HARINGEY BOROUGH FC - A BRIEF HISTORY

It was not until 1970 that a team competed under the name of Haringey Borough when WOOD GREEN TOWN who had played at Coles Park since 1930 changed their name to Haringey Borough. A merger with EDMONTON FC resulted in a brief change of name to Edmonton & Haringey FC until 1976 when the present name was re-adopted. The merged Club played in the Athenian League until it ceased to operate at the end of the 1983/84 season and then played for 4 seasons in Division 2 North of the Isthmian League. After a period of instability culminating in a year in the wilderness away from Senior football in 1988/89 they were admitted to the Spartan League in 1989/90 retaining Premier Division membership throughout until the South Midlands League merger in season 1997/98 when they finished 7th in the Premier Division South to secure membership of the new "combined" Premier Division for 1998/99 as well as being runners up in the League's Premier Division Cup. In 2004 after an unsuccessful attempt to move the Club to the nearby New River Sports stadium and a walk out of the existing Committee Aki Achillea who had commenced his association with the Club in 1995 was appointed to lead the Club forward and together with George Kilikita and Secretary John Bacon the club sought to engage more with the local community and tap into the talent locally.



The senior men's team having been relegated to Division One of the Spartan South Midlands League in 2006/7 bounced back with promotion at the very first attempt and a fine season ended with both promotion and the winning of the Division One Cup. Back in the Premier Division for the season 2008/09 the Club again quickly found itself among the relegation strugglers leading to the appointment of the current Manager – the vastly experienced Tom Loizou. Tom and his excellent loyal team of coaching staff have been instrumental in turning around the Club's fortunes in the intervening years. In 2011/12 a highest ever 5th place was achieved and the League Challenge Trophy won. After massive stadium improvements in the close season with the erection of a new Clubhouse and new dressing rooms hopes were high for 2012/13 but the poor weather and the problematic pitch led to a massive fixture backlog which negated any chance of a serious challenge for honours and the Club finished 9th. In 2013/14 the Club's challenge for promotion took place in the Essex Senior League following a sideways switch imposed by the FA. The Club had what was then its most successful season ever finishing runners up by just a solitary point to Great Wakering Rovers and ended the season with 20 wins and one draw from the final 21 League games. The League title was nevertheless secured at the second attempt in 2014/15 with a haul of 103 points from 38 games and with it promotion to Step 4 in which we were allocated to the Ryman League Division One North. The first season at the higher level was a baptism of fire when only 7 points were garnered from the first 17 games but by the close of the season a further 43 points had been amassed from the remaining 29 games and the Club finished in a comfortable 15th place. The first season in the FA Trophy produced two fine victories before a replay loss to Hitchin Town of the Evostik South Premier Division. The summer of 2016 saw yet further investment in the close season in the form of a 3G synthetic main pitch and added improvements to the perimeter, the spectator rails and the floodlights and has created a facility of which the Club can be proud; and has afforded a greater opportunity for the Club to move forward in all aspects. The first team in 2016/17 improved markedly on the previous season and had an excellent all round campaign although rather unfortunate not to finish the season on a high having ended with the "double heartbreak" of missing out on promotion through a 4-5 closely fought semi final play-off defeat at Maldon & Tiptree FC after finishing 5th in the Division and an odd goal 2-3 London Senior Cup semi-final loss at Metropolitan Police. But 2017/18 was to be the Club's best ever and culminated in promotion to Step 3 via the play-off route with a 3-1 win over Canvey Island after automatic promotion had been missed by just two points. And in FA Competitions the 4th and final round of the Qualifying rounds for the FA Cup was reached, although that ended in disappointment with a 2-4 home defeat by Heybridge Swifts who then enjoyed a visit to Exeter City in the First Round Proper. In the FA Trophy we went right through the qualifying campaign and were lucky enough to draw Leyton Orient in the First Round Proper which brought a record attendance of 1,133 to Coles Park and "The O's" left mightily relieved at having come back to win 2-1 after going a goal down in the fifth minute. 2018/19 was another great but ultimately disappointing season with an FA Cup run which took us into the First Round Proper where it was

ended rather cruelly by AFC Wimbledon's last minute goal at Coles Park in front of a record crowd of 2,710. Having led the Premier Division for several weeks in mid-season it was somewhat surprising that we dropped from 2nd to 3rd on the last day of the season after a poor late run but still enjoyed home advantage in the Play-Off Semi-final in which a 45 minute second half onslaught on the Tonbridge Angels goal produced only one goal in response to the two they had scored before the interval. The 2019/20 season's early termination was less of a disappointment for us than for most other Isthmian Premier Division Clubs as we were marooned in mid-table with no realistic prospect of entering either the promotion or relegation zones. The highlight of the season should have been the visit of National League Yeovil Town in the Final Qualifying Round of the Emirates FA Cup but, as is well known, appalling crowd behaviour brought that game to an early end and the second game seemed something of an anti-climax. In fact, without making excuses, that unpleasant episode seems to have adversely affected our players for some time for, whereas we had been well in the promotion places mix, thereafter we just drifted downwards. The early termination of League Fixtures for 2020/21 was more of a blow than was the previous seasons voiding as we were well placed to make a charge towards a play-off place at least. However the Buildbase FA Trophy continued and we enjoyed a run through to the 4th Round Proper when Oxford City of the National League South finally eliminated us 4-2 after we had been two up; en route we had overcome Faversham Town, Bishops Stortford, Eastbourne Borough and Dartford, the last two also being National League South Clubs. The London Senior Cup also carried on and due to withdrawals, we reached the quarter-final without playing a game but lost a penalty shoot out to Hanwell Town after a 2-2 draw. The 2021/22 season was more or less a non-event as regards any real challenge for the League top spots but the semi-finals of The League Cup and the London Senior Cup were reached with both game ending in odd goal defeats in the space of a week. We may well have set a Club record for the highest number of injuries sustained in any season and that even led to an outside chance of relegation towards the end of the season but the failings of others meant we were never in serious danger. 2022/23 was a disappointment in League terms as we lost our way quite early after a start which gave rise to play-off hopes and 15th place was the final outcome. But we did reach the London Senior Cup final where we faced Charlton Athletic Under 23s at Hendon's Silver Jubilee Park. Three down after half an hour we looked dead and buried but fought back ferociously to level with three goals all from set pieces (2 direct free kicks and a penalty) finally going down to a 3-5 defeat after extra time.

2016/17 saw the introduction of a much needed "second" team, formed to compete in the Ryman Development League it being basically intended for Under 21 players but with the facility to include up to 4 older players in every squad. The team held their own comfortably in the League finishing a very creditable 6th place and the benefits of the Club's participation were all too evident with the introduction of a number of players into the first team squad throughout the season and the opportunity for first team squad players to keep fresh and those who were returning from injury had a platform to get fit. Thereby proving the benefits of having such a side. The age restriction was amended to Under 23 for 2017/18 and the team has always been near the top of the table, continued to do well in the following seasons and won the North Division Championship in 2021/22 but lost to South Division Champions Hastings United in the "Champion of Champions" play off. 2022/23 saw the North Division reduced to just 6 teams playing each other 3 times following withdrawals and the League will not be continuing with an Under 23 (Development) Section at all. Youth teams were commenced and run successfully for many years at various age levels with some considerable success particularly at the older age groups including progress into the 2nd round proper of the FA Youth Cup in 2006/07. They were Divisional winners of the Southern Counties Floodlit Youth League in 2004/05 (and also winners of the League's Colwyn Cup competition) and 2009/10. After a few seasons absence from Youth football the Under 18s rejoined the Southern Counties competition in 2017/18, winning its Divisional Championship at the first attempt and finishing towards the top of the table in the following seasons until falling away somewhat and finishing mid-table in 2022/23. This will again provide a pathway for talented local boys to make their way into the first team squad and ultimately the first team itself.

The Women's Team was formed in 1999 and competed in the Eastern Region Womens League winning promotion in its first season and then to its Premier Division for 2002/03; and there they have remained save for two seasons, the first being in 2011/12 following relegation to Division 1 from which they made an immediate Premier Division return as runners-up. Steady improvement began and we were extremely fortunate to have been approached midway through the 2014/15 season by renowned coach and former

professional footballer Steve Browne who at the time was involved in the highly successful S & T Academy Girls football. Steve was duly appointed Manager and preserved the Women's Premier Division status. In 2015/16 a mid table position was easily secured from an uneven campaign which included convincing away wins at the top 2 Clubs and some surprisingly disappointing performances against lower placed teams. In 2017/18, by Christmas the team were runaway League leaders only to be thrown off course by the tragic early death of Steve on New Years Day but after a shaky period the Women re-asserted themselves to win the League Championship on the last day of the season and with it, promotion to the Women's Premier League and followed that up by adding the League Cup with a 5-1 win over Cambridge City to complete the double which was a fitting, lasting legacy for their Manager. The loss of many of the successful squad, several to American University Scholarships, proved too much of a handicap at the higher level and relegation back to the Eastern Regional League was an unsurprising outcome. Now under the stewardship of Bobby Cato significant steps forward seem certain and promotion is again a realistic prospect. An exceptionally young and talented squad was unlucky to find itself in danger of relegation towards the end of the 2021/22 season due to a high number of odd goal defeats but pulled clear with 4 vital points from the last two games. They look capable of going places if they stick together when experience is added to their armoury. The tie up with the Haringey Girl's Academy run by Adem Ali has proved massively successful and for the first time we are in a situation where talented young teenagers are ready and eager to compete for a place in the Women's squad as soon as they turn 16, although being a team substantially composed of schoolgirls in an Adult League is not without its problems.

The foundations are in place for an eventual assault on the title to secure a National League place for the men's senior side and an exciting season is in prospect in which a challenge for at least a Play-off position is a realistic prospect as we pursue our ambition to achieve promotion to the National League should be within the capabilities of our talented squad. The facilities and structures are in place for all the Club's teams to improve and enhance on recent successes.

HISTORY OF HORNCHURCH FC



One hundred years ago Upminster Wanderers was formed, and for fifteen years they played in parks football, in the Romford League. In 1938 they stepped up to the Spartan League, dropping the Wanderers part of the name. Much has changed in the years in between.

Mark Stimson took charge in November 2019, and the following season he took Hornchurch to the greatest year in their history, although when the season came to a premature conclusion in November 2020, we had little idea of what was to follow. The Club was still in the FA Trophy and the Football Association made the decision to complete the competition, albeit behind closed doors. At first, they were considered non-elite and were not allowed to train. As Hornchurch progressed the Club was granted elite status and resumed training. Having defeated Bowers & Pitsea and Wingate & Finchley, Hornchurch defeated six clubs higher up the pyramid to make it to Wembley, where they came back from a goal down at half time to win 3-1 against Hereford.

In the two seasons that followed, they reached the Play-Off Final only to lose on both occasions, A poor start to the 2021-22 season was offset by an unbeaten three-month run, which ensured a Play Off place, but , after winning 3-2 at Enfield Town in the Semi-final, they lost to Cheshunt in the Final before their first ever capacity crowd for a league match. In 2022-23 Hornchurch was top of the table for several months but a poor set of results in March and a highly controversial decision at Horsham on April Fool's Day meant that they had to settle for runners-up, and for the second season in succession they lost in the Play-Off final, again before a capacity crowd.

The club has no intention of standing still, and Steve Morison was appointed manager, as we enter our Centenary Year.

We have come a long way since 1923 – Romford League, Spartan League, and then the Delphian League, and changing our name to Hornchurch & Upminster, to mark the move to our current stadium in Bridge Avenue, in 1952. We were elected to the Athenian League, and dropped the Upminster part of the name in 1960, becoming just Hornchurch FC. They won the Division One championship in 1967 but were relegated in 1969 and promoted back again in 1971.

In 1974-75 were elected to the Isthmian League. In 1978, they were relegated to Division 2 but three years later they were back after achieving the runners-up slot. It was a false dawn, as apart from a tenth-place finish in 1995, it would be 19 years before they again finished in the top half of their table. They survived several brushes with relegation before losing their Division One place in 1986 and continued to struggle in Division Two North. Matters became even worse in 1989 when a fire destroyed the clubhouse and it took many years to recover. Urchins found themselves in Division Three when the regionalised divisions were scrapped in 1991.

Mick Marsden was appointed manager in February 1998 and in his second season he took them to fourth place. Things changed dramatically as the club was taken over and restructured. Second place in Division 3 in 2002-03 brought promotion to Division 1 North. and another runners-up spot followed in 2003 to take Urchins into the Premier Division for the first time.

The near derelict stadium was upgraded, and under manager George Borg Hornchurch gained promotion to the new Conference South after finishing fifth in 2003-04, though the season was more noticeable for reaching the second round of the FA Cup. Darlington were beaten 2-0 in the first round, before Tranmere Rovers stole a controversial 1-0 win in front of TV cameras and a capacity crowd at Bridge Avenue.

Under manager Garry Hill, the team stormed to the top of the Conference South. It seemed too good to be true and it was. In November, with Hornchurch unbeaten in their last 16 matches, the entire squad, all full time, was released. They had reached the first round of the FA Cup before the collapse and the tie at Boston United was fulfilled by six debutants and youth team players. Hornchurch took an early lead but eventually lost 5-2. The season descended into chaos. Almost 100 players wore first team shirts as new manager Tony Choules contrived to avert relegation, despite a 10 point deduction. without it the club would have finished in a remarkable ninth place.

The club reformed as AFC Hornchurch and was placed in the Essex Senior league. Former youth team

manager John Lawrence took charge in May 2005. They ran away with the championship and also won the league's two cup competitions becoming the first side to achieve the treble.

Under manager Colin McBride, Hornchurch returned to the Isthmian League, and romped to a second successive title, unbeaten in their last 35 matches, and amassing 103 points to finish 21 points clear at the top. They also won the Essex Senior Cup for the first time in their history, beating Great Wakering 2-1 at Southend United. Success continued in the Premier Division the following season, finishing 4th to secure a play-off place but losing 3-1 in the semi-final at AFC Wimbledon in front of a crowd of 2,897.

The following season Hornchurch again entertained a Football League club, losing 1-0 to Peterborough United at a packed Bridge Avenue in the First Round of the FA Cup, the only goal coming in stoppage time. The league campaign ended in disappointment when they lost 2-1 at Sutton on the final day of the season, to finish outside the play-offs.

Colin McBride took control of the club as Chairman midway through the 2009-10 campaign in an effort to sort out the financial problems inherited from the previous regime. His assistant Jimmy McFarlane took over team affairs, and Urchins finished ninth in the league. It was a similar story in 2010-11, when Urchins missed out by four points, finishing tenth. But the two Macs achieved their ambition the following season as Urchins finished runners-up. Bury was beaten 3-1 in the play-off Semi-final, and, in a tense final against Lowestoft, Hornchurch won 2-1 with Michael Spencer scoring the winner in the final minute of extra time.

The return to the Conference South proved difficult, and six dropped points to bottom club Truro was decisive as Urchins finished 20th, two points short of safety. A second Essex Senior Cup triumph, coming from behind to beat Grays Athletic 2-1 in the final at Dagenham, provided some consolation. Back in the Isthmian League, Urchins enjoyed a 15-match unbeaten run early in the 2013-14 season, eventually finishing fifth. They won 1-0 at Kingstonian in the Play Off semi-final, but lost 3-0 at Lowestoft in the final, with four key players missing through injury or suspension.

The following season, the local council, closed the stadium to install new floodlights, forcing the first eight league games to be played away from home. Just one point came from those matches and Urchins faced a season-long fight to avoid the drop. With six weeks to go they finally lifted themselves out of the bottom four and looked on course for survival, only to gain just two points came from the last ten games. Urchins hoped to regain their Premier status quickly but it was not to be, as they lost the 2016 Play-off final to Harlow Town and the 2017 semi-final to Thurrock. However it was third time lucky when in season 2017-18 they won Isthmian North by 13 points, amassing 103 goals in total with a goal difference of plus 62.

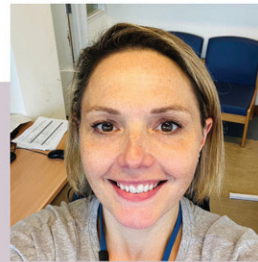

MATCH REPORT

Boro v Tonbridge Angels - FA Cup 2nd Qualifying Round - 16-09-23

Borough were magnificent as they reached the 3rd Qualifying Round of the FA Cup, overcoming a side from National League South 4-2.

Matt Young was the hero with a hat-trick and Figueira put the cherry on top of the icing on the cake with a brilliant 4th.

Boro lined up: Barnes, Addo, O'Donoghue, Sambu, Peter, Jabbie, Aidoo, Iontton, Figueira, Young, Kennedy. Subs: Philippou, Hoti (GK), Aresti, Dema, Bawling, Babalao.

It was a relatively cagey start. The visitors enjoying most of the possession without really threatening, and in fact the first chances fell Boro's way. Mikey had a turn and shot parried and minutes later a Young shot was blocked inside the 6 yard box.

Tonbridge's first effort came via a mistimed header from a corner that drifted wide. Their next effort on 20 minutes was closer but a superb sliding block from Sambu diverted the ball for a corner. And Mikey was soon in the action again deflecting a shot over.

If Tonbridge had looked dangerous for 10 minutes, the game soon swayed towards Boro. Kas had a shot blocked, then Young hit the post after good build up play by Tage and Walter. Another Kas effort was deflected for a corner. From the set piece the ball dropped to Jabbie who was clipped as poked it away from a defender's challenge. The contact was clear, and the ref awarded Boro a penalty. Young stepped up, sent the keeper the wrong way and Boro led with 8 minutes to go in the half.

But within 3 minutes Tonbridge had levelled. A suspicion of a foul in the build up but Boro found themselves short of number. Barnes did well to smother a close range effort, but the ball squirmed away from his grasp for an easy tap in for the striker.

The 3 added minutes looked like they would pass by uneventfully. That is until Tage played a neat touch inside to Young. He strode towards the edge of the area then crashed a right footed effort beyond the reach of the keeper to restore Boro's lead. There was still time for Kas to shoot over from a tight angle as Boro finished the half on top.

The second half began in the same vein as the first. Tonbridge enjoying a lot of possession but Boro being disciplined, only allowing a couple of speculative efforts. There wasn't much flow to the game as the half played out. It had been bitty, punctuated by a few fouls and bookings for both sides. Aresti came on for Kas with 25 minutes to go as Boro looked to close the game out. Within 5 minutes they looked to have done just that. Young received the ball centrally 25 yards out, turned towards goal. His shot flicked off a defender's outstretched leg and looped over the keeper to seal his hat-trick.

Tonbridge came back at Boro. A dangerous low cross couldn't be converted but they did pull a goal with 15 minutes to go. A neat pass in between Dexter and Mikey found its target with the striker lifting the ball into the roof of the net past Barnes.

What might have been a nervy last 15 minutes then turned into the Walter Figueira show. He just failed to connect properly on a shot then set up Jabbie with a mazy run, the shot deflected for a corner. Then, with 8 minutes left came the goal of the game.

A quick series of one touch passes between Mikey, Tage and Walter saw the latter released into space 25 yards from goal on the left. He cut in, looked up and unleashed a beautiful curler into the far top corner.

Tonbridge rarely looked like getting anything back from then on. Indeed, the best chance still fell to Boro as Bobson, who'd replaced Young, crashed a shot off the bar.

The last action saw an overhit Tonbridge corner drift away for a goal kick and Boro advanced.

The draw on Monday 18th pits us against more NLS opposition, this time Dover Athletic away.

THE FA Cup first round proper will always be the Holy Grail for the majority of Non-League clubs.

Yes, of course, the third round proper can be - and often is - the stuff of fairytales.

But, for most, getting to the first round would be something talked about for years to come - especially if that ideal draw comes out.

It's not just about the finances, although they are huge and can help a club immeasurably. But it's also the profile it can bring to a small town or village, the increased interest and, ultimately, the memories for the hard-working volunteers who give their time and energy.

The dream is already on hold for another year at least for hundreds of clubs. The cards of defeat dealt while the summer evenings are still with us.

For others, it inched that bit closer last weekend - and in midweek - following the second round qualifying games.

The third round qualifying draw was released on Monday lunchtime with just two wins required to get into that famous first round proper hat in front of the live TV cameras.

But perhaps that doesn't tell the full depth of story in the FA Cup. With so many former ex-Football League clubs now in Non-League, these days the fourth round qualifying almost has the same feel of the first round proper.

Take last season when Anstey Nomads welcomed Chesterfield at that stage. Not many people at Coalville Town will forget their upset of Notts County on the same day South Shields stunned then-Step 1 Scunthorpe United and Southern League Needham Market beat Maidstone United, also plying their trade in Non-League's top flight at the time.

Notts obviously ended up back in the Football League while Scunny and the Stones dropped down - making them big draws in these two qualifying rounds before the Step 1 clubs enter.

Maidstone travelled to Southern Combination side Steyning Town last Saturday in the second round qualifying - a huge day for the Step 5 club that may have ended in defeat, but was rewarded with a 1,000-plus gate and a will only boost the club's standing in the community. As manager Kev Green told us in the build-up to the Maidstone last week, it was a day to savour for the whole club.

"We've got 400 youth players, boys and girls, a fantastic women's section," he said. "The players and staff are all getting loads of messages saying, unbelievable, well done.

"I dropped a message to the chairman to say, 'You guys deserve as much praise as anyone else for this. You've put it together'. They deserve a lot of credit. Let's enjoy it."

Throw in AFC Stoneham taking on Yeovil Town, Larkhall Athletic welcoming city neighbours Bath City and Tadcaster Albion giving Chester a scare on the BBC's red button.

The feel-good stories come long before the first round proper.

KASIM AIDOO – young left back but with plenty of Isthmian experience having been with Potters Bar Town and briefly Hastings United last season and Cray Wanderers in the previous season as well as National League Eastbourne Borough. Originally with Charlton Athletic Under 21s. Signed in close season

GEORGIOS ARESTI – Cypriot International midfielder who numbers AEK Athens among his previous Clubs; 2017/18 deadline day signing and now virtually an automatic selection for every match.

DILLON BARNES – Goalkeeper, who has played for the Jamaican national team, appeared for Colchester United, Hibernian and most recently Queens Park Rangers.

BOBSON BAWLING – attacking midfielder in second spell with us who left for Hendon at the end of 2021/22 but came back at Christmas 2022. Originally joined us from Enfield Town at the start of the 2020/21 season having previously been with Crawley Town, Woking and St. Albans City.

JORGE DJASSI-SAMBU – midfield powerhouse now in 10th season with Club; opponents know when they have been tackled by this non-stop box to box player. Dangerous in opponents box at set piece situations.

HORNCHURCH FC PLAYER PROFILES 2022-23



JOE CHRISTOU - Midfield - Joe played for Hornchurch in 2014, before moving to Thurrock. After a brief spell at East Thurrock United he joined Waltham Abbey at the start of the 2018-19 season, but missed four months due to injury. He returned to Hornchurch in November 2018, and has made over 160 appearances, scoring 19 goals. He has also played in goal, standing in for two matches last season.

JORDAN CLARK - Defender or Midfield - Jordan spent six seasons at Thurrock, where he scored thirty goals in 152 appearances. With the demise of Thurrock, manager Jim McFarlane quickly signed him for Hornchurch in 2018. Jordan played his 100th match for Hornchurch in our FA Trophy Final at Wembley Stadium, and has now made over 180 appearances.

NATHAN BERTRAM-COOPER – Defender – Nathan joined Hornchurch in 2015 from Romford, but missed the majority of the 2018 season after sustaining an injury in October, and did not play again until August 2019. When the 2019 season was curtailed in November, Nathan joined Hemel Hempstead on dual registration, before their season was also curtailed. He returned to Hornchurch to take his place in the squad for FA Trophy matches. He joined Braintree Town at the start of the 2021 season, and returned to Hornchurch in January 2022, making his 200th appearance at Potters Bar in March. At the end of last season he had made 249 appearances for Hornchurch.

NATHAN GREEN – Left Back – Originally at Charlton Athletic in their youth scheme, Nathan moved on to play for a number of National League clubs including Billericay, Tonbridge Angels and Dagenham and Redbridge in the Football League. He later played for Margate, Dulwich Hamlet and Welling United before linking up with Folkestone Invicta last season where he scored six goals in forty six appearances, and was named Player of the Year, as well as being included in the Isthmian Team of the Year.

DION-CURTIS HENRY – Goalkeeper - Joined Hornchurch from Sittingbourne in August 2023. Previous clubs include Peterborough United 2014-2017, (Soham Town – loan), (Boston United – loan), Crystal Palace 2017-2020, (Maidstone United – loan) – (Hampton & Richmond – loan), Billericay Town 2020, Crawley Town 2021-2023, Brightlingsea Regent Feb-2023.

SAM HIGGINS - Forward - Sam first played for Hornchurch in 2008, but left to join Brentwood, briefly returning the following season. He later joined East Thurrock where he went on to score a record 275 goals. He returned to Hornchurch for the third time in 2020, and despite being absent due to injury for some months, he played a massive contribution in our FA Trophy victory. He was included in the Isthmian Team of the Year, and was named as Isthmian Player of the Year.

TOMMIE HOBAN – Defender - Tommie joined Hornchurch in July 2023. Tommie is a defender who started his career at Arsenal youth setup before moving to Watford where he made his professional debut in 2011. He went on to make 54 appearances for Watford before making loan moves to Blackburn Rovers and Aberdeen, where he made a permanent move in 2020. Tommie has also 18 appearances for the Republic of Ireland at U17, U18 & U19 level.

JACK LEAHY – Wing forward - Jack played for Brighton & Hove Albion U18s, and had a spell on loan at Merstham, before joining Cardiff City, where he spent two seasons, with an extended loan at Haverfordwest County in the League of Wales.

QUENTIN MONVILLE – Forward - Quentin played for Concord Rangers last season, joining in March from Potters Bar. His previous clubs include Bowers & Pitsea, Wingate & Finchley and Billericay Town. He has played against Hornchurch on four occasions, twice for Bowers and twice for Potters Bar.

OLLIE MULDOON – Midfield – Ollie spent four seasons at Charlton, later playing for Braintree Town, Dagenham & Redbridge, Gillingham, Maidstone Utd and Chelmsford City. He joined Hornchurch in October 2020 and quickly established himself in the starting line-up, where his wealth of experience has proved invaluable.

LIAM NASH – Forward – Liam previously played for Billericay, Aveley, Hemel Hempstead, Dartford and Concord Rangers, and also made 15 appearances in the Football League at Gillingham. He is better known for his one season at Maldon & Tiptree, where he scored 36 goals in 47 appearances in 2016-17. His transfer to Hornchurch was delayed as international clearance was difficult to obtain after he played in Gibraltar, but he has maintained his scoring record at Hornchurch, including the sensational second goal at Wembley, where he was named Player of the Match. Liam was included in the Isthmian Team of the Year last season, and has now played over 100 times for Hornchurch.

GEORGE SAUNDERS – Forward – spent 3 seasons at Billericay Town in their youth scheme before playing for Harold Hill and Kelvedon Hatch in the Essex Olympian League. George stepped up four divisions to play for Hornchurch in 2018, and after scoring 7 goals in 84 appearances, he joined Dagenham & Redbridge, where in three seasons he scored five goals in 64 appearances, despite missing almost twelve months due to a badly broken leg.

SEAN SCANNELL – Forward - Sean joined Hornchurch in July 2023. Sean started his career with Crystal Palace spending 9 years at the club making 140 appearances. He then moved to Huddersfield Town, where he made 158 appearances, spending 6 years at the club. Sean spent time at Bradford City, Blackpool and Grimsby. He also played at U17, U18, U19, U21 and B level for the Republic of Ireland.

RYAN SCOTT – Defender - Ryan was with Aveley for the last 2 seasons making 82 appearances for the Millers and scoring on 14 occasions, his final goal being the winner in last season's play-off final against Hornchurch. He started with Barnet before moving to Wingate and Finchley and then Billericay Town. He also played for East Thurrock, Braintree Town and Concord Rangers before signing for Aveley. He was a key member of the Millers defence that earned back to back promotions from the Isthmian North and Isthmian Premier and was named in the Isthmian Premier Team of the Season for 2022/23.

LEWWIS SPENCE – Midfield - Lewwis was previously with Thurrock where he made 181 appearances scoring 46 goals in five seasons, briefly interrupted by a spell at Greenwich Borough. He quickly established himself at Hornchurch and together with Rickie Hayles held up the FA Trophy at Wembley. He is club captain and has made over 150 appearances, and his 26 goals include several scored from the half way line.

REMI SUTTON – Left Back or Central Defender - After playing for Hornchurch in their Capital League side in 2008-09, Remi played for Canvey Island, Great Wakering and Basildon United before joining Thurrock in December 2013. He made 200 appearances at Thurrock, scoring eleven goals. Remi was included in the Isthmian League Team of the Year for 2021-22. He has now made over 140 appearances for Hornchurch.

TOM WRAIGHT – Midfield – Tom played for Tilbury, Witham Town, East Thurrock and Maidstone, joining Chelmsford City in 2018. Despite missing much of the 2019-20 season with a serious knee injury, he went on to make 79 appearances for City, scoring 17 goals, and becoming their captain in 2021. Tom has a remarkable scoring record with every club he played for, and he carried on where he left off with a goal on his Hornchurch debut, and has scored 30 goals in 68 appearances.
