


We look forward to more and more girls making the step up from U16 and U18 football to senior women.

FACUP AWAY DAYS

Hertford is basically perfect for an away trip. Not too far, easy via public transport, not Potters Bar, and blessed with a wealth of great pubs and a decent little ground. With the first two of Borough's FA cup matches (and the League Cup, and both rounds of the Isthmian Cup and the Capital Cup) drawn at home it was nice to have somewhere new to explore for a change.

I join about half a dozen other Boro fans on the Hertford train from Ally Pally; there are some bleary eyes and sore heads after the commiserations following Borough men's defeat at Bognor Regis stretched late into the previous evening.



Hertford as a town seems to be about 50% river. The River Lea meets three different tributaries at the town; the River Rib, the River Beane and the made-up sounding River Mimram. And in the 17th century engineers decided that really wasn't enough river and dug the New River from Hertford, via Haringey to Saddlers Wells. Hertingfordbury Park (which also sounds very made-up) has rivers to its north, east and south.

When we arrive at Hertford we find that heavy rain has converted one of Hertford's underpasses into an extra river. Thankfully, Hertford have a plastic pitch so there's no threat to the game (except possibly if the whole town is underwater).

We're not entirely sure what to make of Hertford. Coming from the division below, they're something of an unknown quantity, but we're helpfully joined in the pub by A's mate; a Hertford fan. He's expecting a tough match for Hertford but promises a decent crowd of 250.

As we head down to the ground we realise he's wrong; there's loads more than 250 there. In fact the crowd was over 400, the second highest crowd at Hertingfordbury Park so far this season.

You have to give Hertford an enormous amount of credit; the First Round Proper of the Women's FA Cup is a big match for both sides, and their fans turned up in numbers to make the match feel like a massive occasion. We as a club could learn a lot from them.

The away fans are massively outnumbered so we have to make up for in enthusiasm what we lack in numbers.

When the match starts, it's Borough who seem to be feeling the weight of expectation more than the hosts. Hertford start on the front foot, breaking into our box and Tayla looks to win the ball cleanly, but the player goes to ground. The ref points straight to the spot. Thankfully Liamara reads the penalty well, saves and is able to gather the rebound.

Boro settle a little after that. It's clear Hertford can't live with Jada down the flank and she cuts in on the byline and squares to Nellz who scores. The referee however, disallows the goal as there was a handball in the buildup.

Eventually Boro do make the breakthrough, and it's Jada again, who gets on the end of a long ball and is shoved in the back by a chasing defender. Amber makes no mistake from the spot.

With Boro's noses in front, the gap in quality starts to become more apparent. Nellz and Tayla both miss good chances before some fancy footwork from Nellz sends her marker halfway to Ware (where?), and she slots coolly past the Hertford keeper.

Hertford fashion a couple of half-chances, one of which forces Liamara to parry away when the half time whistle blows, A's mate's assessment is "you're just much better at football than us".

The second half continues much as the first did. The Hertford keeper makes a string of fine saves - firstly from a one on one with Kylie, then a shot on the turn from Tori. A glancing header from Kylie bounces off the upright.

As the half progresses, though, our nerves start to fray a little. Hertford are right back in it and fashioning decent chances (albeit nothing to trouble Liamara too much). Maybe it's the impact of standing next to Aki, who is pacing up behind the goal and down muttering about the nine grand we get if we win.

With ten minutes on the clock though Nellz chips a ball in towards the far post and Kylie slides in and gets just enough on it to send it goalwards, past the stricken keeper and over the line.

Three nil, game over.

Or not. With three minutes of normal time left, Hertford pull one back. Their winger cuts in from the left and fires past Liamara.



It's a consolation goal; it's surely too late for a comeback, but we've all seen too many injury time Boro collapses in recent seasons to feel entirely secure. Hertford press and probe, but they've left it too late and the final whistle blows; Boro are through to the next round!

All that's left is for the jubilant Haringey fans to have a celebratory Sunday afternoon pubcrawl in Hertford; ruining low-key Sunday evening pints by singing Haringey songs, buying pubs out of pickled eggs and generally enjoying the slightly illicit thrill of a session on a Sunday evening.

Torn dreams - ACL injuries in women's football

The prevalence of anterior cruciate ligament (ACL) injuries have become more prevalent among female footballers and constitute a significant concern. Studies have demonstrated female athletes are more susceptible to ACL tears compared to their male counterparts due to a variety of factors, including differences in anatomy, biomechanics, and hormonal influences. The rate of these injuries can be 2 to 8 times higher in women, particularly in sports that involve sudden stops, jumps, and changes in direction like football.

In just over 12 months the Women's Super League lost - and thankfully regained - Arsenal duo Beth Mead and Viv Miedema and England captain Leah Williamson, while Chelsea striker Sam Kerr had her season cruelly ended in early January. If the data were collected from players at lower divisions, I'm sure the figures would be significant.

Scientific research has shown that the disparity in ACL injuries between genders can be attributed to several factors. These include the wider pelvis in women causing a greater inward angle of the knee, a tendency toward less muscle mass, and the influence of estrogen on ligament strength and stiffness. Thus, injury prevention and treatment strategies must consider these factors.

Once an ACL injury has occurred, the path to recovery can be arduous and prolonged. It typically involves a combination of surgery and rehabilitation, which can take anywhere from 6 to 12 months. The challenges experienced during this period are not only physical; they also include emotional and mental hurdles as athletes grapple with the loss of identity and the stress of being sidelined.

Embracing a holistic approach to recovery can be vastly beneficial for the healing process. This involves addressing the injury on multiple fronts, including proper nutrition, psychological support, and alternative therapies. The goal is to treat the athlete as a whole rather than just focusing on the injured area.

Boro women are very fortunate to have a qualified Physiotherapist at training and matches as well as access to specialists at <u>Touch Tuina Medical Therapy Clinics</u> who utilise the most tried and tested effective massage therapy in the world!



OUR HISTORY

Although Haringey Borough FC was formed in 1973, the Women's team wasn't formed until the start of season 1999/2000 and played only occasional "friendlies" in that first season.

In the summer of 2000 we merged with Mill Hill United and were accepted into Division 2 of the Eastern Region League for season 1999/2000, gaining promotion to Division 1 as runners-up to Saffron Walden Town while based at the rather bleak Donkey Lane Playing Fields in Enfield.

The merged Club adopted the name of Haringey Borough and re-located to the Coles Park stadium of the Spartan South Midlands League club, founded in 1907, in White Hart Lane, Tottenham.

2000/2001 – 16 unbeaten League matches but finished third on goal difference. Eliminated two Greater London League sides in the Women's FA Cup.

2001/2002 – 9 unbeaten League games and promotion to the Premier Division as runners-up. The League Plate was garnered with a 4-1 victory over Cottenham United and a regional 5-a-side trophy.

2002/03 – we led the League for two weeks in mid-season, before finishing a comfortable 4th, retaining the regional 5-a-side trophy.

2003/04 – the team were rocked by a sudden spate of long-term injuries and departures of erstwhile regular players but with a late burst succeeded in preserving its Premier Division status.

2004/05 – the team appeared in the finals of five small sided competitions and finished in a safe midtable position.

2005/06 – the Club progressed through two preliminary rounds of the Women's FA Cup finishing midtable again and were finalists in the League Cup losing by a late goal against the League Champions Norwich City Canaries.

2006/07 – the team finished third despite a slow start and early dismissal from all knock-out competitions.

2007/08 – the team lost three long serving players to National Premier Division sides and played most of the season with a very small squad. Despite that the team had three London County Cup victories including victory over local rivals Tottenham Hotspur in the quarter final. We went on to reach another semi-final in the League Cup.

2008/09 – an extraordinary season where in mid-March relegation looked a likely outcome but an astonishing turnaround saw the team suffer only one defeat in the remaining 12 games and had that game been won, the runners-up spot would have been secured instead of 4th place.

2009/10 – notable for the 5-match run in the Women's FA Cup. In December, the team led the Premier Division and looked favourites to win the Championship but an unexpected deterioration in form finally resulted in a mid-table finish.

OUR HISTORY CONTINUED...

2010/11 – a very challenging season including loss of established players and a series of long-term injuries. The team saw several successful rounds in the Women's FA Cup but the lack of depth in the squad meant that relegation could not be avoided.

2011/12 – a slow start in Division One but as our campaign gathered pace we eventually finished second and thus earned promotion back to the Premier Division at the first attempt.

2013/14 – a major development took place when the Club was struggling midway through this season with the appointment of Steve Browne as Manager and he brought with him his highly successful S & T Academy Girls who in their mid and late teens were becoming too old to continue in Youth football.

2015/16 – mid-table position was easily secured.

2016/17 – the team were runaway League leaders only to be thrown off course at Christmas by the tragic early death of Manager Steve Browne on New Year's Day. After a shaky period we re-asserted ourselves to win the League Championship on the last day of the season and with it, promotion to the Women's Premier League. We followed that up by adding the League Cup with a 5-1 win to complete the double.

2017/18 – several of the top players were lost to USA Scholarships and other Premier League teams and a torrid time ensued in Division One South-East and the team returned to the Eastern Region League.

2018/19 – the team began to rebuild only to see the newly appointed manager accept a role in his home Country of Greece at Christmas. A new manager was appointed and the coronavirus pandemic put a premature end to the season with results being deemed null and void.

2019/20 – The appointment of Bob Cato, formerly of Derby County Ladies, Leicester City WFC and a former Haringey Borough player, has brought about much needed leadership and strategy to the team's play. A refreshed side with new players brought in though partnership with Haringey Girls Academy means that there is a now a full pathway from Wildcats to Women's football and much needed depth in the squad with 30+ players at training every week.

2022/23 – the season started strong with a team consisting of predominantly under 18s. Borough remain a contender to win the league as well as reaching the quarter finals of the Capital Women's Cup having beaten tier 4 side London Seaward en-route. Borough narrowly lost out to tier 3 side London Bees whose clinical finishing in front of goal proved to be the deciding factor.
