## HARINGEY BOROUGH FC - A BRIEF HISTORY



It was not until 1970 that a team competed under the name of Haringey Borough when WOOD GREEN TOWN who had played at Coles Park since 1930 changed their name to Haringey Borough. A merger with EDMONTON FC resulted in a brief change of name to Edmonton & Haringey FC until 1976 when the present name was re-adopted. The merged Club played in the Athenian League until it ceased to operate at the end of the 1983/84 season and then played for 4 seasons in Division 2 North of the Isthmian League. After a period of instability culminating in a year in the wilderness away from Senior football in 1988/89 they were admitted to the Spartan League in 1989/90 retaining Premier Division membership throughout until the South Midlands League merger in season 1997/98 when they finished 7th in the Premier Division South to secure membership of the new "combined" Premier Division for 1998/99 as well as being runners up in the League's Premier Division Cup. In 2004 after an unsuccessful attempt to move the Club to the nearby New River Sports stadium and a walk out of the existing Committee Aki Achillea who had commenced his association with the Club in 1995 was appointed to lead the Club forward and together with George Kilikita and Secretary John Bacon the club sought to engage more with the local community and tap into the talent locally.

The senior men's team having been relegated to Division One of the Spartan South Midlands League in 2006/7 bounced back with promotion at the very first attempt and a fine season ended with both promotion and the winning of the Division One Cup. Back in the Premier Division for the season 2008/09 the Club again quickly found itself among the relegation strugglers leading to the appointment of the current Manager – the vastly experienced Tom Loizou. Tom and his excellent loyal team of coaching staff have been instrumental in turning around the Club's fortunes in the intervening years. In 2011/12 a highest ever 5th place was achieved and the League Challenge Trophy won. After massive stadium improvements in the close season with the erection of a new Clubhouse and new dressing rooms hopes were high for 2012/13 but the poor weather and the problematic pitch led to a massive fixture backlog which negated any chance of a serious challenge for honours and the Club finished 9th. In 2013/14 the Club's challenge for promotion took place in the Essex Senior League following a sideways switch imposed by the FA. The Club had what was then its most successful season ever finishing runners up by just a solitary point to Great Wakering Rovers and ended the season with 20 wins and one draw from the final 21 League games. The League title was nevertheless secured at the second attempt in 2014/15 with a haul of 103 points from 38 games and with it promotion to Step 4 in which we were allocated to the Ryman League Division One North. The first season at the higher level was a baptism of fire when only 7 points were garnered from the first 17 games but by the close of the season a further 43 points had been amassed from the remaining 29 games and the Club finished in a comfortable 15th place. The first season in the FA Trophy produced two fine victories before a replay loss to Hitchin Town of the Evostik South Premier Division. The summer of 2016 saw yet further investment in the close season in the form of a 3G synthetic main pitch and added improvements to the perimeter, the spectator rails and the floodlights and has created a facility of which the Club can be proud; and has afforded a greater opportunity for the Club to move forward in all aspects. The first team in 2016/17 improved markedly on the previous season and had an excellent all round campaign although rather unfortunate not to finish the season on a high having ended with the "double heartbreak" of missing out on promotion through a 4-5 closely fought semi final play-off defeat at Maldon & Tiptree FC after finishing 5th in the Division and an odd goal 2-3 London Senior Cup semi-final loss at Metropolitan Police. But 2017/18 was to be the Club's best ever and culminated in promotion to Step 3 via the play-off route with a 3-1 win over Canvey Island after automatic promotion had been missed by just two points. And in FA Competitions the 4th and final round of the Qualifying rounds for the FA Cup was reached, although that ended in disappointment with a 2-4 home defeat by Heybridge Swifts who then enjoyed a visit to Exeter City in the First Round Proper. In the FA Trophy we went right through the qualifying campaign and were lucky enough to draw Leyton Orient in the First Round Proper which brought a record attendance of 1,133 to Coles Park and "The O's" left mightily relieved at having come back to win 2-1 after going a goal down in the fifth minute. 2018/19 was another great but ultimately disappointing season with an FA Cup run which took us into the First Round Proper where it was

ended rather cruelly by AFC Wimbledon's last minute goal at Coles Park in front of a record crowd of 2,710. Having led the Premier Division for several weeks in mid-season it was somewhat surprising that we dropped from 2nd to 3rd on the last day of the season after a poor late run but still enjoyed home advantage in the Play-Off Semi-final in which a 45 minute second half onslaught on the Tonbridge Angels goal produced only one goal in response to the two they had scored before the interval. The 2019/20 season's early termination was less of a disappointment for us than for most other Isthmian Premier Division Clubs as we were marooned in mid-table with no realistic prospect of entering either the promotion or relegation zones. The highlight of the season should have been the visit of National League Yeovil Town in the Final Qualifying Round of the Emirates FA Cup but, as is well known, appalling crowd behaviour brought that game to an early end and the second game seemed something of an anti-climax. In fact, without making excuses, that unpleasant episode seems to have adversely affected our players for some time for, whereas we had been well in the promotion places mix, thereafter we just drifted downwards. The early termination of League Fixtures for 2020/21 was more of a blow than was the previous seasons voiding as we were well placed to make a charge towards a play-off place at least. However the Buildbase FA Trophy continued and we enjoyed a run through to the 4th Round Proper when Oxford City of the National League South finally eliminated us 4-2 after we had been two up; en route we had overcome Faversham Town, Bishops Stortford, Eastbourne Borough and Dartford, the last two also being National League South Clubs. The London Senior Cup also carried on and due to withdrawals, we reached the quarter-final without playing a game but lost a penalty shoot out to Hanwell Town after a 2-2 draw. The 2021/22 season was more or less a non-event as regards any real challenge for the League top spots but the semi-finals of The League Cup and the London Senior Cup were reached with both game ending in odd goal defeats in the space of a week. We may well have set a Club record for the highest number of injuries sustained in any season and that even led to an outside chance of relegation towards the end of the season but the failings of others meant we were never in serious danger. 2022/23 was a disappointment in League terms as we lost our way quite early after a start which gave rise to play-off hopes and 15th place was the final outcome. But we did reach the London Senior Cup final where we faced Charlton Athletic Under 23s at Hendon's Silver Jubilee Park. Three down after half an hour we looked dead and buried but fought back ferociously to level with three goals all from set pieces (2 direct free kicks and a penalty) finally going down to a 3-5 defeat after extra time.

2016/17 saw the introduction of a much needed "second" team, formed to compete in the Ryman Development League it being basically intended for Under 21 players but with the facility to include up to 4 older players in every squad. The team held their own comfortably in the League finishing a very creditable 6th place and the benefits of the Club's participation were all too evident with the introduction of a number of players into the first team squad throughout the season and the opportunity for first team squad players to keep fresh and those who were returning from injury had a platform to get fit. Thereby proving the benefits of having such a side. The age restriction was amended to Under 23 for 2017/18 and the team has always been near the top of the table, continued to do well in the following seasons and won the North Division Championship in 2021/22 but lost to South Division Champions Hastings United in the "Champion of Champions" play off. 2022/23 saw the North Division reduced to just 6 teams playing each other 3 times following withdrawals and the League will not be continuing with an Under 23 (Development) Section at all. Youth teams were commenced and run successfully for many years at various age levels with some considerable success particularly at the older age groups including progress into the 2nd round proper of the FA Youth Cup in 2006/07. They were Divisional winners of the Southern Counties Floodlit Youth League in 2004/05 (and also winners of the League's Colwyn Cup competition) and 2009/10. After a few seasons absence from Youth football the Under 18s rejoined the Southern Counties competition in 2017/18, winning its Divisional Championship at the first attempt and finishing towards the top of the table in the following seasons until falling away somewhat and finishing mid-table in 2022/23. This will again provide a pathway for talented local boys to make their way into the first team squad and ultimately the first team itself.

The Women's Team was formed in 1999 and competed in the Eastern Region Womens League winning promotion in its first season and then to its Premier Division for 2002/03; and there they have remained save for two seasons, the first being in 2011/12 following relegation to Division 1 from which they made an immediate Premier Division return as runners-up. Steady improvement began and we were extremely fortunate to have been approached midway through the 2014/15 season by renowned coach and former

professional footballer Steve Browne who at the time was involved in the highly successful S & T Academy Girls football. Steve was duly appointed Manager and preserved the Women's Premier Division status. In 2015/16 a mid table position was easily secured from an uneven campaign which included convincing away wins at the top 2 Clubs and some surprisingly disappointing performances against lower placed teams. In 2017/18, by Christmas the team were runaway League leaders only to be thrown off course by the tragic early death of Steve on New Years Day but after a shaky period the Women re-asserted themselves to win the League Championship on the last day of the season and with it, promotion to the Women's Premier League and followed that up by adding the League Cup with a 5-1 win over Cambridge City to complete the double which was a fitting, lasting legacy for their Manager. The loss of many of the successful squad, several to American University Scholarships, proved too much of a handicap at the higher level and relegation back to the Eastern Regional League was an unsurprising outcome. Now under the stewardship of Bobby Cato significant steps forward seem certain and promotion is again a realistic prospect. An exceptionally young and talented squad was unlucky to find itself in danger of relegation towards the end of the 2021/22 season due to a high number of odd goal defeats but pulled clear with 4 vital points from the last two games. They look capable of going places if they stick together when experience is added to their armoury. The tie up with the Haringey Girl's Academy run by Adem Ali has proved massively successful and for the first time we are in a situation where talented young teenagers are ready and eager to compete for a place in the Women's squad as soon as they turn 16, although being a team substantially composed of schoolgirls in an Adult League is not without its problems.

The foundations are in place for an eventual assault on the title to secure a National League place for the men's senior side and an exciting season is in prospect in which a challenge for at least a Play-off position is a realistic prospect as we pursue our ambition to achieve promotion to the National League should be within the capabilities of our talented squad. The facilities and structures are in place for all the Club's teams to improve and enhance on recent successes.

The Directors and Committee of *HARINGEY BOROUGH FOOTBALL CLUB* take pleasure in extending a warm welcome to all visitors to Coles Park and hope that they will make use of the bar and refreshment facilities available to increase their enjoyment of the occasion.

## HISTORY OF DULWICH HAMLET FC



The Hamlet are back in the Isthmian League for the 2023-24 season for the first time since 2018 following five years in the National League South.

Those five seasons at Step 2 represented the highest level achieved during our 130-year history but ended in heartbreak on the final day of last season. Only needing a point to avoid the drop against Chippenham Town, the side would lose 1-0 in front of a sell-out 3,334 at Champion Hill, with other results elsewhere condemning us to relegation.

The club with the famous pink and blue shirts can boast an illustrious past as a giant of the amateur game. Our story began back in 1893. During that summer, Lorraine 'Pa' Wilson was handed a sum of one shilling and eight pence by a couple of keen young footballers and asked to start a Dulwich Hamlet Football Club. He tackled the task with great relish and over the next thirty years, helped to build Dulwich into a powerful force. The early days were tough. The club's original ground in Woodward Road had no changing facilities. On match days the players used to walk half a mile to get from their dressing room to the pitch, often carrying the goalposts, crossbars, and corner flags with them.

Dulwich made their competitive debut when they joined the Camberwell League in 1894-95. The following season the championship of that league's 'B' Division became the first entry in our honours list. After achieving senior status in 1900, we won our first Surrey Senior Cup in 1905, and still hold the competition record with 16 wins, most recently in 1975. In 1907, Dulwich gained election to the Isthmian League.

During the First World War, the legendary Edgar Kail joined Dulwich. In his fourteen-year career, Kail scored 427 goals, and played three times for the full England side, scoring twice on his debut against France. Kail helped Dulwich to league titles in 1920, 1926 and 1933, two FA Amateur Cup triumphs in 1920 and 1932, and the London Senior Cup in 1925. Another Hamlet legend of that era was goalkeeper Bert Coleman who gained a full England cap in 1921, keeping a clean sheet against Wales. Dulwich's other major successes between the wars were further Amateur Cup wins in 1934 and 1937, and another London Senior Cup victory in 1939.

Dulwich were quickly into their stride post-war and in 1949 they were Isthmian League champions for a fourth time. In 1950 they lifted the London Senior Cup again. One of the most popular players of the period was left-winger Tommy Jover whose career goals tally for Dulwich has only been bettered by Kail. Tommy completed more than seventy years service as player, official and President from 1985 until his death in 2008. The club's main stand is named in his honour.

Dulwich went through a lean spell during the 1960s and 70s, culminating in relegation from the top division. However, they bounced straight back under manager Alan Smith, winning the Division One championship at the first attempt in 1978.

Since the phasing out of amateur football in the 1970s, Dulwich have been semi-professional and compete in the FA Trophy. Their best run so far in the competition was in 1979-80 when they reached the quarter-finals, this was repeated in 2016-17.

As the 1980s progressed, the club fell on hard times again and despite a London Senior Cup success in 1984 they struggled in the Isthmian League, being relegated to Division One in 1990. It took two years to return, an exciting finale to the 1991-92 campaign saw the Hamlet earn promotion on the final day of the season. Dulwich were able to celebrate their centenary by moving into a new stadium. For a long time, our old ground was the mecca for amateur football, opening in 1931. In 1933, Kingstonian and Stockton played in a record-breaking 20,744-strong crowd for the FA Amateur Cup Final. Due to disrepair, the old ground had to be altered to satisfy safety regulations. In 1991, Sainsbury's redevelopment of the area demolished the stadium.

Frank Murphy transformed us into championship contenders again in the mid-1990s, before the decade ended with a run to the FA Cup First Round under Dave Garland. The club also lifted the London Challenge Cup in 1999, beating Uxbridge 2-1.

Relegation occurred again in 2001, which brought a long spell back in Division One. Promotion was almost regained under Martin Eede in 2004, however a 4-5 penalty loss to Wealdstone in a promotion play-off

ended those dreams. Three days later, we beat Tooting & Mitcham United for our fifth and most recent London Senior Cup title.

Eede was succeeded first by Wayne Burnett and then Craig Edwards, before the arrival of former player Gavin Rose in the summer of 2009 as manager gave the club an upturn in fortunes. After a mid-table finish in his first year, he took the side to the Division One South play-off final in 2011, only to lose 4-3 to Leatherhead after extra time.

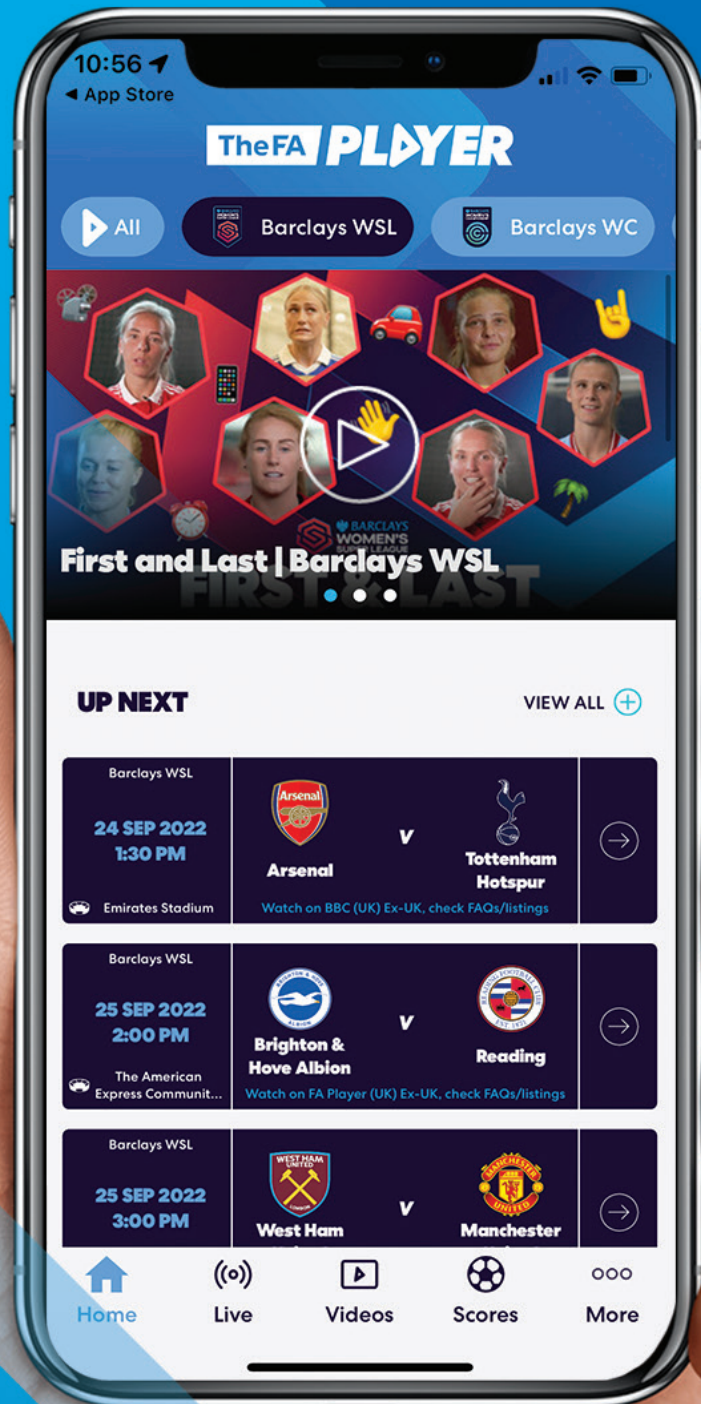
Rose would lose the final again 12 months later, but undeterred, 2012-13 would bring joy. Blending a mixture of experience with exciting youngsters, the Hamlet were involved in a scintillating title race with Maidstone United, with the season going to the final weekend. Against Burgess Hill Town at home, a second half strike from Xavier Vidal earned the point we needed to secure the title.

2017-18 brought more success, as we ended with a club-record 95 points in second place. This was made even more impressive by the fact that we had been evicted from Champion Hill that March, with home games at Tooting & Mitcham United. Leiston were beaten in the semi-final, before goalkeeper Amadou Tangara was the hero in the final, saving two Hendon penalties in the shootout after a 1-1 draw, with Dipo Akinyemi striking the winning spot-kick to send us to the National League South.

Life at Step 2 was a rollercoaster, with a 14th-placed finish in our first season. The following year brought an appearance in the FA Cup First Round, televised live on BBC1 against Carlisle United. 2021-22 brought us a 10th-placed finish, the highest position in the club's history.

Last season, the club parted company with Rose after 13 years in charge, with Paul Barnes replacing him. However, a loss of form in the spring saw another change, as Hakan Hayrettin came in, but despite keeping us in the running for survival, that defeat on the final day condemned us to the drop.

A warm welcome to Dulwich Hamlet for this FA Cup 1st Qualifying Round Replay, we hope you enjoy your visit.

We also welcome our officials, referee Craig Barnett and his assistants Lawrence Attoh and Neil Angus.

Following Saturday's 1-1 draw tonight's game has to have a winner, if the scores are level at the end of 90 minutes, there will a 30 minute period of extra-time and if the teams still cannot be separated, a penalty shoot out will take place.

## MATCH REPORTS

### Boro v Enfield Town 28/08/2023)

Boro gave their best performance of the season so far, in front of a bumper bank holiday crowd gaining their first league point of the season, whilst also ending Enfield's 100% start in an entertaining 1-1 draw.

Boro dominated for large parts of the game and led at half time through Matt Young's first half penalty. But the crucial second goal eluded us and as Enfield started pressing they forced an equaliser in stoppage time. Boro lined up: Barnes, Adoo, O'Donoghue, Richards, Pater, Jabbir, Aidoo, Sambu, Figueira, Young, Kennedy  
Subs: Georgiou, Philippou, Iontton, Bawling, Kowalkowski.

Boro started brightly and won a first corner after 2 minutes. Another half chance went as Sambu couldn't gather cleanly when well placed and he also just failed to beat the Enfield keeper Forster to a floated through ball. Adoo and Aidoo were linking well and forced a second corner, Boro kept the ball in the final third but couldn't fashion a clear cross or shot. It was then Sambu again who got the faintest of touches to a superb Young free kick but not enough to direct it on target.

The first signs of life from Enfield didn't materialise until midway though the half, but confident collect from Barnes, and then a wayward header were all the league leaders had to show for their efforts.

Boro were soon back on the front foot. Young played a delicious defence splitting ball for Tage to run onto. One on one with Forster his shot was diverted round the post.

Figueira was a constant menace to Enfield's centre halves and he fashioned a very good chance from the edge of the area. His shot was parried and Aidoo somewhat scuffed the follow up.

While the defence were cancelling out any semblance of Enfield getting back into the game more hold up play from Figueira won a free kick near the corner on the right. Young swung it in, it was missed by Kennedy and a defender at the near post but drifted inches beyond the far post. But Boro's dominance was rewarded 5 minutes before half time when Aidoo beat his full back and was brought down as he shaped to cross.

The ref had no hesitation awarding the penalty and Young confidently sent the keeper the wrong way to give Boro a thoroughly deserved lead.

Boro still had time to make one more chance. Figueira and Aidoo combined to put Sambu through but as the angle tightened and the keeper advanced, he could only turn his shot into Forster's chest. But so did Enfield when Mikey was alert to clear a header from a corner away from the line in the final action of the half.

The second half started with Enfield no playing with the wind. Boro had used a very effective tactic of turning the Enfield back line with balls into the channels, but this would be trickier with the wind holding the ball up. And it took Boro some time to get into the second half. Barnes was forced into a smart close range save and most of the play was in Boro's defensive third, before Boro threatened again. Sambu, twice, and Young, both had efforts saved or go narrowly wide, and Tage was unlucky to see an effort deflected for a corner after his initial shot was blocked. Young was again involved as Forster, again, made a good save at his near post from a free kick central, 30 yards from goal.

With 20 minutes remaining it still looked more likely that Boro would extend their lead rather than Enfield equalise, but Raks was then forced off after a collision with Barnes as the keeper cleared a back pass. The reshuffle meant Mikey went central, and Stef came on at left back. Crucially, it left the midfield pair of Sambu and Jabbir intact which gave Boro a bit more stability than they otherwise might have had.

As the game went into the final 15 minutes the threats were getting more even. Tage had another shot saved after cutting in off the left, and Sambu one wide, but Enfield had threatened from a series of free kicks and corners.

In an attempt to keep the energy levels up Iontton and Kowalkowski replaced the outstanding Young and Figueira, but Enfield had started to apply more pressure as the half wore on.

Barnes was alert, then got a little lucky as he came out of his area to header clear. Fortunately, the ball ricocheted to Adoo who mopped up the danger and there was an almighty goalmouth scramble with Boro making multiple blocks before being able to clear.

As we went into 5 minutes of added time Barnes saw a shot flash past the post before he was finally beaten. A neat move between Youngs and Wyllie saw the latter fire low to the near post. Barnes got down well but couldn't prevent the ball squirming under him and nestling in the net.



A lengthy stoppage when Stef took a knock meant added time was eventually 9 minutes. But neither side were able to summon any final chance of note.

This was by far Boro's best performance of the season. To a player they were excellent and really should have won the match on chances. But, we're off the mark, and the 946 in attendance were treated to a terrific game.

### **Dulwich Hamlet v Boro (FA Cup 1st Qualifying Round 02-09-23)**

Boro and Dulwich played out a 1-1 draw to trigger a replay in this largely uneventful first outing in the cup for both sides this season.

Dulwich converted a first half penalty, which was cancelled out late on by one for Boro. Before, in between and after each one neither keeper was seriously troubled as both sides cancelled each other out.

With Raks injured in Bank Holiday Monday's game versus Enfield, and George in the squad for the first time this season Boro lined up:

Barnes, Adoo, O'Donoghue, Sambu, Peter, Jabbir, Aidoo, Iontton, Figueira, Young, Kennedy

Subs: Bawling, Philippou, Babloa, Kowalkowski, Aresti.

The first 15 minutes brought little to raise the blood pressure. The ball spent a lot of time pinging around midfield with neither side able to gain control. Both defences were well marshalled and from Boro's perspective we couldn't get Kas and Tage on the ball, or get our full backs overlapping. Until Dulwich won a free kick just inside Boro's half. The ball was played into Boro's box, and just as quickly the ref pointed to the spot for some overphysical defending. Wanadio confidently stepped up and despite Barnes diving the right way, struck the penalty high beyond his reach to give the hosts the lead.

And then the half returned to the pattern of the opening 15 minutes. Boro did get into better positions, winning a number of free kicks and corners in the opposition half, but couldn't find a final telling pass, or an opening for a clear shot.

Boro's first shot in anger came early in the second half. A clearance fell to Mikey on the edge of the area. He hit it, not cleanly, first time with his right foot. The ball deflected off a defender but didn't wrong foot the keeper enough who was able to kick the ball away as he dived to his left. From the resulting corner Boro kept the ball in and around the Dulwich area but again couldn't find a telling ball.

On the hour Tom brought on Bobson and Babaloo for Iontton and Aidoo. It took a while for the changes to have any effect, but Boro threatened more as the game went into the last quarter.

Bobson shot over after good work from young and Figueira, then the latter did the same when Babaloo looked well placed for a ball across goal. A Dulwich defensive mix up saw a clearing header drop narrowly wide for a Boro corner which came to nothing.

With 5 minutes to go the game appeared to be finally opening up. Dulwich were thwarted on a counter attack as Boro were caught short in midfield, and then finally, with a minute of normal time to go, Boro got their break. We kept the ball alive in the penalty area and as Mikey steered the ball round a defender he was clipped. In truth the decision looked a little soft, like the Dulwich penalty, but no matter. Matty Young sent the keeper the wrong way to level things up, celebrating with the 100 or so Boro fans behind the goal.

One last half chance fell to Dulwich deep in added time but what turned out to be a tame effort was easily gathered by Barnes.

With the draw for the 2nd QR on Monday lunchtime place we'll know our potential opponents when the replay takes place.

**KASIM AIDOO** – young left back but with plenty of Isthmian experience having been with Potters Bar Town and briefly Hastings United last season and Cray Wanderers in the previous season as well as National League Eastbourne Borough. Originally with Charlton Athletic Under 21s. Signed in close season

**GEORGIOS ARESTI** – Cypriot International midfielder who numbers AEK Athens among his previous Clubs; 2017/18 deadline day signing and now virtually an automatic selection for every match.

**DILLON BARNES** – Goalkeeper, who has played for the Jamaican national team, appeared for Colchester United, Hibernian and most recently Queens Park Rangers.

**BOBSON BAWLING** – attacking midfielder in second spell with us who left for Hendon at the end of 2021/22 but came back at Christmas 2022. Originally joined us from Enfield Town at the start of the 2020/21 season having previously been with Crawley Town, Woking and St. Albans City.

**CHRISTOS DJAMAS** – Cypriot Under 21 International signed in October 2020. Midfielder who was most recently on contract at Othello Athienoy and previously with Apoel Nicosia and Agia Napa.

**JORGE DJASSI-SAMBU** – midfield powerhouse now in 10th season with Club; opponents know when they have been tackled by this non-stop box to box player. Dangerous in opponents box at set piece situations.

**R'AVAN CONSTABLE** – Goalkeeper – Goalkeeper who reunited with Hakan Hayrettin at the Hamlet this summer having previously worked with him at Maidstone in 2020-21. Has also played for Barnet, Potters Bar Town, Wealdstone, Hayes & Yeading United, Beaconsfield Town and Hanwell Town. Aged 28.

**JACK RUDDY** – Goalkeeper – Goalkeeper who was recommended to the Hamlet in the summer of 2023 by ex-Gillingham goalkeeper Jim Stannard. Impressed during pre-season with a string of fine performances, notably at Aveley and Cray Valley PM. Jack grew up in Glasgow and was coached as a child by Scotland legend Andy Goram at Rangers, before moving abroad to Real Murcia. Back in England with Bury, he then moved on to Wolves, enjoying loan spells in England, Scotland and Spain. After spells with Plymouth Argyle and Linfield, Jack returned to his native Scotland, and joined us after ending the season with Cowdenbeath. Has also been capped at Under-19s, Under-20s and Under-21s level for Scotland. Aged 25.

**JEROME BINNOM-WILLIAMS** – Defender – Impressive defender who joined in the summer of 2023. Incredibly strong, as well as both-footed, Jerome reunites with Hakan Hayrettin after helping Maidstone win the National League South title in 2022. Came through the Crystal Palace academy before leaving in 2016 for Peterborough United, and then Chesterfield. He has played in the National League with Halifax Town and Barnet, before moving to the Stones in August 2021. Aged 28.

**CRAIG BRAHAM-BARRETT** – Defender – Returned to the club in 2023 having first played for us back in 2007, making four appearances before going Potters Bar Town. Craig has been on the books of Football League clubs during his career, including Peterborough United and Cheltenham Town, before playing at either Step 1 or Step 2 since 2015, playing for the likes of Ebbsfleet United, Woking, Whitehawk, Dover Athletic, Braintree Town, Welling United, Hemel Hempstead Town, Dartford and Tonbridge Angels. He is also a Montserrat international and has captained his country. Aged 35.

**MICHAEL CHAMBERS** – Defender – Popular defender who returns for a third spell for 23-24. Began his senior career for the Hamlet, playing nine games during the 2011-12 season having come through the academy, before signing for Crystal Palace. Michael would have loan spells with Harrow Borough and Welling United whilst at the Eagles, signing for the latter permanently in 2015 before rejoining the Hamlet a year later. In three seasons back at Champion Hill, he would play a huge role in helping us reach the FA Trophy quarter-finals in 2017, promotion to the National League South a year later, and keeping us away from relegation in our first year at that level. After departing for Wrexham, he would then move on to Chelmsford City and Bromley, before spending the last two years at Billericay Town, where he was captain. Aged 29.

**JERRY GYEBI** – Defender – Defender who signed in the summer of 2023 from Hungerford Town. Impressed during his time at Bulpit Lane last season but was unable to prevent the Crusaders from being relegated. Prior to Hungerford he spent two seasons with Enfield Town, and has experience of playing in Slovenia and Sweden, as well as in England with Yeovil Town, Barnstaple Town and Poole Town. Aged 23.

**SANCHEZ MING** – Defender – Returned to the Club during the summer of 2020 for his fourth spell at Champion Hill. Originally a winger, he now plays at right-back and has clocked up 269 appearances in Hamlet's colours. He started out with Gavin Rose's Aspire Academy side and his former clubs include Fisher Athletic, Welling United, Bromley and Bishop's Stortford. Was the only player to appear in every minute under Hakan Hayrettin last season. Aged 33.

**MANNY PARRY** - Defender – Experienced defender who signed in July 2023 from Welling United. Manny played under Hakan Hayrettin previously at Braintree Town during the 2016-17 season and has played more than 270 league games in the National League and National League South, including for the likes of Dover Athletic, Boreham Wood, Woking and Maidenhead United. Aged 29.

**MIQUEL SCARLETT** – Defender – Defender who returned for a second spell this summer. Was on the books of the Hamlet during the autumn of 2021 but didn't make an appearance due to struggling with tendonitis. After taking some time out to recover, Miquel had a solid season with Eastbourne Borough in 2022-23, playing 28 times in the National League South. Also been on the books of Gillingham, Colchester United and West Ham United. Capped four times by Guyana. Aged 22.

**CEM TUMKAYA** – Defender – Defender who joined in the summer of 2023. Cem has spent his entire career with Cray Valley PM, making his debut in 2016 and going on to play 236 times for the Millers both at Step 5 and Step 4. 2018-19 would be a sensational season for the defender, as he made 57 appearances in all competitions as they won the Southern Counties East Premier Division title, and reached the final of the FA Vase, with Cem starting the 3-1 defeat to Chertsey Town. Aged 25.

**ALFIE ALLEN** – Midfielder – Young talent who signed from Millwall in the summer of 2023. Alfie has yet to play senior football, but arrives off the back of a sensational season for the Lions' Under-21 side, for whom he played in 25 of their 28 league games in the Professional Development League South Division as they won the title, and then played every minute of both playoff games at the end of the season as they clinched the overall title. Aged 20.

**ANTHONY JEFFREY** – Midfielder – Explosive winger with rapid pace who joined from Billericay Town in the summer. A Guyana international, AJ began his career with Arsenal, having loan spells at Stevenage and Boreham Wood before joining Wycombe Wanderers. Has plenty of non-league experience, appearing for the likes of Welling United, Concord Rangers, Forest Green Rovers and Sutton United during the first part of his career. Enjoyed a successful spell at Dover Athletic between 2017 and 2020, making 68 league appearances before going to Wrexham. However, he suffered a torn groin there before tearing his thigh in his first training session at next club Barnet. A return to football in 2022 saw him join Billericay, where he scored three goals in 32 league games last season. Aged 28.

**KRESHNIC KRASNIQI** – Midfielder – Central midfielder who signed during the summer of 2022 after a year with Ebbsfleet United. Born in Kosovo, he began his football career in Cyprus where he progressed to playing in the First Division there for Ethnikos Achna. He then moved to England where he enjoyed two successful seasons with Heybridge Swifts. He then had spells with Concord Rangers, Wealdstone and Maidstone United before joining Ebbsfleet. Made 31 appearances in his first year for the club. Aged 28.

**MARK RICKETTS** – Midfielder – Vastly experienced defensive midfielder with more than 500 appearances in the National League and National League South. Originally on the books at Charlton Athletic, he moved to Gravesend & Northfleet (now Ebbsfleet United) in 2006, winning the FA Trophy in 2008. A move to Woking followed, where he helped them to promotion to the National League in 2012, making 276 appearances in seven seasons. He then joined Boreham Wood, becoming a club icon as captain, famously scoring the winner at AFC Bournemouth in an FA Cup fourth-round upset in 2022. Our club captain for 23-24. Aged 38.

**RYLEY SCOTT** – Midfielder – Young midfielder who signed from National League Dagenham & Redbridge in the summer of 2023. Spent two seasons at Victoria Road but was limited to just six league appearances. Spent two spells on loan with Concord Rangers during 2021-22 and a month at Lewes last season. He has also been a youth player with West Ham United and Ipswich Town. Aged 22.

**ADE SHOKUNBI** – Midfielder – Box-to-box midfielder who signed from South Shields in the summer of 2023. Won the Northern Premier League titles with the Mariners last season, having joined from Hampton & Richmond Borough in the winter. Prior to signing for Hampton, Ade was a key part of the Welling United side which avoided relegation from the National League South during the 2021-22 season. The former Reading youngster has also played for Billericay Town and Beaconsfield Town. Aged 24.

**LUKE WANADIO** – Midfielder – Rapid winger who has returned for a third spell with the club. First joined us in December 2014 and played 21 times in the rest of that season, before heading off to Staines Town, Welling United, Dartford, Bromley and Aldershot Town. Luke returned to Champion Hill in the spring of 2019 and played a key role in keeping us above the relegation zone in the National League South. Since then, he enjoyed two spells at Dartford, one with Billericay Town, and last season was top scorer for Dover Athletic. Aged 30.

**DANNY MILLS** – Striker – Striker who made his name at Whitehawk, scoring over 100 goals for the Brighton-based club and twice helping them to the play-offs. He started his career at Crawley Town, before a spell at Peterborough United and has also played for Ebbsfleet United and Welling United. Joined Dulwich during the summer of 2019 and has since become a key player for the Club, finishing three of his four seasons as leading scorer, with more than 50 goals for the club. He is also the Club's EDI (Equality, Diversity and Inclusion) Officer. Aged 32.

Spent time at Epsom & Ewell, Lordswood, Croydon and Haywards Heath Town during 2022-23. Aged 24.

**ELLIOTT ROMAIN** – Striker – Quick and strong centre-forward who can also play out wide. Joined from National League South champions Ebbsfleet United in the summer of 2023. Has played under Hakan Hayrettin at Dagenham & Redbridge and Maidstone United. Plenty of National League South experience having also played for Eastbourne Borough, Dartford and Hemel Hempstead Town. Aged 31.

## MANAGEMENT

**HAKAN HAYRETTIN** – Manager – Hakan was appointed as Hamlet manager in March 2023, with the Hamlet earning 16 points from his 13 games in charge, only losing our National League South status on goal difference on the final day of the season. Hak has plenty of pedigree as a coach and manager, earning promotions with Grays Athletic, Luton Town and Maidstone United during his career. During his playing career, Hakan won the FA Trophy under Martin O'Neill at Wycombe Wanderers and won promotion to the Football League whilst there in 1993, and from Division 2 to Division 1 a year later. Sustained a serious knee injury with Cambridge United which would force him to retire from full-time football in 1997. Spells in non-league football followed, before taking up the managerial reigns with Waltham Forest in 2003, winning the Essex Senior Cup there, before moving to Thurrock and then Grays. There he earned the side promotion to the Isthmian Premier Division in 2013, before being part of the Luton staff to win the Conference title a year later. After leaving Luton in 2016 with the club firmly on the path back to the higher echelons of the Football League, he briefly worked at both Dagenham & Redbridge and Braintree Town. In January 2019 a move to Maidstone would start the path to a third promotion as a coach, with the Stones pipping Dorking Wanderers to the National League South title in 2022. Aged 53.

**TERRY HARRIS** – Assistant Manager – Joined the backroom staff as Hakan's assistant manager in March 2023. Vastly experienced as an assistant manager having worked under the likes of John Still and former England manager Peter Taylor among others during a career that has taken him to Enfield Town, St Albans City, Dagenham & Redbridge, Luton Town, Boreham Wood and Maidstone United. During his playing career, Terry scored at Wembley in the 1977 FA Trophy final for Dagenham FC. He also played for Sutton United, Enfield, Chelmsford City, Tilbury, Dartford and Boreham Wood, and has Isthmian League and Anglo-Italian Cup winners medal to his name. Aged 68.
