HARINGEY BOROUGH FC - A BRIEF HISTORY

It was not until 1970 that a team competed under the name of Haringey Borough when WOOD GREEN TOWN who had played at Coles Park since 1930 changed their name to Haringey Borough. A merger with EDMONTON FC in 1973 resulted in a brief change of name to Edmonton & Haringey FC until 1976 when the present name was re-adopted. The merged Club played in the Athenian League until it ceased to operate at the end of the 1983/84 season and then played for 4 seasons in Division 2 North of the Isthmian League. After a period of instability culminating in a year in the wilderness away from Senior football in 1988/89 they were admitted to the Spartan



League in 1989/90 retaining Premier Division membership throughout until the South Midlands League merger in season 1997/98 when they finished 7th.in the Premier Division South to secure membership of the new "combined" Premier Division for 1998/99 as well as being runners up in the League's Premier Division Cup. In 2004 after an unsuccessful attempt to move the Club to the nearby New River Sports stadium and a walk out of the existing Committee Aki Achillea who had commenced his association with the Club in 1995 was appointed to lead the Club forward and together with George Kilikita and Secretary John Bacon the club sought to engage more with the local community and tap into the talent locally.

The senior men's team having been relegated to Division One of the Spartan South Midlands League in 2006/7 bounced back with promotion at the very first attempt and a fine season ended with both promotion and the winning of the Division One Cup. Back in the Premier Division for the season 2008/09 the Club again quickly found itself among the relegation strugglers leading to the appointment of the current Manager - the vastly experienced Tom Loizou. Tom and his excellent loyal team of coaching staff have been instrumental in turning around the Club's fortunes in the intervening years. In 2011/12 a highest ever 5th place was achieved and the League Challenge Trophy won. After massive stadium improvements in the close season with the erection of a new Clubhouse and new dressing rooms hopes were high for 2012/13 but the poor weather and the problematic pitch led to a massive fixture backlog which negated any chance of a serious challenge for honours and the Club finished 9th. In 2013/14 the Club's challenge for promotion took place in the Essex Senior League following a sideways switch imposed by the FA. The Club had what was then its most successful season ever finishing runners up by just a solitary point to Great Wakering Rovers and ended the season with 20 wins and one draw from the final 21 League games. The League title was nevertheless secured at the second attempt in 2014/15 with a haul of 103 points from 38 games and with it promotion to Step 4 in which we were allocated to the Ryman League Division One North. The first season at the higher level was a baptism of fire when only 7 points were garnered from the first 17 games but by the close of the season a further 43 points had been amassed from the remaining 29 games and the Club finished in a comfortable 15th place. The first season in the FA Trophy produced two fine victories before a replay loss to Hitchin Town of the Evostik South Premier Division. The summer of 2016 saw yet further investment in the close season in the form of a 3G synthetic main pitch and added improvements to the perimeter, the spectator rails and the floodlights and has created a facility of which the Club can be proud; and has afforded a greater opportunity for the Club to move forward in all aspects. The first team in 2016/17 improved markedly on the previous season and had an excellent all round campaign although rather unfortunate not to finish the season on a high having ended with the "double heartbreak" of missing out on promotion through a 4-5 closely fought semi final play-off defeat at Maldon & Tiptree FC after finishing 5th in the Division and an odd goal 2-3 London Senior Cup semi-final loss at Metropolitan Police. But 2017/18 was to be the Club's best ever and culminated in promotion to Step 3 via the play-off route with a 3-1 win over Canvey Island after automatic promotion had been missed by just two points. And in FA Competitions the 4th and final round of the Qualifying rounds for the FA Cup was reached, although that ended in disappointment with a 2-4 home defeat by Heybridge Swifts who then enjoyed a visit to Exeter City in the First Round Proper. In the FA Trophy we went right through the qualifying campaign and were lucky enough to draw Leyton Orient in the First Round Proper which brought a record attendance of 1,133 to Coles Park and "The O's" left mightily relieved at having come back to win 2-1 after going a goal down in the fifth minute. 2018/19 was another great but ultimately disappointing season with an FA Cup run which took us into the First Round Proper where it was ended rather cruelly by AFC Wimbledon's last minute goal at Coles Park in front of a record crowd of 2,710. Having led the Premier Division for several weeks in mid-season it was somewhat surprising that we dropped from 2nd to 3rd on the last day of the season after a poor late run but still enjoyed home advantage in the Play-Off Semi-final in which a 45 minute second half onslaught on the Tonbridge Angels goal produced only one goal in response to the two they had scored before the interval. The 2019/20 season's early termination was less of a disappointment for us than for many other Isthmian Premier Division Clubs as we were marooned in mid-table with no realistic prospect of entering either the promotion or relegation zones. The highlight of the season should have been the visit of National League Yeovil Town in the Final Qualifying Round of the Emirates FA Cup but, as is well known, appalling crowd behaviour brought that game to an early end and the second game seemed something of an anti-climax. In fact, without making excuses, that unpleasant episode seems to have adversely affected our players for some time for, whereas we had been well in the promotion places mix, thereafter we just drifted downwards The early termination of League Fixtures for 2020/21 was more of a blow than was the previous seasons voiding as we were well placed to make a charge towards a play-off place at least. However the Buildbase FA Trophy continued and we enjoyed a run through to the 4th Round Proper when Oxford City of the National League South finally eliminated us 4-2 after we had been two up; en route we had overcome Faversham Town, Bishops Stortford, Eastbourne Borough and Dartford, the last two also being National League South Clubs. The London Senior Cup also carried on and due to withdrawals, we reached the guarter-final without playing a game but lost a penalty shoot out to Hanwell Town after a 2-2 draw. The 2021/22 season was more or less a non-event as regards any real challenge for the League top spots but the semi-finals of The League Cup and the London Senior Cup were reached with both games ending in odd goal defeats in the space of a week. We may well have set a Club record for the highest number of injuries sustained in any season and that even led to an outside chance of relegation towards the end of the season but the failings of others meant we were never in serious danger. 2022/23 was a disappointment in League terms as we lost our way quite early after a start which gave rise to play-off hopes and 15th place was the final outcome. But we did reach the London Senior Cup final where we faced Charlton Athletic Under 23s at Hendon's Silver Jubilee Park. Three down after half an hour we looked dead and buried but fought back ferociously to level with three goals all from set pieces (2 direct free kicks and a penalty) finally going down to a 3-5 defeat after extra time. Season 2023/24 will live long in the memory but for all the wrong reasons. A disastrous start which saw only one point in the bag after nine League games meant there was a mountain to be climbed if the four relegation spots were to be avoided. As the season wore on it seemed that there was just a possibility that we might claw our way to safety but garnering only three points from the final nine League games put paid to any lingering optimism. So we now return to the North Division after six seasons in the Premier Division in which we had come within a whisker of promotion to the National League. Early exits from three of the four Cups entered meant that reaching the semi-final of the other - the League Cup - provided some cheer to an otherwise dismal season. The Under 23s having switched to the Essex Alliance following the winding up of the Isthmian League Development section reached the semi-final of their League Cup where they encountered the runaway League Champions. The Womens Team went one better and provided the highlight of the Clubs season by reaching the Final of the Capital Womens Senior Cup and gave National League Ashford Town a serious challenge before losing 4-2.

2016/17 saw the introduction of a much needed "second" team, formed to compete in the Ryman Development League it being basically intended for Under 21 players but with the facility to include up to 4 older players in every squad. The team held their own comfortably in the League finishing a very creditable 6th place and the benefits of the Club's participation were all too evident with the introduction of a number of players into the first team squad throughout the season and the opportunity for first team squad players to keep fresh and those who were returning from injury had a platform to get fit. Thereby proving the benefits of having such a side. The age restriction was amended to Under 23 for 2017/18 and the team which had always been near the top of the table, continued to do well in the following seasons and won the North Division Championship in 2021/22 but lost to South Division Champions Hastings United in the "Champion of Champions" play off. 2022/23 saw the North Division reduced to just 6 teams playing each other 3 times following withdrawals and the League decided not to run an Under 23 (Development) Section at all.

Youth teams were commenced and run successfully for many years at various age levels with some considerable

success particularly at the older age groups including progress into the 2nd round proper of the FA Youth Cup in 2006/07. They were Divisional winners of the Southern Counties Floodlit Youth League in 2004/05 and 2009/10 They were winners of the League's Colwyn Cup in 2004/05 and runners up in 2008/09. After a few seasons absence from Youth football the Under 18s rejoined the Southern Counties competition in 2017/18, winning its Divisional Championship at the first attempt and finishing towards the top of the table in the following seasons until falling away somewhat and finishing mid-table in 2022/23 and 2023/24. This will again provide a pathway for talented local boys to make their way into the first team squad and ultimately the first team itself.

The Women's Team was formed in 1999 and competed in the Eastern Region Womens League winning promotion in its first season and then to its Premier Division for 2002/03; and there they have remained save for two seasons, the first being in 2011/12 following relegation to Division 1 from which they made an immediate Premier Division return as runners-up. Steady improvement began and we were extremely fortunate to have been approached midway through the 2014/15 season by renowned coach and former professional footballer Steve Browne who at the time was involved in the highly successful S & T Academy Girls football. Steve was duly appointed Manager and preserved the Women's Premier Division status. In 2015/16 a mid table position was easily secured from an uneven campaign which included convincing away wins at the top 2 Clubs and some surprisingly disappointing performances against lower placed teams. In 2017/18, by Christmas the team were runaway League leaders only to be thrown off course by the tragic early death of Steve on New Years Day but after a shaky period the Women re-asserted themselves to win the League Championship with their last League game of the Season and with it, promotion to the Women's Premier League and followed that up by adding the League Cup with a 5-1 win over Cambridge City to complete the double which was a a fitting, lasting legacy for their Manager. The loss of many of the successful squad, several to American University Scholarships, proved too much of a handicap at the higher level and relegation back to the Eastern Regional League was an unsurprising outcome. Now under the stewardship of Bobby Cato significant steps forward seem certain and promotion is again a realistic prospect. An exceptionally young and talented squad was unlucky to find itself in danger of relegation towards the end of the 2021/22 season due to a high number of odd goal defeats but pulled clear with 4 vital points from the last two games. They look capable of going places if they stick together when experience is added to their armoury. The tie up with the Haringey Girl's Academy run by Adem Ali has proved massively successful and for the first time we are in a situation where talented young teenagers are ready and eager to compete for a place in the Women's squad as soon as they turn 16, although being a team substantially composed of schoolgirls in an adult League is not without its problems, but that did not stop them reaching the Final of The Capital Womens Senior Cup in 2023/24

The foundations are in place for us to make a swift return to the Premier Division after major strengthening of the Men's Senior side and an exciting season is in prospect in which a challenge for at least a Play-off position is a realistic target as we renew our determination to eventually achieve National League status. The facilities and structures are also in place for the Club's other teams to improve and enhance on recent successes.

The Directors and Committee of *HARINGEY BOROUGH FOOTBALL CLUB* take pleasure in extending a warm welcome to all visitors to Coles Park and hope that they will make use of the bar and refreshment facilities available to increase their enjoyment of the occasion.

HISTORY OF WALTHAMSTOW FC

The history of our great club is not what you'd call straightforward. Having reformed on at least three occasions, we've played under seven different names, but can lay claim to being the second-oldest club in London, and one of the oldest in the country. The initial Leyton FC was formed in 1868 when The Reverent Morgan Lloyd obtained a pitch behind The Lion & Key public house. The first Leyton played mainly friendlies, but did take part in the FA Cup, before folding in 1880 when they lost their ground.



Seven years later, the members of Matlock Cricket Club, based on Hoe Street established a football club named after the Matlock Villas, which overlooked the club's pitch. In 1894, Swifts moved out of Leyton, to a new ground in Blackhorse Road, Walthamstow. This lasted just a season though, as the club moved back to Leyton and changed their name to Leyton FC in the process.

The club won the Essex Senior Cup on no fewer than five occasions, and the London Senior Cup, as well as the South Essex League four times.

Leyton turned professional in 1904, joining the London League. The following year, Leyton moved to Osborne Road, which would later become Leyton Orient's Brisbane Road.

In April 1912 a loan by a donor was called-in, and without any hope of paying it, the club disbanded for a second time.

Only a year later a third Leyton was formed, but this incarnation was extremely short-lived. The outbreak of war meant there was essentially no one to watch or play for the club, and it was suspended.

The fourth Leyton was established in 1919, and it would be arguably the most successful period for the club, now back at the Hare and Hounds. Leyton won the FA Amateur Cup (now FA Trophy) twice, and were runners-up on four more occasions. They also reached the first round of the FA Cup four times and the second round three times.

After a successful 1950s and 60s, things dried up for Leyton, and by the 1970s they could not carry on, so a merger was completed with Wingate from north London.

The pinnacle of this club was winning the Athenian League in 1982, but by the early 90s with most of the former 'Wingate' committee now either deceased or having had left, the newly-merged Wingate & Finchley requested Leyton drop the 'Wingate' title from their name.

By 1995, the Hare & Hounds was really beginning to show its age, and with Leyton not having the funds to bring it up to standard, a merger was completed with Walthamstow Pennant, with the new club being Leyton Pennant and playing at Wadham Lodge.

This club spent most of its life in Divisions One and Two of the Isthmian League, with no notable success, save for two London Challenge Cup final appearances. Its first season in 1995 saw the club finish 4th in Division One, but it was mostly mid-table obscurity after that.

In 2003 the club changed names to Waltham Forest and were bankrolled heavily with aspirations of playing in the Football League. Sadly, these never came to fruition and an Essex Senior Cup was the only thing to show for it.

Disputes with the then-management at Wadham Lodge in 2008 saw the club exiled for five seasons, playing in Ilford. The first season back at Wadham Lodge, in 2013 ended in relegation to the Essex Senior League for the first time in the club's history.

In 2018, the club changed names once more to Walthamstow FC. This kick-started the club and saw the highest attendances in many years, and a third-placed finish in the Essex Senior League, the club's highest finish since the 1980s.

After two seasons cut short by the Covid-19 pandemic, Stow finally secured promotion from step five by winning the Essex Senior League title in 2022, the club's first league win for 37 years.

The club have made a great start to life back at step four, losing a play-off semi-final in 2022, and finishing just one place outside the play-offs last season.

Former player Vinny Murphy was appointed manager in December 2023, and instantly endeared himself to Stow fans by deploying fast-paced, attacking football. A formation of 2-5-3 in his first game was a sign of things to come.

PARTNERS WITH ISTHMIAN FOOTBALL LEAGUE

CHAIRMAN'S ADDRESS

I have to start these notes by making a specific reference to a man who the word legend was created for John Bacon now in his mid 80s has been involved with Haringey Borough FC in one form or another since the mid 1950s

It is actually quite difficult to fully comprehend how anyone can devote so much of their life and their time to one particular facet of one's life namely the support of Haringey Borough Football Club

Some 70 years of what can only be described as devotion to the world of non league football. John himself will tell you that he has never cared much for the professional game and his disdain towards the players and their attitudes is certainly vented whenever the professional game is referred to

John's love for non league football is born out of he's admiration for those who participate in the game at that level. I have had many conversations with John about what has motivated him to support Haringey Borough for virtually his entire life and he often remarked about the fact that these players devote their time and their energy and show commitment to the club for their own personal satisfaction and pride and not for the money that they receive in return

My memories of John commence in the mid 90s when I joined the club and was introduced to him when he became the club secretary a year or two after I had joined the Borough committee

His commitment to the role of secretary has been all consuming and I'm sure that Nick who currently assumes that role and taken over the mantle is grateful for the advice tendered over the last couple of years since John's ill health and the almost total computerisation of the secretary's role have limited John's ability to continue in respect of the senior men's first team.

John has nevertheless maintained a very healthy interest in club matters, including the women and the under 23's in recent times

John has always shied away from the limelight and when receiving an award from Haringey Borough Council a few years back it was certainly an effort to get him there to accept the same

Not only has John been involved in the men's first team affairs and all youth sides but also his commitment to the women has been total and should never be underestimated nor forgotten

It was John who brought the women 's team here to the Club in 1999 and has since then been the Women's club secretary and treasurer

Furthermore he became actively engaged in the treasurers role amongst other roles for the League in which they have primarily participated over the years namely the Eastern Region Women's League

John and the also incredible Karla Parka have together maintained the women's team for over a quarter of a century and that speaks volumes for the man who added a Sunday to his already busy all consuming roles at the Club

John's incredible commitment has not only resulted in his constant use of his computer and the completion of all administrative league duties in respect of all teams but additionally the attendance, often in far flung places, for various League meetings

John has always carried himself with the utmost dignity come win, lose or draw. He has always been magnanimous in equal measures although I have often questioned John's philosophy on style of play. It's a very simple philosophy and I am sure he will not mind me sharing it with you all. It is to start each season with the desire to draw every single game 0-0.

To achieve this one must at every opportunity plant the ball into the allotments if at home or as far away from one's own goal wherever the team is playing. The icing on the cake is to waste time at every single opportunity!

John's theory always been based on the likelihood that if you draw every single game you will never get relegated

John has seen some incredible transformations in Haringey Borough football club over the years and remarks to me about the success of the 50's and 60s, the crowds that the club used to attain and the significance to the community of having a local football club in those days

Of course he has also witnessed many years thereafter where the club has not been blessed with great

success however none of that has ever diminished John's desire to be involved with the club.

I am so pleased that the last few years have replicated the success of the 50's and 60's and that John like the rest of us has witnessed some notable achievements with promotions and cup success

We have, with all of your support, created a club for which we can all be proud and I know John is so pleased with the help and commitment so many people have shown in recent years.

It warms John's heart I know from what he says to me on our journeys in the car to so many games to see others share his passion and support for the Club.

Whilst it is true that the last couple of seasons have of course been difficult, John has never wavered in his support for the club and indeed it has been clear to me that none of our fans have wavered and that I think demonstrates that the club and the community atmosphere that we have all helped create in most recent times is more important than the match day results.

Certainly John would approve of us all having his attitude and long may it continue. Having just said that I am sure just a few more wins would certainly make life more pleasurable for us all !!

Whilst I reflect on some 30 years of friendship with John and with Fiona his most incredible wife and supporter I also remind myself of the fact that even up until very recently John, having attended each and every men's football match for so many years, similarly attended each and every women's football match and the vast majority of occasions was still running the line for the women even up to his late 70s.

How any one individual can be so committed to a non league football club is quite frankly beyond me to even seek to explain, John is a one off, such a special person that I felt we had to recognise his achievement and I hope that you will all join me at our last home game of the season when we would spend just a few moments in admiration of such a wonderful human being and then we can all show our gratitude to him in a fitting way

As the season draws to a close, I feel that it is important once again to express my gratitude to each and every one of you for your incredible unwavering support throughout what has once again for the second successive season been a difficult one for us all in some respects but a wonderful season in others

Once the reality of relegation from the Isthmian Premier Division dawned on me I looked back at our six years at such a high level of football with undiluted pleasure. I realised when I looked in more depth at the teams that we were playing against, their history, background, fan base and financial support I very quickly became so proud of the fact that we had even participated at such a high level and maintained such participation for as long as we did.

It is absolutely without doubt an incredible achievement for a club such as ours with the resources that we have and the term "punching above our weight "is very apt for a club of our stature. We had such notable success too for which I am so proud and I hope that such success will return in the not to distant future

I am extremely proud of the players that we have had in recent seasons and certainly proud of the players that we have this season as we have essentially kept much of the same squad throughout the season and whilst results have not been what we anticipated at the start of the season they have certainly improved over the last few months.

It is a measure of our players commitment to the cause that we have garnered so many points recently and that what appeared on the face of it to be a lost cause may yet be salvaged. I hope that a victory today will be enough and if it is not then we go to Brightlingsea next Saturday and two wins from our last two games will certainly be enough to keep us in this division

Those of you who have attended the home matches and those of you who have additionally gone to some if not all of the away matches will yourselves have recognised that at this level standard of play is particularly high.

When we were relegated I felt that we were dropping to a much lesser standard of football however I have been proved wrong and it is a credit to the other teams in this League that there are so many good sides who have made it a compelling division to participate in and one which I hope we will be participating in once again next season.

Tom and all of the management and coaching staff deserve and get our gratitude for never giving up, to continue to strive to change things in really difficult circumstances and create the unity that players are showing and which is slowly getting the results we need. You as a group of fans have continued to support

the club, our volunteers have once again excelled and we have added to them and I thank you all for such continued support.

I do not think it is an exaggeration to say that so many of us have created lifelong friends as a consequence of our association with this football club. I see so many faces who simply enjoy the company of the people who attend our matches and I am no different from the rest of you. I love seeing you all and my only desire is to continue to ensure that the club that you are all invested in continues to grow and expand and that we never lose sight of what is important and what is not important.

It would have been very easy for so many of you this season in light of the results on the pitch to have resorted to making unpleasant comments about me and others involved in the club. We all witness it regularly on social media with so many teams when results are not going well and yet it has not surfaced this season from you and that in itself fills me with pride and reaffirms to me the quality of the people who come to support our club and simply reinforces what makes you all stand out from other club's fans and why I am so proud to call you all friends.

We continue to promote the club and I am hopefully very soon going to be able to announce some additional initiatives that will carry our club further in the future and will enhance the values that we all hold so dear. Albeit that the weekend market was curtailed last June, as a consequence of a social media campaign to do so owing to what I will gladly call lies being circulated about goods sold at the ground, and the obvious financial impact on the club in relation to such curtailment, I can reaffirm that next season the free season ticket will continue for the 10th consecutive season and I anticipate that applications and details will be open online in June.

Please keep your eye on social media and the website for updates.

We will of course publish as soon as possible the pre season fixtures and the dates when the new season will commence.

We have the Mayor of Haringey and the local MP Mr Charalambous present today and I'm sure that they will witness the very best of what this club have to offer in terms of the vibrancy, the friendship and the joy that we bring to each other

I cannot finish without making reference to the creation of our junior Boro membership by Emma O'Donoghue and the success of the membership and the mascot initiative and half time penalty shoot out amongst only some of the fantastic initiatives created which bodes so well for the future of the club .Thank you to all connected with this scheme.

Let's hope that we achieve today the result on the pitch that we require and that we finish the League campaign at home in a manner which leaves us all looking forward to the new season.

If that does not happen at today's game then I hope as I've outlined above that we obtain the result we need next week and if we don'twho cares?

We will play football at whatever level we are assigned to next season and that does not in any way diminish our friendships and our desire to meet our friends and enjoy each other's company and to make this club the best club around.

This why I say that come what may it's been a wonderful season once again. See you all next season – I for one cannot wait and once again thank you all for your incredible support.

Our Club history is not lacking in mergers and name changes but in that respect we lag far behind our visitors. Despite the name they have had no association at all with the renowned Walthamstow Avenue and when Avenue's independent existence ended in 1988 Pennant FC then playing at Wadham Lodge changed their name to Walthamstow Pennant. although a few years later, in 1995, the name was changed to Leyton Pennant. It is to Leyton FC, another erstwhile leading amateur Club that they trace their origins back to 1868, nearly 40 years before us.

Many were the meetings between the component parts of the much merged Clubs. The first was an FA Cup 2nd Qualifying Round tie at Lea Bridge Road between Leyton and Edmonton in 1968 which finished 2-2 with Edmonton winning the replay at the Barrass Stadium 2-1. The first League encounters were in 1969 /70 in Division 2 of the Athenian League. Leyton finished 9th and Edmonton 2nd which earned them promotion so it was not until 1974/75 by which time Edmonton had merged with the Wood Green Town arm of our Club and were playing at Coles Park under the name of Edmonton & Haringey and finished 11th from 18 with Leyton 17th.in Division 1. Leyton then merged with Wingate to form Leyton-Wingate FC and in 1975/76 they were 14th and Edmonton & Haringey 16th from. 18.. In 1976/77 we finally adopted the name Haringey Borough and finished 12th in Division 1 from 18 with Leyton-Wingate being Champions. In 1977/78 the Athenian League contracted to one Division of 18 Clubs with Leyton-Wingate finishing 2nd and Borough 11th. 1978/79 saw Borough finish 5th and Leyton Wingate 8th from 19. In 1979/80 there were 20 Clubs and Leyton Wingate finished 3rd with Borough 18th. In 1980/81 it was Leyton Wingate 6th and Borough 14th from 20. In 1981/82 Leyton Wingate were Champions with Borough bottom of 19 Clubs. Leyton Wingate were then admitted to the Isthmian League so the Clubs never met in the last 2 years of the Athenians operation. The next meeting was in 1984/85 when the Isthmian League expanded by adding two Division 2's and both Clubs were in Division 2 North which had 20 teams with Borough finishing 19th and Leyton Wingate top and promoted so the Clubs never met again during Boroughs 4 year Isthmian membership. It was in the Spartan League that the next encounter occurred in 1998/99 when Borough were admitted and met Walthamstow Pennant. In 1990/91 the Clubs met in 2 Cup Finals with Borough winning the Final of the London Senior Cup 1-0 at Hanwell Town's Reynolds Fields ground and Walthamstow Pennant the Spartan League Cup in Cheshunt's Theobald Road Stadium also by 1-0. Leyton parted company with Wingate in 1992 and reverted to just Leyton until 1995 when they merged with Walthamstow Pennant to become Leyton Pennant. In 2002 a High Court ruling was obtained to the effect that a new Leyton Club formed in 1997 was entitled to be recognised as a continuation of the original 1868 club. Walthamstow Pennant then changed its name to Waltham Forest and played under that name

until changing to Walthamstow for 2018/19. Leyton finally folded in 2011 following a difficult period after the Chairman and other staff were convicted and jailed for serious VAT fraud. Borough never met Leyton Pennant but were in the Essex Senior League along with Waltham Forest in 2014/15 with Borough 2nd from 20 and Waltham Forest 9th. The results of the more recent games are in the chart below. There were no further meetings before those with Walthamstow listed in the first chart.

Bambos Charalambos - MP for Southgate and Wood Green.

He was first elected as the Labour MP for Enfield Southgate in June 2017 and re-elected in December 2019. He is the first MP elected for the new constituency of Southgate and Wood Green at the 2024 General Election. Before his parliamentary career began, he was a solicitor and worked for Hackney Council on their housing litigation team for 16 years.

Bambos was the first MP whose parents are both from Cyprus. He was born in London and raised in Bowes



Park. As a child, he went to St Michael at Bowes Junior school, where he is now a school governor. He was a councillor for Palmers Green ward for 24 years.

Before entering Parliament, Bambos was Enfield Council's cabinet member for Leisure, Culture, Localism and Young People.

Bambos previously sat on Labour's frontbench as the Shadow Immigration Minister and Shadow Foreign Office Minister for the Middle East and North Africa. I'll be honest it an absolute honour to write these notes reflecting on John and the effect he has had at our club, a club many of us have grown to love, a club that has a long and rich history and a club that has for over 70 years had John Bacon. It is an incredible achievement not just to say you have been a supporter of a club for that long but for John he can say he has fulfilled almost every role at the club, he often reminds us that he was the manager for a period of time and retains a 100% winning record.

A few months ago, when we were discussing programme material he asked about the date of his first ever game at Coles Park, it turned out Wood Green Town Reserves 2 Vauxhall Motors Reserves 4 was played on Saturday 9th October 1954, I wonder what a young John would have thought if you had said to him on that day he would still be associated with the club 71 years later and even more so, explained the impact he would have on the club.

Quite simply when you think of Haringey Borough you think of John, I'm proud to say John has been a mentor to me, when you take on the role of secretary no one gives vou a manual to work from but luckily, I had something better and that was John. One of my favourite stories is that when he wasn't well a couple of years back, I visited him in Barnet Hospital, he was in a bad way. I was giving him an update on what was going on at the club and then he said to me that the Women's Team and New Salamis had been booked to play on the same day in January, he said it needing to resolved. be it was September! When most people would have been thinking about getting better, John was thinking of fixture clashes.

John told me that he instrumental was in creating the Haringey Borough Women's Team by bringing a team from Mill Hill to play at Coles Park, given that was the

My lifetime of loyalty to Haringey Borough

IN 1953, Queen Elizabeth II had just been crowned, Elvis Presley was the teen-age heart-throb and England were still 13 years away from being crowned football world champions.

champions. It was also the year that Wood Green teenager John Bacon paid his first visit to Haringey Borough – and began a love affair with his local club which went on to span more than half a century. The visitors to Wood Green Town, as they were called in those days, were Metropolitan Police. Despite the pass-ing of time, John remembers the day well – his side lost 2-0. John was hooked, and he has barely missed a game in the next SS years. That may change soon, with Borough set to lose their ground thanks to government spending cuts, and for John it would be a sad moment in the club's history. Atmosphere

a sad moment in the club's history. **Atmosphere** T would be upset if we had to move, but I think I'd be the only one, particu-larly if it benefits the club.'' says John, who was born on Alexandra Road and is now the Haringey Borough secretary. "I just happened to be passing the ground one day and I had a look in, and I immediately liked it. I loved that feeling of being part of something, be-ing able to walk right up to the barri-ers, and chase the ball when it went for a throw-in. It was a totally different atmosphere to what I'd experienced at professional games at places like Tot-enham and Arsenal. "I'd pay three pence to get through

tenham and Arsenal. "I'd pay three pence to get through the tumstile, and we'd get 50 or so fans to every home game – we'd be happy to get that many now unfortunately. "I'd cycle to away matches as well, I think the furthest I went was Tring, about 40 miles. I don't know why. I just took to them. The amateur game was cheaper, but it was friendlier too, and that was one of the big draws for me." Bacon barely missed a match up until the age of 19, when he was drafted into his National Service in the late 50s,

ian.cooper@archant.co.uk and even then he managed regular trips when he was on leave from Aldershot. Meanwhile, his team embarked on a period of change. Wood Green Town became Haringey Borough in 1970. before they merged with Edmonton in 1973 to become Edmonton & Harin-gey, and finally reverted back to Ha-ringey Borough in 1976. Pienty of past players stand out in John's mind, from the 'wiry, thin cen-tre-forward we all loved' Georgie Wells in the 1950s, to Ricky Otto, who played a handful of games for Borough before moving to Leyton Orient and eventu-ally Birmingham City, for whom he scored a famous goal against Liverpool at Anfield in the 1994 FA Cup. And of course, plenty of games live long in his memory. The amateur game may have entered a period of decline after its boom immediately after the Second World War, but the big games still came and went fo John's side, and he was there to witness them all. "We played Brigg Sports, one of the ginnts of amateur football," he recaus.

and he was there to witness them all. "We played Brigg Sports, one of the giants of amateur footabil." he recalls. "They had just played in the 1954 Amateur Cup final, and then the 1954 Amateur Cup final, and then not sure they liked it much, getting splinters in their backsides from our changing rooms! They've folded since... "In '57 we took Edgware to four replays, in either the FA Cup or FA Amateur Cup." Afterhis National Service John moved to Basildon, where he lived for 13 years and struggled to get to home games, but upon moving to Hertfordshire in 1976, he barely missed a match. **Giants**

he barely missed a match. **Giants** "In the 1980s we played Billericay Town, again one of the giants of the game. They brought down about 800 people for that one, they were all round the pitch. We've never had a gate like it, before or since. We drew 0-0, but lost the replay." In all his years following his team in their various guises, John's loyaly to

But as the pro-fessional game has exploded in popu-larily in the last 20 years, with younger fans hooked on the glamour of the Pre-mier League, he is aware that clubs like Borough, often the focal point of the lo-

But that won't deter him, and when Saturday comes, John would still rath-er be found on the terraces at Coles Park than in the stands at Spurs or Arsenal. After initially working with Borough's women's team, he has been club secretary since the late 90s, a fit-ting position for a fan who has devoted most of his adult life to the only foot-ball club on White Hart Lane. "We struggle to get the gates really.

But I'm of the opinion that football should be played for enjoyment, not as a busi-ness. I'm not fond of the professional game, I'm very much the amateur football fan, and always will be."

early 2000's the Women's game was nowhere near the popular sport it has become, yet we can thank John for the Sunday afternoon's that many of us enjoy watching the team and I know how proud John is of the team.

The warmth and standing John has in the game can be seen by the number of people that you meet at clubs who's first question is, where's John? His knowledge, his stories and his ability to remember facts is amazing. You won't catch him out on scores of games or about games played. Aki and I joke that when faced with a situation we would adopt the "what would John Bacon do" approach as we knew that would see us right.

John, it's a fantastic achievement to be associated with Wood Green Town and Haringey Borough as a supporter, volunteer and committee member for over 70 years, the club is richer for your presence and I'm sure there's probably been times that without your involvement there might not have even been a club. Congratulations and thank you, on a life of dedication to the Boro and we look forward to many more years of singing "There's only one John Bacon" because nothing could be truer.

CROWN dependencies offshore football clubs have become part and parcel of the Non-League Pyramid in recent years with Guernsey, Jersey Bulls and FC Isle of Man all valued members of our National League System.

But I wondered what the arrangements entail for opposition teams flying across to play on these islands, so I joined the official Southall party heading to Guernsey for their Isthmian South Central; fixture last Sunday to find out more.

The build-up saw Guernsey sending travel details to their opponents. In effect, the host club covers the cost of return flights for a group of up to 25 people from Southall plus coach transport to and from Guernsey Airport. This forms part of Guernsey's agreement to compete in mainland competitions.

Here is my diary of how the mammoth matchday experience unfolded...

7.00am – Meet up deadline at Gatwick Airport South Terminal. The Southall players arrive on time smartly dressed in club tracksuit tops.

7.15am – Southall's enthusiastic chairman Sanjeev Sharma does a final headcount to make sure everyone is present. He grins: "I'm feel like I am the players' dad looking after them all!"

8.00am – We are through security and on to the plane. I am sitting next to Southall manager Max Howell. He admirably video calls his young children prior to take-off.

8.35am – The Aurigny Airline flight to Guernsey departs on schedule. It's a one-hour journey spanning 160 miles. Also on board are the three match officials for this afternoon's game. Not surprisingly, they respectfully keep their distance.

8.50am – There is escalating merriment amongst the Southall squad because midfielder Chris Mulindwa has fallen asleep with his mouth wide open. So, his crafty teammates rest a coffee stirrer on his lower lip. I take a photo to capture the moment for posterity.

9.00am – Max explains his deep-thinking managerial philosophy to me. "My players are chess pieces that I move around the pitch," he says, reflecting on his nine years at Southall as a player, then coach and now manager.

9.35am – We touch down in Guernsey and the local coach appears outside the tiny airport. Our driver is a dead ringer for TV personality Bill Oddie. Much to my amazement, he negotiates the narrow island roads by frequently mounting pavements to pass oncoming cars. This time, I am sat alongside chairman Sanjeev. He describes his burning desire to find his beloved club a permanent stadium in Southall. It will end 33 years of nomadic groundsharing following the loss of their spiritual home at Western Road. They are currently based out of the area at Burnham but will switch to Hayes & Yeading next season.

10.00am – We stop off at a very nice hotel where Southall booked pre-match breakfast. It is good to see the players choosing healthy options from the buffet spread although some of us older guys readily tuck into fried eggs and black pudding!

12noon – The coach is ready to take us to the game.

12.30pm – We pull up at Guernsey's newly unveiled £10 million Victoria Park Stadium which is staging only its second fixture. The Southall party are warmly greeted by Guernsey directors John Loveless and Nic Legg.

12.35pm – I take a peek at the facilities consisting of two excellent grandstands on either side (offering 700 seats combined) and covered terracing behind both goals. I am thoroughly impressed by the 3,000 capacity venue. It is easily up to National League South grading criteria. The Guernsey Football Association offices are here too.

1.00pm – Several of the Southall players don't have football boots compatible with requirements specified by Victoria Park's artificial pitch manufacturer. However, Guernsey are able to loan replacement boots.

1.10pm – I approach Southall director Stephen Harrison for an in-depth chat. His family possess a long association with the club and Stephen outlines how he decided to become a co-owner. In addition, I spot a couple of loyal Southall supporters visiting Guernsey for the weekend.

2.00pm – Kick-off in our Isthmian League South Central Division encounter. Guernsey have the wind behind them and dominate pulsating first half exchanges without scoring. Into the second period, Southall muster a great 20 minutes peppering the home goalmouth. All of a sudden, Guernsey break away and Sam Murray decisively shoots into the net. Two minutes later, Southall are reduced to ten men (Ryan Hope red card) thereby affecting their chances of gaining a positive result.

3.50pm – Final score...Guernsey 1 Southall 0, attendance 891. A vital three points for the 'Green Lions' in battling against relegation.

4.20pm – Guernsey serve a delicious sit-down meal of Thai green curry to the Southall party in a reserved section of the plush clubhouse. Yet the West London players are visibly disappointed by the match outcome and eat in near silence.

5pm – The coach returns to take us to the airport ahead of our 6.10pm flight.

7.10pm – After the Southall contingent waited patiently in Departures throughout an unexpected one-hour delay, we embark on our plane back to London. I'm seated again beside manager Max who is considerably deflated by this defeat. He gives me a fascinating blow by blow analysis of the match I've just watched. I tell him that he can take plenty of positives from his team's performance.

8.15pm: We land at Gatwick Airport to conclude our lengthy day out. There are handshakes all around as the exhausted Southall party go their separate ways freshly anticipating local derbies versus Rayners Lane and Uxbridge over Easter.

Needless to say, I was pretty cream crackered when I eventually arrived home, but the trip will go down as one of my most memorable ever.

GEORGIOS ARESTI – A huge favourite with everyone at Haringey, Georgios has been with the club since 2018. A player that drives the team forward and always gives 100% although this means he plays on the edge given his desire to tackle and win the ball back. His career has seen him play for AEK Athens and numerous teams in Cyprus, he has also won international caps for Cyprus.



DEREK ASAMOAH – Derek returns to the Boro following a previous spell during season

2017-2018. His career has seen him play over 300 league appearances, scoring 45 goals for Northampton Town, Mansfield Town, Lincoln City, Chester City, Shrewsbury Town and Carlisle United. His football journey has also seen him play in France, Scotland, Bulgaria, and South Korea. He also has 4 Ghana caps and one international goal. Since leaving the Boro he has appeared for Cheshunt, Brightlingsea Regent and became the all-time top goal scorer for New Salamis.

BOBSON BAWLING – Bobson has had two spells with the Boro, a winger who previously played over 70 games in the football league for Crawley Town, scoring 6 goals. Other clubs Bobson has played for include Woking, Torquay United, Oxford City, St Albans City, Enfield Town, and Hendon. Known for his versatility, Bobson can play in various midfield positions and has also been deployed as a right-back.

TOMMY BOXER – An experienced centre back, Tommy was player-manger at New Salamis during the 2023/2024 season.

WILLIAM DANQUAH – A left back who is signed on a dual registration with FC Romania, William has appeared for the Boro previously where he made a handful of appearances, nearly ten years ago.

JORGE DJASSI SAMBU – A huge influence on the team's success in recent years, Jorge is a centre midfielder that loves to tackle and is a commanding figure in the centre of the pitch. Mekhi has also played for Halifax Town, Accrington Stanley, Eastleigh and Romford among his previous berths and Fulham, Wolverhampton Wanderers and Glasgow Rangers at Under 23 level.

STEPHANE MGBADA – Stephane was a regular last season for the Under 23s, his performances earned him a call up to the first team where he made a good contribution in the games he played, scoring one goal at Potters Bar. An exciting forward, it is hoped Stephane continues his development and secures a regular first team spot.

ROMAN MICHAEL PERCIL – Having started he career at Tottenham Hotspur, Roman was previously with the Boro between 2019 and 2021, an exciting winger, Roman has made appearances for numerous non-league clubs and most recently was at Harlow Town.

REMY MITCHELL – A goalkeeper Remy started his youth career at Arsenal playing games in the FA Youth Cup before moving to Swansea City, most recently he was at Potters Bar and is dual registered with Aylesbury United.

SCOTT MITCHELL – Scott is a centre back who has been with the Boro since 2017, a huge favourite with the fans he has amassed over 200 appearances and won the supporters player of the year twice. A player who brings experience and brings a love of playing for Haringey, which is why everyone appreciates him.

PRINCE MUTSWUNGUMA – Prince, a forward, was at Cambridge United academy before playing in Ireland for Waterford, he is dual registered with Bedford Town, having also played for Newmarket Town and Cambridge City this season, 2024/2025.

ALEXANDER NICOLAIDES – The top scorer last season for the Under 23s, Alex played 10 times for the first team. A very skilful forward and only 17 years old, much is hoped that Alex can make the successful transition to first team football.

MATT YOUNG – A favourite with the fans Matt returns to the Boro from Folkestone Invicta having left us in the summer. A classy midfielder who scored 15 goals last season. Previously Matt was twice loaned to us by Leyton Orient in 2022/23.

TOM LOIZOU (CLUB MANAGER) A man with wealth of experience and knowledge of the game who is always running around for the club; his passion is there for everyone to see and he keeps everyone at the Club on their toes - not just the players! With us since early 2009.

JOHNNY FITSIOU (MANAGING DIRECTOR) Has a wealth of experience in professional and non-league football. He supports Tom and the Chairman, Aki, in everything football related.

DAVID CUMBERBATCH (ASSISTANT MANAGER) Long serving back up to the Manager and the first to judge the merits of the many applicants seeking trials with the Club.

THOMAS O'DONOGHUE (FIRST TEAM COACH) known as 'Tucker' is an experienced coach who joined the coaching staff at the Borough in 2016.

LYS DEMETRIOU – (FIRST TEAM ASSISTANT COACH) – Lys joined the coaching staff from New Salamis in the summer of 2024.

EMELIE FITZGERALD (FIRST TEAM PHYSIOTHERRAPIST) qualified therapist with previous experience with Potters Bar Town & Wingate & Finchley.

TREVOR NOTTINGHAM (GOALKEEPING COACH) – Trevor joined the Haringey coaching staff during the 2023/2024 season.

GOALKEEPERS

FINN RUSHTON: Young, talented keeper who joined the club in late 2025 from Marlow. Kept an impressive three clean sheets in his first five games, including a vital penalty save against Haringey Borough.

DEFENDERS

JOSEPH ALATISE: Powerful centre back who has impressed since signing from Witham Town earlier this season, where he was a mainstay in their team. Has also played for Newbury Forest, Tilbury and Romford.

ALIEU NJIE: Former Blackpool youngster who signed for a second time towards the end of last season. Has also played for Potters Bar Town and Wingate & Finchley.
