Ashley Smith will turn out for the Magpies.

Doors open at midday for a 3pm kick off, while there will be food and drink available, raffles and auctions as well as a bouncy castle.

Duku's Our Game Community Scheme CIC has donated prizes for the auction, while Kingstonian chairman Mark Anderson is providing a coach to take people from west London to the game.

Down in the south-west, Yeovil Town's visit of Braintree Town at Huish Park this afternoon is no ordinary game.

Dubbed 'Paint the Park Pink', the community-driven initiative has a crucial goal of raising awareness and vital funds for breast cancer research.

Moreover, it aims to raise £40,000 towards the £2.5 mil.;;/.;lion target for a new breast cancer unit at Yeovil District Hospital.

The driving force behind this initiative is Yeovil commercial director Mark Robinson, who shared the very personal motivation behind the club's decision to organise this event:

"We came on board because Karina, a dedicated season ticket holder, was diagnosed with breast cancer," Robinson explained.

"Despite her own battles, she has devoted her retirement to raising money for the hospital charity. Initiatives "I approached her with the idea of painting the stadium pink, having the players wear pink, and directing all funds towards the hospital. She was so enthusiastic about it. This is the week she'll get the call to say if she can stop her medication, or requires further treatment, exactly five years after her diagnosis."

'Paint the Park Pink' promises a host of special activities and fundraising initiatives for all ages, while the players will wear limited edition pink kits. Captain Josh Staunton has a deeply personal connection to this cause.

"Having lost a dear friend to cancer, this cause holds a special place in my heart," he told us.

"It's a privilege for our football club to shine a spotlight on this event and contribute to raising awareness for breast cancer. Hardships "Moreover, we are making a substantial impact on the lives of the people in and around Yeovil. As a father with a young family, I can't fathom experiencing the same hardships I went through when I lost my best friend. Knowing that we are playing our part in making those difficult times a bit more manageable holds great significance for everyone."

Two wonderful causes and perfect examples of the tireless voluntary work that goes on behind the scenes in Non-League football to make events such as these possible.

As always, your support is vital to keep your local football club alive and kicking but also to help it thrive as a hub of the community.



MANNY PARRY - Defender – Experienced defender who signed in July 2023 from Welling United. Manny played under Hakan Hayrettin previously at Braintree Town during the 2016-17 season and has played more than 270 league games in the National League and National League South, including for the likes of Dover Athletic, Boreham Wood, Woking and Maidenhead United. Aged 29.

MIQUEL SCARLETT – Defender – Defender who returned for a second spell this summer. Was on the books of the Hamlet during the autumn of 2021 but didn't make an appearance due to struggling with tendonitis. After taking some time out to recover, Miquel had a solid season with Eastbourne Borough in 2022-23, playing 28 times in the National League South. **CEM TUMKAYA** – Defender – Defender who joined in the summer of 2023. Aged 25.

ALFIE ALLEN – Midfielder – Young talent who signed from Millwall in the summer of 2023. Alfie has yet to play senior football, but arrives off the back of a sensational season for the Lions' Under-21 side, for whom he played in 25 of their 28 league games in the Professional Development League South Division as they won the title, and then played every minute of both playoff games at the end of the season as they clinched the overall title. Aged 20. ANTHONY JEFFREY – Midfielder – Explosive winger with rapid pace who joined from Billericay Town in the summer. A Guyana international, AJ began his career with Arsenal, having loan spells at Stevenage and Boreham Wood before joining Wycombe Wanderers. Has plenty of non-league experience, appearing for the likes of Welling United, Concord Rangers, Forest Green Rovers and Sutton United during the first part of his career. Enjoyed a successful spell at Dover Athletic between 2017 and 2020, making 68 league appearances before going Wrexham. However, he suffered a torn groin there before tearing his thigh in his first training session at next club Barnet. A return to football in 2022 saw him join Billericay, where he scored three goals in 32 league games last season. Aged 28.

KRESHNIC KRASNIQI – Midfielder – Central midfielder who signed during the summer of 2022 after a year with Ebbsfleet United. Born in Kosovo, he began his football career in Cyprus where he progressed to playing in the First Division there for Ethnikos Achna. He then moved to England where he enjoyed two successful seasons with Heybridge Swifts. He then had spells with Concord Rangers, Wealdstone and Maidstone United before joining Ebbsfleet. Made 31 appearances in his first year for the club. Aged 28.

MARK RICKETTS – Midfielder – Vastly experienced defensive midfielder with more than 500 appearances in the National League and National League South. Originally on the books at Charlton Athletic, he moved to Gravesend & Northfleet (now Ebbsfleet United) in 2006, winning the FA Trophy in 2008. A move to Woking followed, where he helped them to promotion to the National League in 2012, making 276 appearances in seven seasons. He then joined Boreham Wood, becoming a club icon as captain, famously scoring the winner at AFC Bournemouth in an FA Cup fourth-round upset in 2022. Our club captain for 23-24. Aged 38.

RYLEY SCOTT – Midfielder – Young midfielder who signed from National League Dagenham & Redbridge in the summer of 2023. Spent two seasons at Victoria Road but was limited to just six league appearances. Spent two spells on loan with Concord Rangers during 2021-22 and a month at Lewes last season. He has also been a youth player with West Ham United and Ipswich Town. Aged 22.

ADE SHOKUNBI – Midfielder – Box-to-box midfielder who signed from South Shields in the summer of 2023. Won the Northern Premier League titles with the Mariners last season, having joined from Hampton & Richmond Borough in the winter. Prior to signing for Hampton, Ade was a key part of the Welling United side which avoided relegation from the National League South during the 2021-22 season. The former Reading youngster has also played for Billericay Town and Beaconsfield Town. Aged 24.

**LUKE WANADIO** – Midfielder – Rapid winger who has returned for a third spell with the club. First joined us in December 2014 and played 21 times in the rest of that season, before heading off to Staines Town, Welling United, Dartford, Bromley and Aldershot Town. Luke returned to Champion Hill in the spring of 2019 and played a key role in keeping us above the relegation zone in the National League South. Since then, he enjoyed two spells at Dartford, one with Billericay Town, and last season was top scorer for Dover Athletic. Aged 30.

ADRIAN CLIFTON – Striker – Experienced striker who joined from Maidenhead United in 2023. Scored a sensational goal against us on loan at Hampton & Richmond Borough last season and has enjoyed three spells with Maidenhead in his career, as well as playing for the likes of Bromley and Dagenham & Redbridge. He has scored six goals in 17 games for Montserrat as of August 2023. Aged 34.

DANNY MILLS – Striker – Striker who made his name at Whitehawk, scoring over 100 goals for the Brighton-based club and twice helping them to the play-offs. He started his career at Crawley Town, before a spell at Peterborough United and has also played for Ebbsfleet United and Welling United. Joined Dulwich during the summer of 2019 and has since become a key player for the Club, finishing three of his four seasons as leading scorer, with more than 50 goals for the club. He is also the Club's EDI (Equality, Diversity and Inclusion) Officer. Aged 32.

RICHARD PINGLING – Striker – Left-footed striker who impressed as a trialist during the summer of 2023. As a youth was in the academies at Burnley and AFC Wimbledon, before dropping down the pyramid to play his senior football. As represented various sides at Step 5 and Step 4, including Eastbourne United, Merstham, Meridian, Horley Town and Croydon, being a prolific goalscorer for the latter. Spent time at Epsom & Ewell, Lordswood, Croydon and Haywards Heath Town during 2022-23. Aged 24.

**ELLIOTT ROMAIN** – Striker – Quick and strong centre-forward who can also play out wide. Joined from National League South campions Ebbsfleet United in the summer of 2023. Has played under Hakan Hayrettin at Dagenham & Redbridge and Maidstone United. Plenty of National League South experience having also played for Eastbourne Borough, Dartford and Hemel Hempstead Town. Aged 31.

#### **MANAGEMENT**

HAKAN HAYRETTIN – Manager – Hakan was appointed as Hamlet manager in March 2023, with the Hamlet earning 16 points from his 13 games in charge, only losing our National League South status on goal difference on the final day of the season. Hak has plenty of pedigree as a coach and manager, earning promotions with Grays Athletic, Luton Town and Maidstone United during his career. During his playing career, Hakan won the FA Trophy under Martin O'Neill at Wycombe Wanderers and won promotion to the Football League whilst there in 1993, and from Division 2 to Division 1 a year later. Sustained a serious knee injury with Cambridge United which would force him to retire form full-time football in 1997. Spells in non-league football followed, before taking up the managerial reigns with Waltham Forest in 2003, winning the Essex Senior Cup there, before moving to Thurrock and then Grays. There he earned the side promotion to the Isthmian Premier Division in 2013, before being part of the Luton staff to win the Conference title a year later. After leaving Luton in 2016 with the club firmly on the path back to the higher echelons of the Football League, he briefly worked at both Dagenham & Redbridge and Braintree Town. In January 2019 a move to Maidstone would start the path to a third promotion as a coach, with the Stones pipping Dorking Wanderers to the National League South title in 2022. Aged 53.

TERRY HARRIS – Assistant Manager – Joined the backroom staff as Hakan's assistant manager in March 2023. Vastly experienced as an assistant manager having worked under the likes of John Still and former England manager Peter Taylor among others during a career that has taken him to Enfield Town, St Albans City, Dagenham & Redbridge, Luton Town, Boreham Wood and Maidstone United. During his playing career, Terry scored at Wembley in the 1977 FA Trophy final for Dagenham FC. He also played for Sutton United, Enfield, Chelmsford City, Tilbury, Dartford and Boreham Wood, and has Isthmian League and Anglo-Italian Cup winners medal to his name. Aged 68.
